


FROM THE EDITOR

Happy New Year to All! May you get all you wish for this coming year. Thank you for the many greetings I received for the holidays.

Now for the annual dues reminder for the Jan/Feb issue!

DUES ARE DUE!!!

Please note that the postage rates have been raised. For first class postage for US (required for VE and XE who do not accept US bulk mail) the rate is now \$4.00, bringing the total for dues + postage to \$12.00.

For Air Mail for DX (we no longer have surface rates for DX) the rate is now \$8.00, bringing the total for dues + postage to \$16.00.

AGAIN -1 must nag one and all to be sure and let me know of any change of address asap. This is an on-going problem that causes a great deal of wasted expenditure! Come Thanksgiving, I say a special Prayer of Thanks to those few of you who are so very good about notifying YLRL about their changes of address. However, when a copy is returned by the PO marked "forwarding order expired" and YLRL is charged \$1.23 for the return of the copy with the forwarding address shown, I have some quite different words to say,, hi! I then must re-mail it at first class rate of 45 cents. Since it was originally mailed for .084 cents, it has now cost YLRL a total of \$1.764 cents to get your copy to you.

YL vs XYL

In 1941 the term "YL" was adopted by YLRL as the general term denoting "Any licensed amateur feminine operator, regardless of age or marital status". Now, if non-YLRL members wish to relinquish their standing as ladies or young persons simply because they got married, then let it be on their heads; but, can't YLRL members at least remember that they did not cease becoming ladies or became "old" upon attaining the status of a married woman and continue to hold up the tradition that they will always be YLs no matter how old they get or how many times they get married?! Now, I am old (and getting older by the minute) but by darn I am still a lady and as long as I remain a ham; I pray I will always be young-at least at heart!

That same year saw the adoption of "33", meaning "Love sealed with friendship between one YL & another YL". This was originated by Clara-W8KYR, and adopted by YLRL for exclusive YL use. IT IS NEVER PLURALIZED!

NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTION FOR YLRL MEMBERS BETTER PARTICIPATION IN YLRL CONTESTSI

Please read the letter from an OM, printed below. This is an oft heard criticism. One of the prime activities of YLRL is our Contests. Now, if our members won't participate in them, what is the sense in having them?

It has been suggested that we eliminate some of them (such as the Sprints) due to lack of interest - no participation - no contest. I believe that this year may be the test so it is up to all the members of YLRL as to the continuation of any of our contests.

KA6SOC-Sue forwarded the following letter to me to publish in YLH:

Dear Sue,

I hope I'm writing to the right person. After the 1990 YL-OM Contest, I know I wrote to either yourself or KB6MXH about the lack of YL participation in the contest. One of you wrote back and suggested I subscribe to YL Harmonics, which I did.

When I received the Directory issue, I was curious to find out how my YLs worked compared with the YLRL membership roster. So I did my computing and found that of the approximately 1100 US members, I've worked almost 200. Of course, I've worked YLs who are now Silent Keys & not listed in the Directory. The thing that jumps out at me is that there are almost 900 YLRL members I've never worked. I wouldn't expect to hear all of them but if half of those 900 showed up for the YL-OM can you imagine what a joy it would be to work for the YL-CC?

I see that 27 US YLs turned in logs for the SSB part of the contest while 15 US YLs turned in CW logs. Thats less than 3% of the US YLRL membership which accounts for the lack of YL activity during the contest. By comparison,

almost 4.5% of the DX YLs (not including VE, KH6 or KL7) turned in logs for the SSB Contest. I can't believe I had better propagation to the East of me than behind me in the West.

Would you believe my lowest % of YLRL members worked... is in 6 & 7 land? I know propagation can be zilch during the year but if I can work you and Leila and two Zitting ladies in Utah, I should be able to hear the West Coast ladies during the Contest.

The numbers all mean nothing except perhaps to reinforce my observation about the lack of YL activity during the YL-OM Contest. I know you personally can't do anything about it but I thought I'd send you this info just to let you know how I see things on the coast. God, what a dream...200 or so YLs in the YL-OM Contest.

My mother is almost blind and has poor hearing also. She is not a ham, and is not mechanically inclined. Therefore, this is not really ham-related and may be totally inappropriate for Harmonics. She is a twice-retired, degreed librarian in her middle 80's. I had the large print edition of Readers Digest sent to her this year and she enjoys them immensely, but one magazine a month is not enough, so she reads and re-reads them.

Since YLRL sponsors Tape Topics, I assume we have a fair number of sight impaired members. Do you suppose any of these members might have other-than-technical large print reading matter they would share or allow me to purchase for my mother? The age of the publication is no factor, and mother is

especially interested in getting pre-1990 issues of the large print Readers Digest, any issue of any year. Sources of such materials to borrow by mail, though returning them might be a problem for her as she has difficulty seeing well enough to write, and has no transportation to get out to get mailers or stamps (we are not in the same city, or even state), or especially sources of where I could purchase such material for her would be greatly appreciated.

So far, I have found no organization in Houston that can help me (though I have not checked the book stores for special ordering, etc.), but surely there is one I just haven't come across.

If you consider it suitable to run such a request in Harmonics, perhaps they should write to me in order that people don't go out of their way and send her 16 copies of the same thing. Not that she or I would mind. It would just be nicer to spread the wealth among others.

If you judge this not suitable for Harmonics, I understand and no hard feelings. It's definitely not ham or YL-related, except that she's the mother of a YL. I just don't know where to turn at this point and am fishing for whatever help I can find. Thanks for your consideration.

VACATION IN PARADISE by Margrit Massi, HB9CYH ex S79CYH

I would like to tell how my family of three happened to take a vacation on an exotic island.

Interesting posters from our friend Kurt, KB9MX, who had already visited the Seychelles several times, led us ultimately to buy a travel guide on these islands. Later, when we saw a video on the Seychelles we decided we must see this paradise for ourselves. Thanks to timely plans we were able to arrange a travel date that coincided with a new trip of Kurt's. Of course we thought about radio operating. Already in February I sent off my application for a license. Many decisions had to be made - purpose of the expedition, place, equipment to use, antennas, power supply, modes of operation. The fee for the license is fairly high - \$50.

Since it was primarily a needed family vacation and my OM is not a ham, we

planned only a limited time for radio operating. With a pile of luggage we waited for a long time in a long line at the passport control gate, then were able quickly to pass through customs upon presenting our license. The first day in the Seychelles we needed sleep to recover from the long flight. But then we went for a tour of the nearby area. The street life was as everywhere except the streets were almost empty. Just as we expected, the climate was very pleasant. Frequent breezes and small clouds kept the heat from ever becoming oppressive. Soon, we understood why the vegetation was such a brilliant green. During our three week stay there were frequent short continuous rain showers that were felt to be very pleasing. The Seychelles include over 100 islands and coral reefs. They are strewn over an area of ocean that is far greater than the size of Germany. Most of the islands are uninhabited.

After two days we spoke to the hotel manager about putting up an antenna. We knew that a week before an OM from Austria had stayed at the hotel and had operated radio. The manager forbade us to put up on antenna, with the hidsight that he should have dealt likewise with the Austrian guest. We decided then after dark to stretch a dipole, that had already been constructed for 15 meters, from the balcony to a nearby palm tree. About midnight the antenna would be drawn back to the balcony, leaving only a thin nylon hoisting cord hanging till the next night. With these activities my husband made his contribution to the radio operation. I was pleasantly surprised that so many calls came from Europe and the U.S.A, in spite of the weak antenna.

For the second week we had booked a five day visit to the neighboring island of Praslin. Excited over the good and enjoyable radio contacts we'd been having till now, we did not spare any effort to take the station to Praslin with us. In the small aircraft the weight limit is 10 kg. Besides the transmitter and receiver we could only take the most necessary items. On Praslin, which because of its originality can indeed be described as a paradise, we installed the station in the customary manner. Also from this location would be made many contacts in the evening hours. The days were filled with swimming in the crystal clear, warm sea, getting acquainted with the island and visiting the Valles de Mai, a nature reserve where trees over 1000 years old still stand. Only there grows the Coco de Mer, the female coconut tree, which produces the largest fruit in the world.

A guide brought us for a one day flight to the island of La Digue. There one sees neither cars nor streets, only oxen carts and occasional bicycles, which move slowly down natural paths. The creoles performed all daily activities with a pleasant ease and peacefulness. Twice on Thursday evening I checked into the European YL DX net. The objective was to give YLs a rare call sign to record in their logs. Unfortunately only 30 YLs made use of the opportunity.

In all we made almost 1000 QSOs which, reflecting on all the circumstances, brought us much pleasure and fun.

We came back from vacation renewed and with many experiences and impressions to remember. It is hardly an exaggeration to call the Seychelles a paradise. I would like to thank Kurt ever so much for his patient help in building antennas and for all his support which contributed so much to the happy outcome of this vacation.

For the benefit of the American YLs your Editor called the Bank of America to get what information I could. I was told the following: The current rate of exchange (Jan. 5th) is .1936. This means, for example, that the hotel at 810 SEK would cost you \$156.82 American at this time but remember to check with your bank as the rate changes daily.

I was told that the easiest and least expensive way to handle the funds is to go to B of A (the only bank in the USA that is licensed by our government to handle foreign exchange-all other banks work through them) and purchase an International Money Order in US dollars in an amount equivalent to the number of Swedish Kroner you wish. You can probably go to your own bank (if it is NOT B of A) and do that same thing but there will be a charge there also. Bank of America charges \$10. for the money order.

When you write to Kerstin for your registration form, she will tell you to whom you make the money order payable and where to send it.

The Bank suggests that you do not try to buy Swedish Kroner as that is a much more expensive transaction.

Air Mall to and from Europe is pretty fast but I suggest you "get with it" as the saying goes because time flies even faster than Air Mail, hi!
