President's Message

Things have been moving along smoothly during the past few months now that we have resolved our personnel problems with the aid of some much-appreciated volunteers.

With the assistance of Louisa, W5RZJ; Kay, WA0WOF; and Ethel, K4LMB; a tremendous job has been done on the revitalizing and reprinting of Louisa's book, **CQ-YL.** The new book includes all of the earlier update pages that Louisa provided over the year and then additional information through 1994. This time the book is in looseleaf format so it will be easy to add future update material. The original books certainly will be treasured keepsakes but update pages are no longer available. I would urge all members (and especially new members) to obtain a copy of this new edition.

On October 1st, I visited the SAYLARC meeting in Amsterdam, New York, to discuss plans for the 1996 YLRL convention in July. I urge all of you to start thinking about coming and about swaps, door prizes, etc., for them. It is never to early! The YLs in SAYLARC are already hard at work. A luncheon in the North Jersey area is planned for April. You do not have to be a SAYLARC member to attend.

There has been considerable discussion in regard to YLRL finances, especially in relation to printing and mailing costs of YL-Harmonics. The YLRL dues have remained at \$8 for several years now, as the result of some expenses being paid for by some of the officers, but I think it is time for a small raise. I am going to propose a raise to \$10 a year for USA members, but no increase for overseas members. The first class mailing expense would not be increased and would still be \$4 (for a total of \$14) if first class mail is desired. I think this is a reasonable proposal, but I would like to hear from you if you have big objections or other ideas to cover our expenses.

The other problem is that people are not notifying the Receiving Treasurer or Circulation Manager when they change addresses or if they have summer and winter addresses. Remailing YL Harmonics is expensive and unnecessary! Please let us know promptly.

I hope everyone has nice holidays—Thanksgiving, Hanukkah, or Christmas



PROPITIOUS HF PROPAGATION CONDITIONS PREDICTED FOR 1999

In the #4 - 1994 **YL Harmonics**, KA1LDS/VP9 wrote, "We were ready—but the bands were not." In the Contest Corner, we read, "Propagation may not be good, but there will be activity somewhere. Don't give up. These are times to improve your operating skills."


Some of us may want to know just HOW LONG DO WE HAVE TO WAIT? We know that good propagation periods correspond to peak periods in solar activity and that sunspots are the most obvious sign of activity. When sunspot counts are plotted against time for several centuries, their cyclic nature becomes apparent. We actually have reliable sunspot data from the times of our great-great-great-great-great grandmothers.

If we look closely at the variability within the obvious periodicity of eleven years, we find a set of shorter cycles (mean duration = 10.2 years) and a set of longer cycles (mean duration = 11.8 years). Given that the peak of our current cycle took place back in the summer of 1989, it would seem reasonable to estimate that the minimum of our current cycle will be around 1995/6 and the maximum of the next cycle in the sequence will appear between 1999 and 2002. That leaves us several years of relative HARD TIMES, at least for new YLs with relatively fresh licenses like the writer, or I should say, TIME TO IMPROVE OPERATING SKILLS.

Nevertheless, some exciting magnetic storms and proton events will most likely continue to occur sporadically, like the M6 flares that greeted our earthly new year 1994 or like the M4 flare at the end of February, which brought brilliant auroras to happy northern YLs from Minnesota to Michigan. It has been very quiet on the solar front since then.

It's hard for me to imagine that the diameter of the sun is so wide that the energy of fusion reactions in the solar core may take millions of earth-years to reach the surface. It's equally hard for me to imagine that the speed of energetic particles can be so invisibly fast, that solar fusion energy, once it has surfaced, flares out and settles into our earth's magnetosphere in only eight minutes.

We actually get well-spaced solar-event-receiving times, due to the fact that the portion of the solar surface giving rise to an observable event rotates out-of-sight and then back in 27 earth-days. So, if an event occurs that tends to reduce our radio propagation (silent bands), we can expect another silent time within 27 days, and then 54 days, and so on for four or five solar rotations. Similarly, if an event occurs that tends to enhance our radio propagation (active bands), we can mark our calendars 27, 54, 84, 108, and possibly 135 days ahead.



Now, what if we YLs were to measure our own ages, or our continuous YLRL membership in solar cycles instead of years? My mother was born eight solar maxima ago; I was using marine radios off the coast of Sardinia half-a-cycle ago, and I sincerely hope that all of us will be on the air come maximum-time in the 23rd cycle, around 1999.

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WHY ALBANY?

What an historic and magnificent setting for the city which members of SAYLARC have chosen to be the site of the 1996 YLRL convention.

The July 11-14, 1996, dates were picked quite deliberately because just one week later, the Summer Olympics begin in Atlanta. In the ensuing months, I will tell you more about Albany and its environs as well as give you thoughts on making the trip from Albany to Atlanta. It is our hope that these two back-to-back events will give impetus to many of you to see and enjoy the many incomparable sites along the eastern seaboard. More later.

JOURNEY ACROSS RUSSIA

My OM Terry, W6/G3MHV, and I arrived in Moscow on May 18th, carrying a plane ticket for a departure from Vladivostok five weeks later and a visa that specified the cities we hoped to visit. The itinerary was only a plan: we wanted to fly across the vast expanse of land which is Russia. Our journey would combine work, sightseeing, and hopefully, radio operating. It was a challenge, but we accomplished what at times seemed almost impossible: covering eight time zones, we followed our intended route-Moscow. Nizhny Novgorod, Ufa, Novosibirsk, Tomsk, Kyzyl, Irkutsk, and Vladivostok.

Work commitments completed, we took advantage of every opportunity to enjoy the diverse sights at every stop. Moscow and Ufa we already knew, but we eagerly looked for any changes. Novosibirsk has the distinction of being the center of Siberia; this was merely our transfer point to Tomsk and Kyzyl. Nizhny, Tomsk, Kyzyl, and Vladivostok are new cities on the tourist route: they were strictly closed to foreigners for many years. Nizhny, on the banks of the Volga, has a kremlin (or fort) and beautiful old churches; Tomsk is at the heart of Siberia and one can see many typical wooden houses built at the turn of the century; Vladivostok is a lively port with San Francisco-like views from its hills. On the outskirts of Irkutsk is beautiful, crystal-clear Lake Baikal.

Kyzyl deserves a special mention, since it was the one city, above all others, that we really wished to visit. The Republic of Tuva lies on the southern perimeter of Russia, on the Mongolian border. Kyzyl, the capital, is a small, quiet city on the banks of the Yenisei River. At a point by the river, close to the city center, is a monument marking the geographical center of Asia. Less than an hour's drive from the city, one can visit forests in the hills or sandy lakes in the grasslands. For radio, Kyzyl is in zone 23 and rare oblast 159. Its amateur population numbers less than 10 people. We were their first foreign visitors.

THE PAST COMES ALIVE IN THE LAHTI RADIO AND TV MUSEUM LN FINLAND

This past summer I had a chance to visit the Radio and TV Museum of Lahti, Finland, which was opened in 1968. This town is a very appropriate place for a museum like this since it has been known as a radio city since 1927, when the two 150 meter towers were erected. In 1928 the first central long-wave radio station of the Finnish Broadcasting Corporation was opened here.

The Radio and TV Museum stands at the foot of these high towers, which are no longer in use since they are not needed any more. They are merely a memory of bygone days. In the museum, one can become familiar with the huge development of the wireless and television. The oldest radios were crystal controlled, but in the 1920's, the first tube sets started to come out, often being made by the radio enthusiasts themselves. In the 1930's, the tube radios became more popular and several well-known international brands like Phillips and Telefunken started to appear on the Finnish radio market. There were also many domestic brands, such as ASA, Fenno, and Helvar. The wireless owners had to buy a permit to listen to the radio. In 1940, 350,000 permits were bought. Today they are not required.

In the museum one can also see the first television sets from the early 1950's. TV quickly became very popular in Finland. In 1958, there were 8,000 TV permits and ten years later, there were over 1,000,000.

Besides the things to see, one can also find something to hear in this museum, ft was interesting for me to listen to the familiar voice of Markus Rautio, who had a program for children called "Children's Hour" when I was a little girl. His soft voice on the tape saying, "Good evening, boys and girls! Have you been eating your oatmeal porridge in the morning?" took me instantly back to my childhood. He always reminded us of healthy eating.

One corner in the museum is dedicated to Amateur Radio. It is called the Memorial Station of Arvi Hauvonen, OH3R. One can see his transceiver with which he had contacts around the world. On the wall, there are the necessary maps and a lot of QSL cards from all parts of the world. On the table there are brochures put out by Suomen Radio-amatooriliitto, the Radio Amateur Association of Finland, to interest visitors in this fascinating international hobby. In the history of Finnish hams, it was noted that the first radio amateur in Finland was Leo Lindell, (1897-1936), 2NVA and OH1NA, and that the "Kolmosten kerho," the club for the third area, was founded in Lahti in 1930, with six members.

During World War II, from September 14, 1939, it was forbidden to use the amateur radio until September 11,1947, when (Cont. on p. 18)

BEV'S HOLIDAY, VIA BICYCLE TO EUROPE

On May 22nd, Robert, my OM, and I arrived at Schiphol Airport in Holland, on our way to Normandie for the 50th anniversary of D-Day, June 6, 1944. We were traveling by bicycle so the first thing we did was to prepare our bikes, which meant straightening the handle bars, putting air in the tires, and reattaching the pedals. Then we were off to Leiden, about 21 miles from the airport.

Next we took the train to Caen, via Abbeville and Rouen, a trip lasting abut five hours. In Caen, we stayed two days with SERVAS members; then on to Thaon, where we had a small studio bed-sitting room, kitchenette and bathroom, which we had reserved for one week. From here, we took day trips to the beaches of Normandie, which were only five to seven miles distant.


The 1,500 man parachute drop by the British 1st Parachute Brigade near the Pegasus Bridge, on Sunday, June 5, was a sight to behold.

We were fortunate in meeting Jacques, F6EMV, his wife Monique, and son Bruno. Jacques lived in a little village named Bretteville, about three miles from where we stayed. How great their hospitality was. We had dinner with them twice, and Jacques helped us get our bicycles on the train in Caen when we were leaving.

We took in local memorial ceremonies, commemorating the liberation of Bretteville by the Regina Rifles Regiment, on July 7, 1944. The ceremonies were very moving.

After our week's stay in Thaon, it was now time to start heading back for the airport. We took the train from Caen to Arras, France, a seven hour trip, and in Arras, we stayed with SERVAS friends. Then it was on into Belgium, through Wervik and Merlebeke, where we stayed with SERVAS friends. In Merlebeke, Belgium, we had our second great treat as our host had invited Albert, ON4AWK, and Mary Lou, ON4MM, to dinner. What a surprise, and needless to say, they are wonderful people.

The next morning was election day in Belgium, where all citizens must vote or they will be fined. This was on Sunday, June 12, and we cycled to Hamme just outside Antwerp, again staying with SERVAS hosts.



After leaving Hamme on Monday morning, we cycled on to Holland, staying in Roosendaal, Delft, Leiden, and Zandaam. In Zandaam, we again stayed with SERVAS friends, only this time there was a differet set of circumstances. We had met our hostess Betty in Beijing, China, about three years ago, through her parents who are SERVAS members. In the meantime, she has settled in Holland with her Dutch boyfriend. We are invited to the wedding next year, which will most likely be in early May.

Our last stop on Saturday, June 18, was in Haarlem. Again we stayed with SERVAS hosts. Next morning, Sunday, June 19, we awoke at 4:00 a.m. and cycled to the airport, some 15 miles away for our return flight home, ending a really wonderful trip. We traveled just over 700 miles by bicycle.

We are members of SERVAS—both as hosts and travelers, whereby we host foreign visitors in our home and when traveling, we are able to stay where convenient with foreign hosts. It is an organization primarily to promote pece and understanding. One must not ask for more than two nights accommodation.

When we arrived home, our family had arranged a party for us on July 9 to celebrate our 50th Golden Wedding Anniversary.


