Beginnings - Part 2 Carol Hall, WD8DQG

Ruthanna Pearson was so determined she was going to become an amateur that she had her radio before she had an amateur license. "I don't understand people who go through the classes, pass the exams, and never get on the air," she said. "I got on!"

The transition from CB to amateur radio takes more than desire or work-it takes determination! Ruthanna explained that prior to 1976 she really enjoyed CB. Then CB got so bad she decided there had to be something better. That's when she decided to try amateur radio although she didn't know anything about it.

Ruthanna. now WB3CQN, bought a handbook, a code record and an oscillator. When she got home and opened the handbook, it might as well have been in Greek as far as she was concerned. She went back and bought the Ameco handbook and then a book from Radio Shack, which was easier to understand. She didn't even know what a code oscillator was when the salesman told her she would need one. She told him. "O.K. Whatever!"

When she finally thought she had the code down, she ran over to her neighbors to tell them. "I thought five words a minute was ninety miles an hour, and then I remembered I had to learn numbers," she said. "I got so I even talked to myself in code."

The technical material was the hardest for her to understand and learn. Then she had to go and find somebody to give her the Novice exam. After she passed her Novice exam, she operated CW for almost a year.

Her first contact was a YL from Michigan. She said she was so excited about getting a QSL card she repeated, "Be sure and send me your QSL card."

The YL replied, "How about your name?" Ruthanna said she was so nervous and excited she never gave her name. When Ruthanna ran into that YL a few months later, the YL said, "Wow. what a difference!" After a few contacts under her belt, she said she felt like a real pro.

Ruthanna and four friends, Dawn, now WB3G0C; Pat; Wally; and Jim, studied and took their General exams together. She had bought a Kenwood TS-520, a watt meter, and a keyer. "I guebs I shouldn't tell you," she said, "but we sent code illegally to each other."

"My first low-band phone contacts were stateside," Ruthanna said. "But when I worked my first Russian station. I really got bit by the DX bug." She has worked 328 countries, has received numerous awards and certificates, and serves as QSL manager for 20 DX stations.



After Ruthanna got her General license, Phyllis, W2GLB, introduced her to the YLISSB and other YL nets, and Irma, K6KCI, Net Control for YL Open House gave her a lot of encouragement.

Ruthanna loves to travel and has visited Algiers, Australia, Austria, Germany, Guam, Hong Kong, Japan, Jordan, and Majorca. She has operated from Australia, Austria, and Jordan. She was the guest of King Hussein, JY1, of Jordan, in 1984, after talking with him on the air.

Ruthanna explained that she generally takes care of her own radio equipment, but if she needs help with anything, especially antennas, the members in her local radio club help her out.

She got her Advanced license in August of 1978, 26 months after she got her Novice license. She wanted the extra frequencies the Advanced license provided to operate DX stations. Ruthanna feels proud to belong to a very elite group—women amateur radio operators. She enjoys public speaking and sharing her hobby with others. She was the Third District Chairwoman for YLRL in 1979 and 1980.

UPDATE ON RUTHANNA! On March 10, 1993, Ruthanna worked 4X4JU for the 50th square needed to qualify for the Holy Land Award. Fifty squares in thirteen regions were needed for the basic award, and Ruthanna lost no time in getting them!

Ruthanna is also now DXCC #1 and has the plaque mounted on her wall to prove it! Congratulations, Ruthanna! What an accomplishment!

XE1CI Visits Puerto Rico

I was invited to operate from Puerto Rico in June of 1992, so I accepted gladly. The first step was to write the FCC for permission, and after two months, I received permission to operate for a full year. Then I called one of the hams who had invited me, Lorenzo Morales, AB4DZ, and he was delighted to hear that I was coming. We set the date in November. I asked him if I needed to bring my rig. His answer was that he had the latest rig, the Yaesu 1000, and a linear. There was no need to bring anything, he said. Only myself.

On the 5th of November, I arrived in Puerto Rico. Lorenzo was waiting for me, and he took me to his house. I was surprised because I had the idea of going to a hotel. But he insisted that staying in his house would make it very easy to operate the radio at anytime. Of course, he was right, so I accepted. On the way to his house, I enjoyed the view of the coastline, hotels, the condominiums, and the Puerto Rican people. The streets are full of cars, exactly like the Mexican traffic.

He arranged a nice bedroom for me. However, the radio shack was in his bedroom, which meant that I was only able to operate several hours in the evening. YLs may wonder about his wife. She passed away four years ago, and Lorenzo lives alone. In the afternoon, we went sightseeing and had dinner in nice restaurants. I told him that all the meals were going to be out because I also wanted to visit the island and did not want to give him problems. We had a nice agreement, and it worked very well.

During the four days that I operated, I could not do as well as I had hoped due to the fact that Lorenzo has no antennas for the new bands, 18 and 24 MHz. Also, the antennas for 7 and 3 Mhz were inverted Vees, which were not working well. Besides, the rig was new to me and to him also, so we did not know how to work split frequency. There was a terrific noise level about every three seconds that stopped me from hearing the stations or answering the one I had already contacted. Besides, I had to get out of the room at a certain hour each night and then wait for him to get out of the room. In spite of my lack of experience with the rig, I was satisfied that I did pretty well, and I am sure that I made many people happy by giving them a YL contact from Puerto Rico. I worked 876 stations, 6 continents, and only 22 YLs on 15, 15, and 20 meters. My transmission hours were around three hours in the morning, three hours in the afternoon, and one hour in the early evening. I used only SSB, and not CW or RTTY.



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the time I visited with other hams and made it a point to meet Alicia Rodriguez. KP4CI the first YL operator in Puerto Rico. Alicia is also the

first Latin American YL to work 5BDXCC. I asked her why there are so few YLs from Puerto Rico on the air, and she told me that they were not interested in the high bands, only VHF. Alicia has not been active for some years as she had to nurse her sick OM before he became a silent key. Prior to his death, she and her husband were busy teaching many new couples so the YLs could be with their husbands in meetings, conventions, and everything that meant ham radio action. She is beginning to get on the air again. I certainly had a very pleasant afternoon with her and the other hams who were there.

On another day, I was taken to visit the Civil Defense Center, which was very interesting. I had never before seen such a bunker or known how they are prepared to meet cases of hurricanes or any other emergencies.

Although only 110 by 35 miles in size, Puerto Rico is roughly the size of Connecticut, the smallest island of the greater Antilles. There is a great diversity of landscapes. There are sunny beaches, many old towns that cluster around traditional Spanish plazas, and native trees that flower throughout the year. Also, there are many modern areas with luxury hotels, casinos, nightclubs, restaurants, and boutigues.

I must say that after all the experiences I went through that Lorenzo, AB4DZ, certainly made it very pleasant, and I am very thankful to him and all the nice people who made my visit and stay an unforgettable one.



Jamaica is a beautiful island. Each day. for a few hours, we visited one of the tour attractions. All of them were beautiful and very interesting. The wind blows constantly, but it's very refreshing.



YLRL President Dana Tramba, NOFYQ, is serving as the Convention Chairman, and Deborah Brauser, NOKZR, is the Co-Chairman. The convention will be held at the Wichita East Hotel, at 549 S. Rock Road, Wichita, KS 67207, telephone 1-800-299-4339. The hotel is approximately 13 miles from the airport, and the hotel does provide transportation.

Room rates are \$55.00 for one bed, and \$65.00 for two or more beds, plus tax. Up to four people may share a room at the \$65.00 rate. A block of rooms will be held until 30 days before the convention begins. If you're camping, the Good Sam Campground (1-800-782-1531) is close to the convention site. Tell them you want to park with the YLRL group.

Diane Van Kirk, KF0LV, is the Prize Chairman. Please contact her if you have prizes to donate or if you can assist her.

Three tours are scheduled for Friday. Two (Tours A & B) will go to Shepler's, the world's largest western-wear store for an hour of shopping. Lunch will be at the Pasta Mill, and then both groups will tour the Alan Lambe House, which architect Frank Lloyd Wright characterized as, "one of my best prairie houses." It was built in 1917 for Henry J. Allen, owner of the *Wichita Eagle Beacon*, a governor of Kansas, and a U.S. Senator.

Then Tour A goes to the Botanica, and Tour B goes to the Historical Museum. Both tours will return to the hotel by 3:00 p.m., and there will be free time to shop until the cash bar and DX festival on Friday night.

Tour C has been added in response to several requests from YLs who wanted to visit the Hutchinson Cosmosphere in Hutchinson, Kansas. This trip will be the same as the OM Tour, scheduled on Saturday, and is described below. The cost is also \$33.00, including lunch.
