#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

The Young Ladies' Radio League, Inc. has members of its Board of Directors scattered from Hawaii and Alaska to Maine and Florida, so meetings are held by postal service. The President sends a Bulletin to each director, taking up all business to come before the Board, and each Board member replies by mail. Whatever needs a vote of the membership, after Board approval, is then published in YL HARMONICS.

Bulletin #1 this year proposed a constitutional change for YLRL to qualify for IRS rating of an educational, scientific and charitable organization under Sec. IRS 501 (c) (3). Application for this rating has been tried several times previously under existing form of organization. Changes are necessary to meet government standards, although we practice the essentials in our League now.

Sponsoring a YLRL scholarship was also proposed in this bulletin. The Board voted affirmatively on both proposals. Only one member actually opposed either measure, but several had questions that are being worked out by a committee before presenting the necessary constitutional amendments as a ballot in YL HARMONICS.

In this message, I will try to explain more, fully some of the points that have been raised, so that the entire membership may be fully informed before voting.

First of all, we believe that YLRL is really doing the things necessary to qualify for the 501 (c) (3) status, through our work with the tapes for the blind, teaching radio classes, participating in weather watch and disaster traffic, providing educational programs in our clubs, donating radio books to libraries and schools, promoting world friendship through our radio contacts, our Adoptee program, and entertaining foreign visitors, working with handicapped in hospitals, etc. Whatever radio activity ANY YLRL. MEMBER performs is a contribution of the organization. If her achievements are of an educational. scientific or charitable nature, they can be considered part of the undertakings of the entire League. Such pursuits are surely too many to number and many of us engage in many facets of these enterprises. but usually we just carry them out and forget about them. Those outside our field are never aware of our accomplishments. To qualify for IRS rating, our League must state our purposes in the constitution unequivocally. We must conform to government standards in every respect. The primary concern is that no income from YLRL shall inure to the personal benefit of any member or officer. We must be sure and show proof that we indeed fulfil the requirements and carry out the purposes propounded in our constitution.

While the committee works on the proper form of the myriad changes necessary, every member of YLRL can help the cause by sending her D/C news of her activities, and reports of educational efforts of her YL Clubs, for publication in <u>YL Harmonics</u>. Does your club have educational programs? or scientific? What have you done in Public Service, operating in times of disaster? Do you maintain weather watch? Have you entertained foreign visitors to promote international friendship? We need publication of all our accomplishments along these lines. Please take time to send them in to your D/C.

Now, as to the questions elicited by these proposals from the members of the Board: -

1) Is all this worthwhile?

There are many advantages to this IRS rating, principally a reduction in our postal rate, which will save YLRL about \$350 a year.

- 2) Is it necessary to sponsor a YLRL scholarship?

  Perhaps not, but it is very desirable. There have been commitments to start this project. The Washington D.C. area WAYLARCs have offered to contribute the first \$250 scholarship. Among 1200 members throughout the country, I believe we will have enough voluntary contributions to provide a scholarship each year. If YLRL should receive more than \$250 in donations in any one year, the excess amount can be held until the following year, or perhaps we can offer a larger scholarship, or more than one scholarship, if we have more funds.
- 3) How do we get the money for YLRL scholarships? By voluntary contributions, such as the WAYLARCs have offered this year. If we receive bequests, or acquire a large fund, we might use the interest and retain the principal.
- 4) Will there be dues or duns to cover the scholarship fund? No- definitely no dues increase for the purpose of the scholarship. Only announcements in YL HARMONICS seeking voluntary donations.
- 5) How will the scholarships be administered?

  The stipulation of the scholarship will be set entirely by YLRL. They will be itemized in the ballot proposal. Probably preference will be specified for blind or handicapped, and probably preference for the pursuit of an electronics or scientific education by a licensed YL. The administration of the scholarship will be handled free of charge by the Washington D.C. area Foundation for Amateur Radio, a federation of 42 clubs, with 15 years of experience in the Scholarship program. The Radio Club of America and Quarter Century Wireless Association both use their services. The Foundation will administer the scholarship, advertise it, and review the applications, selecting the top 2 or 3 for YLRL approval. Advertising of the F.A.R. scholarships is carried in all of the major Amateur Radio magazines each year. (See May 1977 issue of QST, p. 64)
- 6) Will we lose sight of our primary YLRL interest of promoting friendship and encouraging women in Amateur Radio?

  We would not only continue to promote World Friendship among YLs, but would actively work to encourage and assist them throughout the World to enter the Amateur Radio Service and advance the knowledge of radio communications and electronics.
- 7) Will YLRL be accused of discrimination if we specify the scholarship for a YL?
- 2 I don't believe so, if we merely prefer a YL. We are YLs offering it.


8) If some year did not produce a qualified YL as recipient of the scholarship, could we use the fund to provide radio equipment for some school or institution?

The committee can consider this and put it in the proposal. We believe it is feasible and desirable.

I have done my best to answer each query that has been sent to me regarding these proposals. If there are others, the committee will be glad to receive them and use them as guidelines in working out final arrangements. In the meantime, HELP by sending in your publicity to your D/C. Let's have an issue of YLH replete with real YL radio achievements.

#### PUBLIC SERVICE

As an Amateur Radio Operator and a member of YLRI for many years, I have participated in providing emergency communications throughout the world to aid victims of earthquakes, hurricanes, and flood disasters too numerous to mention or recall. Upon several occasions, 1 worked for many hours with Red Cross Disaster Communications. At times our YLRL nets have been turned into Health and Welfare Communication Networks to aid families involved in the Alaskan earthquake, flood in Northern California; handled emergency traffic bulletins for the Calf. Highway Patrol in missing persons' cases or persons needing to be contacted while traveling. I am presently getting involved in the newly formed Sacramento County Sheriff's Amateur Radio Program to assist in any way possible in our county. Since its inception, thefts in parking lots and homes have decreased surprisingly.

Until the U.S. Navy discontinudd allowing Amateur operation aboard Navy ships, I provided hundreds of phone patches for personnel aboard to talk to families at home. I have continued handling phone patches for personnel on merchant ships throughout the Pacific as well as many islands in the Pacific. I have handled phone patch communications for months on end with the USS Repose, a hospital ship off the coast of Vietnam, allowing the injured military to talk to their families in the United States.

I have been involved with visiting foreign amateurs - entertaining them in my home, making sure they were met at airports, even though it may have necessitated many miles of driving. Through the years, I have formed close relationships and correspond with many of them when we are unable to talk on the radio with them. Our family has an "adopted" family in New Zealand, Japan, and Luxembourg who have visited with us and were given the "grand tour" of our area of California.

Every year the 6th grade pupils from the nearby elementary school come for a demonstration of Amateur Radio "in action". I have helped a few of them get involved in the hobby in later years.

As YLRL Librarian-Historian, / keep material on file involved with our organization and update the History of YLRL that is published from time to time in YLH.

#### or there's more to Amateur Radio than ragchewing on 2 meters

At the time of the "Great Blizzard of January 25, 1978", many of the Buckeye Belles went into immediate action to help where help was needed. Betty, <u>WB8PDP</u>, along with her OM Charlie, <u>WB8PDQ</u>, spent many endless hours monitoring the Queen City Emergency Net as well as many of the county nets to pass traffic and messages which were very numerous. These two fine amateurs travel about constantly teaching OPR classes for the Red Cross.

Donna, <u>WB8IPQ</u>, another active Belle, is deeply involved with the W.A.R.N. (Weather Amateur Radio Networkjalong with her OM Jack, <u>WB8IPV</u>. They are in constant contact with the National Weather Service and pass the report on to the CRA (Cincinnati Repeater Assn.) members. During the blizzard, they were in communication with station WVXU and moderator Larry, <u>K8RXM</u>, who programmed their and other active amateurs' conversations on the air, every 30 minutes for the FM listening audience to hear and realize what great good the hams were doing. This went on for two days. Hundreds of amateurs called in during the airings giving road conditions and warnings. Amateur Radio and the many faithful operators are beeing seen in a different light.

Still another Buckeye Belle, Denise, <u>WB8WNL</u>, <u>was</u> "doing her thing" at' the Civil Defense Headquarters (Hamilton County) where she is the Chief Coordinator. At the start of any emergency, she starts work and doesn't stop until it's all over. She received a Public Service Award from ARRL for her participation in operations during the Beverly Hills Fire Disaster.

Buckeye Belle President Eila, <u>WA8EBS</u>, has been the recipient of many service awards for her participation in operations during disasters and emergencies.

Edie, <u>WA8KMT</u>, along with members of the Cambridge Amateur Radio Club, helped provide communications for military units who helped the county dig out from the blizzard. They set up communications in the Engineer's office, helping coordinate rescue efforts for the stranded. As a result, the Guernsey County commissioners have issued a letter of appreciation stating: "We feel that without the services of the Amateur Radio Club, the loss to persons and property would have been much greater."

## KM ICC

On Thursday, January 19, 1978, eight members of the Hampden County Radio Association (HCRA) of Western Massachusetts appeared at KM ICC to help man the station during the part of the week commemorating the 75th Anniversary of Marconi's first two-way transatlantic radio transmission. The Town of Barnstable Radio Club did an excellent job of organizing and setting up KM1CC, and manning it for the nine day period. All frequencies and all modes, of amateur radio were used during this time.

Three YLs were in the contingent from Western Mass, in the HCRA: Jean Peacor, KIIJV; Eunie Gordon, W1UKR; and Barb Murnane, WB1EHS. K1IJV was already operating cw when the rest of us arrived. Jean worked 160 M, 75 M, and 40 M XW bands. W1UKR and WB1EHS did their operating on SSB while there: Eunie on 160 M, 75 M and 20 M while Barb staved strictly on 20 M. We all staved on duty until early Friday morning when we went to rest at Jean's home in Orleans.

While we were present, there were nine operating positions. One room held the slow scan TV set-up, plus the 6 Meter rig brought by W1KK of the HCRA. The other contained the 2 meter equipment plus the RTTY station, and the five other stations. The Kenwood TS-520 of WB1APD and WB1EHS, and the Kenwood TS-820S of HIQWJ, all of HCRA were in constant service from 2130 Z Thursday and 1600 Z Saturday.

The 240 cycle note, the sound of the Marconi 1903 station rotary spark gap, was reproduced by special permission of FCC. Its distinctive tone for the CW QSOs was transmitted by having the loudspeaker from the tone reproducer taped in place to a microphone. The CW operator simultaneously worked the keyer and the P.T.T. switch of the mike. Its sound was unique and unmistakeable to all who heard it.

It was interesting to note that several amateur stations responding to our CQ from KM1CC thought they were listening to a station on Midway Island and turned their beams in that direction, before finding out what was actually happening when we explained it to them.

The severe-snowsform which struck Thursday evening and Friday curtailed the operating time of these YLs Friday, when we were due back at KM1CC. Jean and Eunie tried to drive there Friday but had to turn back to Jean's summer house where five of us were staying. The roads were just impossible and the area to KM1CC was not made accessible until late Friday. Jean was a great hostess, and we appreciated her having us stay at her home while on the Caper-once known for its sunshine and warmth--but now, in our memories, the place we spent the record-breaking snowstorm of 1978.

KM1CC did not go off the air during the storm, as it was manned by a small group, of fellows who stayed put and went from one set to another to make contacts with the world, going without sleep, and food other than coffee and crackers which happened to be there, until the "senior citizens" of our HCRA, W1KK and VIICJK finally made it in latei Friday with the "meals on wheels" for the young people, one of whom was KIBE, President of HCRA.

All in all, it was an operating event to remember, especially if KM1CC becomes the last such special event station to be authorized by the FCC. The members of the Town of Barnstable Radio Club are to be commended for a very fine job in setting up and operating KM1CC. Barb, WB1EHS

#### THE FOURTH "REGGIO CALABRIA SPRING" AWARD

The award runs from 0000 GMT April 8 to 2400 GMT April 16. One point will be awarded to any station making contact with (or listening to) a ham radio station of Reggio Calabria town. This contact can be made on any HF Band and any mode. The same station may be contacted (listened) more times but on different bands and modes or on different days. In order to obtain the Reggio Calabria spring "Diploma" 5 points are required. Points beyond 5 will be counted toward the general classification - described below.

Contact with (or hearing) a "Jolly station" counts for 3 points.

The "Jolly stations"have no set operating schedules and similar to other stations may be contacted (or heard) more than once as described above.

GENERAL CLASSIFICATION: There will be two Radio Amateur classifications and one classification for short-wave listeners as follows:

(A) Italian HAM; (B) NON-Italian HAM; (C) Italian & foreign SWL. The prizes, which consist of cups, plaques, and pictures, medals, etc. will be awarded according to the rules of the organizing committee and based on the total points obtained.

The application, together with a log summary, claiming score, 10 I.R.C. and a QSL for each call-sign contacted must be sent to A.R.I. Section, P.O.B. 120-89100 Reggio Calabria (Italy). Entries must be received no later than May 15, 1978, in order to qualify.

The decision of the Organizing Committee will be final.


