Howdy Days

CW & SSB: 1400 UTC, Sep 13, 1995 - 0200 UTC, Sep 15, 1995

ELIGIBILITY: All licensed women operators throughout the world are invited to participate. **PROCEDURE:** Call "CQ YL."

OPERATION: All bands and modes of emission may be used. A station may be worked and counted once on each band and mode for QSO points. The maximum power output that may be used at any time during the contest is 750 watts on CW and 1500 watts PEP on SSB. Participants may work only 24 hours of the 36 hours in each contest. Operating breaks must be indicated in the log.

EXCHANGE: YLRL member or non-YLRL member? Entries in log must also show date, time, band, call of station worked.

SCORING: Score two points for each YLRL member worked and one point for each non-YLRL member worked. There are no multipliers.

<u>LOGS</u>: All logs must show if operator is a YLRL member or non-member to be eligible for awards. Awards: Top scoring YLRL member will receive her choice of a YLRL pin, charm, or stationery. Top scoring non-YLRL member will receive a one-year YLRL membership.

HMS Bounty Award

This award is sponsored by the Fall River Amateur Radio Club/Bristol County Repeater Association, with the co-operation of the Tall Ship Bounty Foundation, Inc., and the City of Fall River, Massachusetts, permanent home of the HMS Bounty.

Any QSO on any band, any mode, after July 31, 1993, is valid. Repeater QSOs do not count. Each station may be worked one time only. Special Event Station HMS Bounty, W1 ACT, may be counted twice if worked in different years. The award is also available to SWLs.

REQUIREMENTS:

- A. North American stations need 60 points. All others need 40 points. Point Values:
 - 1. Special Event Station HMS Bounty, W1ACT = 30 points.
- 2. Any member of the Fall River Amateur Radio Club/Bristol County Repeater Association = 20 points. QSL should be marked.
 - 3. Any other station within the City of Fall River = 10 points.
- B. A QSO with any four of the following 12 locations, associated with the final voyage of the HMS Bounty and Captain, must also be made.
 - 1. Portsmouth (Hants) G 2. Tenerife-EA8 3. Capetown-ZS
- Any VK7 (Tasmania)
 Tahiti-FO 6. Pitcairn-VR6 7. Tonga-A3
 South Cook Island ZK1 9. Any VK4 (Cape York)
 Jakarta-YB
 Timor-YB 12. Norfolk Island VK9

QSL cards must be in your possession. Send GCR list, signed by two radio amateurs and \$5.00 U. S. to Awards Manager, Bristol County Repeater Association, P. O. Box 893, Fall River, MA 02722 USA.

Dynamic Duo Returns to W1 AW

Following the YL Anniversary Party last October, the "Dynamic Duo: of Dot Burden, KA1LDS, and Deb Clark, KB1AOV, had made plans to return to ARRL Headquarters in Newington, Connecticut, to operate W1AW during the phone portion of the 1995 DX-YL to North American YL Contest in April. October's operating at W1AW had provided many contacts, especially for Dot who ties for first in New England for the YLAP.

As dawn broke Wednesday, April 26, Dot's husband Bill, WB1BRE, checked for solar activity by viewing the sun, using his Celestron C-80 telescope. We all examined the image of the sun reflected on the white surface and could make out no sign of any sunspots. Even the bright edge of the sun's reflection was unmarred by any sign of solar flares. These observations did not bode well for operating conditions, but Dot and Deb departed for Newington, hoping that some solar activity might develop and/or that it wouldn't make that much difference.

At W1AW, Scott, WB9RRU, rotated the 20 meter and 15 meter antennas toward Europe and at 1:30 p.m. local time "CQ" was transmitted...and transmitted...and transmitted. The operating conditions Wednesday afternoon were miserable. The ambient (background) noise level hovered between S7 and S9, and Dot, operating 20 meters, was only able to make 18 contacts, and Deb made a total of four contacts on 15 meters with two hours of hard work. Dot did make some DX contacts but none of those contacts were DX-YLs and rotating the antenna yielded no improvement in conditions.

Thursday's conditions were marginally better—Deb operated on 40 meters and had 14 contacts, and Dot had a better day on 20 meters with 27 contacts, but still no DX-YLs. Dot did chat with Joyce, VE6JOY, in Calgary, Alberta. Joyce is anxious to talk to other YLs so if you hear her, please give her a call. Another interesting contact for Dot was with Art, W4PQA, from Florida. He has been a ham for 62 years and this was his first contact with W1 AW—just two days after his 90th birthday!

Poor operating conditions are not unusual, or so we are told. How many of us have heard, "We're at the bottom of the sunspot cycle and band conditions will improve in a couple of years"? What ARE these sunspots and why are they important?

We all remember learning about sunspots...how solar radiation causes the gases in the upper layer of our atmosphere to become "ionized" causing increased refraction of radio waves. But how does this translate into practical terms since not all of us own a Celestron telescope, and I, for one, find the published charts more confusing than helpful?

Jeff Bauer, WA1MBK, Station Manager at W1AW, recommended listening to WWV at 18 minutes after the hour and/or asking the local DX-packet cluster to "show WWV" to get the readings for (1) solar flux, (2) 'A' value, and (3) 'K' value. Sounds confusing? It's easy if you remember:

- 1. Solar flux = higher number is better DX (100 to 200 is good) and use higher bands. Example: If flux number is high, try 10 meters. As of May, 1995, the flux level is 73 and falling. No wonder we had trouble!
- 2. 'A' value = ability of the atmosphere to chance. A higher number (20 or so) indicates change will happen but is of less importance than K value.
- 3. 'K' value = atmospheric noise. A higher number (5 or 6) means noise level will be high. A lower number (0 or 1) means great DX.

You hope the solar flux number is high and steady and the 'K' value is low. Jeff reminded me that W1AW transmits daily propagation bulletins on CW and teleprinter modes, as well as voice. These are usually updated weekly.

In spite of poor operating conditions we had a great time. It is always a treat to be a "guest operator" at W1AW (all you need is a copy of your license!) and the staff, as always, was most helpful. I don't know what Field Day operations will be like for all of us this year, but the "Dynamic Duo" will be back at W1AW for the YLAP in October to try again. Until then...think sunspots!

Editor's Note: Deb also put together a very informative two-page article on "YLs in Amateur Radio" for the Vermont Amateur Radio Council Convention. It contained listings for YL HF, VHF/UHF, and Packet nets; YL certificates, and these commonly asked questions (and answers):

How many licensed Amateur Radio operators are YLs? There are literally tens of thousands of YLs licensed but only a small portion of them are "on the air." But the numbers are growing and you can help by getting on the air and talking to other YLs. Let's make our presence known and help support our hobby!

I'm just recently licensed and I feel shy about getting on the air. A YL net is the perfect place to "get your feet wet" since you will be among many of us who have been there before! Even if you don't check in, please listen in and you'll get to know some other YLs in the area. Who knows, you might even find a new friend.

But I'm only licensed for VHF/UHF operation! Don't worry, there are several two-meter nets for you to check out. There is also the YL Packet Net.

I don't have time to "play radio"—I work during the day. Several HF YL nets take our work schedules into account and most of the two-meter nets are in the evening. Of course, the YL Packet Net is "on" 24 hours a day.

LOyAL SERVICE ON PITCAIRN!

Excerpted from The Pitcairn Miscellany, Vol 38, Nr 1, January 1995

Irma Christian, VR61C, recently retired from her position on the radio staff on Pitcairn Island, after 29 years of service. She became interested in radio as she watched Tom Christian, VR6TC, training three other operators in 1964. Irma was intrigued with the whole process and in 1965, she and another woman started training. Tom proved to be an excellent teacher.

At that time, all traffic was in Morse Code, worked through Suva and Rarotonga. Twenty words per minute CW was required, and operators also had to be able to operate the radio and be familiar with meteorlogical duties, which involved taking weather readings of temperature, wind direction and force, sunlight hours, and pressure readings. These measurements were then dispatched in code.

There were two skeds a day, one at 9:30 a.m. and another at 5:30 p.m. Operators walked up to Taro Ground for the skeds until 1967, when the motor bikes arrived. Telegrams were a wonderful way of receiving important news, and at Christmas, up to 20 might be received in one sked. The Queen's annual Commonwealth Message was also received in Morse—all 400 words of it!

In June, 1985, a direct link with New Zealand was installed. This was a marvelous facility for the island, and the islanders were very sad to lose it in September, 1993, but it did require the radio staff to work long hours operating the service, which included an evening sked. When satellite phone and fax facilities were opened in April, 1992, staff duties were slightly expanded with the operation of the fax machine and automatic phones. Irma was given the responsibility of calculating the charges.

Irma found the best part of her job was the companionship. The wonderful co-operation shown between staff members made for very pleasant working conditions and a feeling of being part of the team. The worst part was always having to be on duty at a set time. Even on the days when a cruise ship or supply ship called, someone would have to stay behind to attend to the radio. Two skeds a day often meant one could not be involved in other major activities that day, such as getting "stuck into" a good day's gardening or be part of a fishing trip.

In Tom Christian's thank-you letter to Irma, he wrote, "The staff and community of Pitcairn owe you a big thank you for your contribution in helping to keep the lines of communication open over those many < years, sometimes under very difficult weather conditions. You were always so willing to put your duties first. Thank you for such devoted service."

Why Albany?

Miriam Lamb, AA2DX, continues her series of articles on Albany, New York, site of the 1996 YLRL Convention, to be held July 11- 14, 1996.

There are lots of marvelous ways to reach Albany, and I mention only a few of them. The easiest way, of course, is to fly directly there—the airport is serviced by all major airlines. But then, of course, there is the fly/drive option. Albany is 226 miles south of Montreal and 158 miles north of New York City. You could fly to either of those cities and have a terrific drive. I'm only familiar with the routes from New York City. But if you followed the Hudson River north, you could visit on the eastern shore such sites as Philipsburg and VanCortlandt Manors (restored Dutch manors), Washington Irving's Sunnyside, Franklin Roosevelt's Hyde Park, the Vanderbilt Mansion, and the artist Frederick Church's marvelous home Olana, perched high above the rive in its mountain eyrie, to name only a few. The jewel of the west bank of the river is West Point where the United States Military Academy is located—just 50 miles north of the city. West Point is second only to Niagara Falls as a New York state tourist attraction.

Or if you drive in from the west, Interstate 90 can't be beat. It would be an eye-opener for those of you who think of New York City as New York state. Rolling farmlands (dairy farming is big here), great mountains and valleys, all viewed from an impeccably planned highway. You could take little jaunts off to such places as the Corning Glassworks, Cooperstown (which is beautiful in its own right, not just as the site of the baseball Hall of Fame), museums and by-ways through the Mohawk Valley, and on and on and on.

If you've got a boat, just come right on up the mighty Hudson, a vast tidal river whose scenic wonders rival anything the Rhine River has to offer. Albany has a splendid marina for those of you inclined to this method of travel.

Finally, for those of you who might be travelling south to Atlanta for the Olympics after the convention, drive west until you hit 1-81 and then head south. What a treat is in store for you as you sail through Pennsylvania, Maryland, and into the magnificent Shenandoah Valley of Virginia. You might find it hard not to stop there permanently!

As you can see, "getting there" might be half the fun. But the main message is, y'all come, we're gonna have a ball in Albany in '9611!





Anny Jenk, HB9YL, wrote from Canton Wallis in April, where there was still one meter of snow on the ground which was good for cross-country skiing.


Toshiko Someya, JF1WMY, wishes to thank her sponsor for her YLRL membership card for 1995.
