We have been given a great challenge!

In July '92 I spoke with OH2BH, Martti Laine, and I asked him if there was anything I could do to help Merilla. ZA1TAL. now ZA1L. with QSL cards etc. as there were quite a number of YL's waiting to receive cards from her.

Well, as most of you will know the QSL-routes have now been established with the assistance of HB9BGN and Swiss Air.

Back to the challenge. The situation in Albania is as you will probably know very difficult, and it is virtually impossible for most of the radio amateurs there to get hold of any radio equipment. The ZA-stations who are on the air share the rigs left behind by the teams and associations that went to Albania to help organise the initial training courses and exams for the first ZA's who came on the air in the autumn of 1991. One of those new radio amateurs was Merilla!

Merilla is a young girl who lives with her parents and grand-parents in two rooms, and they are enduring what to most of us would be fairly basic and almost primitive conditions. Merilla loves her amateur radio and the contacts that she has made all over the world. She can only get on the air from time to time when some-one in her area has access to a rig, and she then visits to operate for a short time.

The challenge that Martti Laine gave me was to see if it would be possible through the generosity of all the YL's. and OM's for that matter, to get together and collect enough money to fund a set of radio equipment for Merilla so that she would be able to get on the air more regularly and also share with some of the other radio amateurs in her area.

Let us see if we can respond to this request. Having received the Challenge. I shall be happy to act as the collecting point for any contributions, however small or large - a dollar or a couple of IRCs or whatever - everything will help. If you can, please pass this request to your local radio club etc so that as many YL's and OM's as possible gets to know about it. With the help of everyone. I am sure we can get something together for Merilla and that the year 1993 will be a happy one for her.

I will be in contact with OH2BH and HB9BGN to establish the most suitable type of equipment and accessories, and also advice on how best to get it to Merilla.

Please let us see if we can pull this one off and make ZA1L heard on the bands more often.

Beginnings - Part 1

"My heart pounded and my hands shook, Doris Smith, WD8IKC, of Canton, Ohio said. "My husband kept hollering at me to go ahead! What are you waiting for?"

She had sat in front of that radio for three months, copying every dit and dah. When she finally got her license, she was scared stiff of getting on the air that first time.

"I listened for a break," she said. "My wrist felt stiff as I grasped the telegraph key between my thumb and index finger and started tapping the letters of my call. One short two long; then one long, two short.... All I wanted was to check in and out. When I took my hand off the keyer, it was shaking, and I was sweating."

What a relief, she confessed, when her call was acknowledged. "I had done it!"

It isn't difficult to get amateur radio operators to tell about their first experience or how they happened to get started. Doris is no exception.

There are many reasons women become radio operators. Some women became radio operators for tile military or the merchant marine. Some, but not all, got into amateur radio because of their husbands. Some do it just for the challenge or to be different.

As we sat in her trailer and talked, the static of her radio crackled in the background. She reached behind for the mike and gave her call. "My signal probably wont get out parked under these trees," she commented. The voice on the radio asked the YL (young lady) to "come again," and she repeated her call slowly, using international phonetics. The net control acknowledged her check-in with no traffic.

"My husband wanted our son to get his amateur radio license," she explained. "I sat through the classes with them and decided I'd take the test. I passed! That was sixteen years ago."

"Now, with the new no-code license, you can get a license without learning the Morse code. Where is the challenge?" she asked.

Doris explained that a Novice license wasn't renewable, When her license was about to expire, she took the next higher exam until she got her General class license and phone privileges so she wasn't limited to Morse code.

"A Novice, until recently, could only work Morse code," she said. "And some Novice nets would run for three hours."

"When that first net was over," she said, "I heard someone calling me very slowly. I answered him, and he congratulated me on getting my license. He is still a good friend."

Doris said that she has made many friends on the air, and she enjoys talking to people on the radio. "It is even more fun to meet them in person," she said, "and put a face to a call or voice."

Doris, with a twinkle in her eye, said, "I'll bet you can't guess what the name of that net was. It was called the "Sloppy Fist Net." She explained that if you don't hold the key firmly, you can accidentally send too many dits. Novice operators are notorious for sending extra dits.

For many years, Doris has been the net control for the Buckeye Belles' CW net. She is very patient with new operators.

Doris has been the editor of The Burr, the Buckeye Belle's newsletter, and YL Harmonics. She is active on the Ohio Single Sideband System and the local amateur radio club.

Doris keeps a pictorial record of all the YL get-togethers she has attended and plans to add to that record in July at the YLRL Convention in Wichita, Kansas.

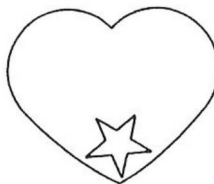

Anyone who has ever worked with young people knows how much they enjoy "fooling around" and "hamming it up," as well as tire incredible amount of energy and thirst for knowledge they possess. Now youngsters from the ages of 5 to 18 have the opportunity to "ham" it it up in a different way!

More titan fifteen girls and boys meet every Saturday afternoon at Rip, NVOM, and Ellie, NOQCX, Van Winkle's home, in Boulder, Colorado, to learn about Amateur Radio and basic electronics. They are all members of a group called BARC JR and are sponsored by the Boulder Amateur Radio Club. The BARC JR Club meeting is the tliird Saturday of the month, and the club has its own set of officers. The meetings include the planning of activities, events, and guest speakers. The rest of the time is spent doing activities as varied as the kids themselves.

Some time is spent learning Morse code and the technical information required to pass the different levels of licenses. The group currently includes kids that are pre-Novice level, up to General class, with a number of students working toward their Advanced and Extra licenses. They also learn electronics and can work on a variety of activities, in a group or individually, depending upon their needs and interests.

Designing and building needed equipment for use in Amateur Radio projects, as well as other electronic devices, is commonplace. Special attention is also given to developing correct radio operating skills, how to use the equipment properly, and what to look for in purchasing new or used equipment.

Amateur Radio offers these young people the opportunity to stretch their minds in whatever direction that they so choose. They can make friends over the radio locally or make contacts and friends all over the world. A number of the members routinely keep in touch on a local band, and they can often be heard discussing a variety of complicated subjects.

Those who are really interested in electronics find a big supply of wires, circuits, tubes, and other such "stuff" (along with the expertise of engineer Rip Van Winkle) an endless adventure. There seems to be a place in the group for everyone-no matter what their interest. None of this would be possible without the help of a multitude of Amateur Radio operators in Boulder County, who generously donate time, prizes, and equipment. A number of hams, including Dave, WA4TQB; Brian, NOTMP; Shannon, NOUEH; Randy, NOCD; Jan, KDOCU, and Don, KE0EE, work closely with the kids evey week to help them achieve their personal goals.

These young people are learning skills and a hobby that will last their whole lives-they just think they are having fun!

Legend of the Geese

In the fall, did you notice geese heading south for the winter, flying in their customary "V" formation? If so, you might be interested to know what scientists have discovered about their flying habits.

As each bird flaps its wings, it creates an uplift for the bird immediately following. Thus by flying in a "V" formation, the whole flock adds at least 71% greater flying range than if each bird flies on its own. Basic Truth #1: People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they are going quicker and easier because they are traveling on each other's thrust.

Whenever a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to go it alone. Hence, it quickly gets back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird immediately in front. Basic Truth #2:- If we take a tip from the geese, we will stay in formation with those who are headed the same way we are going.

When the lead goose gets tired, he rotates to the back and another goose flies point. Basic Truth #3: It pays to take turns doing hard jobs, with people or with geese flying south.

The geese honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep up their speed. Basic Truth #4: We respond to encouragement from others.

Finally, when a goose gets sick or is wounded by a gunshot and falls out of formation, two geese fall out with him and follow him down to help and protect him. They stay with him until he is either able to fly or until he is dead. Then they launch out on (their own or join another formation to catch up with their group. Final Truth: If we follow the example of geese, we will stand by each other like that.

Edge of Space Sciences is a Colorado non-profit corporation that promotes science and education through Amateur Radio and high altitude balloons. EOSS provides the balloon and the shuttle for each experiment that high school or college students have proposed, built, checked out, and launched.

Amateur Radio TV, packet, camera, and beacons for the transmitter (fox) hunters are also all on board.

Even junior high students and Scout troops have become involved in various aspects of setting up a ground station. In actual fox hunting, students learn to use a compass with a direction finding antenna and plot the various angles the balloon is moving. The students have also plotted time, altitude, and temperature readouts.

One high school group has formed a radio club.

It's real exciting to be a YL that's involved in this. The students are excited about the hands-on "stuff" that they get to experience.

We also have had a few times where students have gotten involved in the public relations end of things by interviewing the hams at the launch site.
