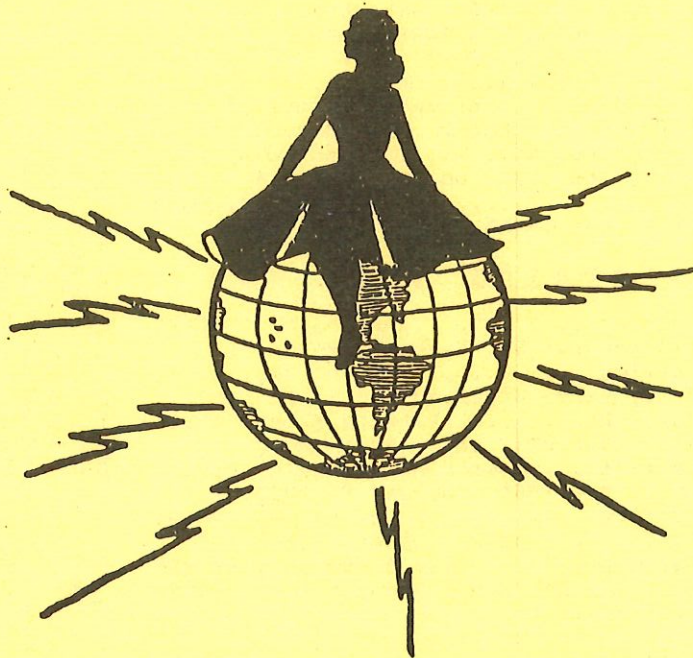

## YLRL SPONSORED CONTEST - HOWDY DAYS

1400Z, Wednesday, September 9, 1992 to 1700Z, Thursday, September 10, 1992

You may operate any 24 consecutive hours of the contest period.

ELIGIBILITY: All licensed women operators are invited to participate.

PROCEDURE: Call "CQ-YL."

OPERATION: All bands and modes of emission may be used. A station may be worked and counted once on each band and mode for QSO points. The maximum power output that may be used at any time during the contest is 750 watts on CW and 1500 watts PEP on SSB.

EXCHANGE: YLRL member or non-YLRL member? Entries in log must also show date, time, band, call of station worked.

SCORING: Score two points for each YLRL member worked and one point for each non-YLRL member worked. There are NO multipliers!

LOGS: All logs must show if operator is YLRL member or non-YLRL member to be eligible for awards.

AWARDS: Top scoring YLRL member will receive her choice of a YLRL pin, charm, or stationery. Top scoring non-YLRL member will receive a one-year membership in YLRL.

All logs go to W06X and must be postmarked not later than October 10, 1992.

## AUSTRALIAN LADIES' AMATEUR RADIO ASSOCIATION CONTEST

ELIGIBILITY: All licensed operators throughout the world are invited to participate. Also open to SWLs.

OBJECT: Participation: YL works everyone; OM works YLs only. One contest (combined phone and CW), to run for 24 hours.

STARTS: Saturday, November 14, 1992, at 0001 UTC

ENDS: Saturday, November 14, 1992, at 2359 UTC

SUGGESTED FREQUENCIES: Bands to be used are 3.5, 7, 14, 21, and 28 MHz only. The following are suggested frequencies for easier location of contacts: 28.380 to 28.410; 21.190 to 21.200; 21.380 to 21.410; 14.250 to 14.280; 7.070 to 7.100, and 3.560 to 3.590.

OPERATION: Phone and CW operation. Each station may be counted twice on each band for credit—once on phone and once on CW. All contacts must be made in accordance with operator and station license regulations. No net or list operation, no crossmode.

PROCEDURE: Phone: Call "CQ ALARA Contest." CW: YLs call "CQ Test ALARA." OMs call "CQ YL."

EXCHANGES: ALARA member: RS or RST, serial number, starting at 001, ALARA member, name. YL non-member or OM: RS or RST, serial number, starting at 001, name.

SCORING: Phone: 5 points for ALARA member contacted; 4 points for YL non-member contacted, and 3 points for OM contacted. CW: Contacts where at least one operator is Novice class count double points, otherwise same as phone. SWL: 5 points for ALARA member logged; 4 points for YL non-member logged.

LOGS: Single log entry (but Australian YL Novices entering for the Mrs.

Florence McKenzie CW trophy should indicate their CW score separately also). Logs must show date/time UTC, band, mode, callsign worked, report and serial sent, report and serial number received, name of operator of station worked, and points claimed. Two trophies and several certificates will be awarded.

LOGS MUST BE SIGNED: Logs also to show full name, callsign and address of operator, and show final score (points claimed). Logs must be legible. No carbon copies. No logs will be returned. Decision of the Contest Manager will be final. Logs must be received by the Contest Manager by Dec 31, 1992.

### THE 21st JLRS PARTY CONTEST

PHONE: Start Saturday, September 26, 1992, at 0300 UTC  
End Sunday, September 27, 1992, at 0300 UTC

CW: Start Saturday, October 3, 1992, at 0300 UTC  
End Sunday, October 4, 1992, at 0300 UTC

PURPOSE: JLRS shall sponsor the Annual JLRS Party Contest to promote the activity of women amateur radio operators and to further cooperation.

ELIGIBILITY: All licensed men and women operators throughout the world are invited to participate.

OPERATION: All bands and all modes may be used in accordance with operator and station licenses. Cross-band operation is not permitted. All contacts must be made from the same location. Net contacts and contacts with mobile stations or club stations will not count.

PROCEDURE: OMs call "CQ YL." YLs call "CQ Contest." CW: "CQ Test."

EXCHANGE: OMs: RS or RST and QSO number, starting at 001. YLs: RS or RST and QSO number, starting at 2001. JLRS members: RS or RST and QSO number, starting at 5001. Separate consecutive QSO numbers must be used in Phone and CW contests.

ENTRY: Entry in each contest is limited to one of the following classes:  
A: More than four bands B. Less than three bands

SCORING: 1. Phone and CW will be scored as separate contests. Submit separate logs for each contest. 2. Each contact with the same station on different bands will be counted. 3. OMs: Score 1 point for each contact with a YL, 5 points for each contact with a member of JLRS. YLs: Score 1 point for each contact with an OM, 5 points for each contact with a YL. 4. Multiply the number of contact points by the total number of different prefixes worked in each band.

LOGS: Copies of all Phone and CW logs must show claimed scores, band, mode, RST, callsigns worked and power transmitted, be signed by the operator, and be postmarked not later than October 20, 1992. Be sure your log is legible. Please print or type. Send logs to the Contest Custodian, Nobu Araki, JA3SMQ, 1-12-9 Shibutani Ikeda, Osaka 563 Japan.

CERTIFICATES: All participants will receive a Certificate of Contest Participation and a list of the result of the contest in January, 1993. Then stickers shall be added to the certificate at every participation for ten years from the issue of the certificate.

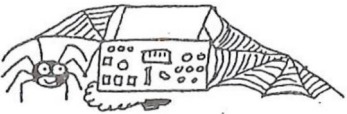

I step into the shack.

Dr. Christine E. Haycock, WB2YBA, is retiring from a most distinguished medical career. A surgeon and teacher at the UMDNJ-New Jersey Medical School, Christine has a long list of honors and "firsts." She began nurses' training in 1942, completed that, and then earned a B. S. in 1948, and went on to medical school. Having accepted a commission in the U. S. Army Reserve in 1947, Christine became the first woman intern in the Army and was assigned to the Walter Reed Medical Center when she graduated from medical school in

Nine years later, she became the first woman in New Jersey to pass the boards in General Surgery.

Throughout her distinguished career, she has served on a multitude of prestigious boards. In 1973, she was invited to join the AMA Committee on the Medical Aspects of Sports, which led to books, numerous papers, and national recognition in this field. Her Army career was also flourishing, and she attended the Army War College and graduated as the first woman class president in 1977. A full Colonel upon retirement in 1986, Christine was the first woman in New Jersey, and the second in the United States, to command major army units.

She was President of the American Medical Woman's Association in 1980, and in 1991, she was voted the first "Distinguished Surgeon" by the Association of Women Surgeons.

In addition to amateur radio, where Chris has been active in MARCO and YLRL, she enjoys collecting elephant memorabilia, photography, and training and showing miniature schnauzers. Christine has served as YLRL's Second District Chairman, Vice-President, and President in 1975 and 1979.

Christine has enjoyed her pioneering role in surgery and has broken down some of the barriers that existed in the field.
