In the Eye of a Storm

I have heard there is an old Chinese curse that goes, "May you live in interesting times". I think somebody put it on these islands. Hurricanes are, in fact, quite interesting, but they are indeed a curse.

Let me say first of all that we are fine. We had no damage to our house or boat. The boat, a 22 foot Mako with twin outboards, was tied down in the backyard. The only damage we got happened after the storm when, as my OM was driving to the Emergency Operations Center in my brand new Nissan Pathfinder, a telephone pole fell on the right front fender. Fortunately, John was not hurt and the car is being repaired.

To tell about the storm properly, I will need to tell about the whole season. We got one near miss (Iris), one graze (Luis), and one hit dead center (Marilyn). It's like somebody was aiming at us and it took three times to get it right.

With Iris, it wasn't so bad. All we expected was a tropical storm, and nobody was too upset. We went ahead and took our boat out (it was in a slip at the yacht club) because we didn't want to wait till the last minute. All we got from Iris was a little wind and the seas kicked up a tad. We didn't even get any rain— which we could have used.

Then came Luis. This time we got nervous. This was a big storm—140 mph winds or better. We remembered only too well how Hugo devastated this island in 1989, and we could see it happening again. The mood of the people at that time is hard to describe. When I went to the store to get my supplies, I did not see one person smile. They simply went about their business listlessly, and if they saw someone they knew they would wish each other good luck. Many of these people did not have any insurance because it became too expensive after Hugo, and they knew that if they had extensive damage they could not rebuild. I don't mind telling you I was afraid. I too, remember Hugo, and I didn't want to do it again. That was an experience that I never want to repeat.

We called our good friend Lou, KV4JC, and suggested he come over to our house for the storm. He lives alone and we didn't think he should go through something like this alone. He agreed, and once he had his house ready, he headed over with his Rhodesian Ridgeback, Nikko. For those who aren't familiar with a Ridgeback let's just say it's a big dog. Nikko is a real sweetheart, and my two Cairn terriers liked her just fine. The cat, however, took one look at her and retired to the bathroom.

This was all the night before. The next day we started to get some winds but it wasn't too bad. We still had cable TV and watched the Weather Channel. The reports from the other islands were bad, but it started to look like the storm might turn away from us. For awhile the cute little prediction chart they were showing put us right in the middle of the

red zone (hurricane force winds), but slowly the red zone moved north until finally we were in the yellow (tropical storm force winds).

After the power went off (they turn it off here if we're within six hours of a hurricane - or something like that) I talked to my sister Nancy, N4TXV, in Atlanta, and continued to get updates. Also NP2Z and NP2K in Atlanta kept us posted. Actually we did this by phone, not radio, because the phone lines never went down. The reports we got made us happy little campers, and in the end it was just a tropical storm for us. Some of the island got damaged, but it was nothing like we had feared.

After Luis, our concern was for the other islands. Several had been badly devastated. One of our Senators got together some supplies to send to them, and my OM John, NP2B, planned to go along to pass health and welfare traffic. Then he found out that the governments of those islands were not lifting third-party restrictions, and realized that there was no point in going. As it turned out, I thank God he didn't. I remember asking, "What will I do if we have another hurricane?" He said, "Oh, that's not going to happen." Wrong, John!

Marilyn. Just a little storm, well to the south and moving west— no problem. The day before she hit I began to sense that things might be changing. I was scheduled to play golf with a friend and went ahead and did so. I knew I would have time to do what I needed to do when I got home. On the way home, I stopped by the store and got a few things and then stopped at the gas station to fill the tank. When I got home I helped John take down the tower. We have a crank-up fold-over, and during one of these things we always fold it over, take the beam off and lay it flat on the ground. Worked in Hugo, worked in Luis, worked again.

Lou called and wanted to know when to come over. I told him I thought he should come over that evening because by morning it might already be blowing. He came along about 5:00 p.m., and this time Nikko and the cat got along like old friends.

We kept our eyes on The Weather Channel, and unlike Luis, the reports weren't making us real happy. Marilyn was getting on up towards category II and was moving north. Not what we wanted to hear!

By noon the next day it was blowing fairly well, and we had gotten some pretty heavy rain, though not too bad. We still had power and The Weather Channel, and I still had a sick feeling in my stomach and a lump in my throat. This feeling had come shortly before Luis and had never totally left. One thing that bothered me was that if we still had power, and if what I had heard about turning power off six hours from a hurricane was true, we had a long way to go. These things always last longer than I think they should.

By mid-afternoon power was off and not long after that phones were gone. Now we depended on the radio for our reports. John had strung up a 20 meter dipole down the hall, and he had us on generator power. He was on the air with the National Hurricane Center, so we were well in-

formed. By late afternoon we were well into hurricane force winds. I went into what I call my denial phase. I got a book, went into the bedroom, laid down and read. It helped a little.

When I went back into the living room there was water coming in under the doors. I moved the furniture to the middle of the room and covered it with plastic. I also covered the TV and computers with plastic. The floor I wasn't concerned with. It's tile, and a little water won't hurt it.

By 6:00 p.m., it was getting pretty bad and the Hurricane Center said the eye should be fairly close to us but a little to the east. Not long after that the winds started to die down and suddenly we realized that this was it—the eye. This storm, that was supposed to go south or east or anywhere but here, had hit us dead center.

I had never experienced an eye of a storm before. In Hugo the eye had passed over the island to the south and west of us. This time we got the benefit of about an hour and a half of calm—not all bad.

An eye is a unique experience. It's eerie. I thought the sky would be blue, but it wasn't. It was completely overcast, but no wind or rain. The Hurricane Center wanted to know every detail. Is the sky blue? Is there any wind at all? What is the barometric pressure? The barometer is in the living room, so I went in there and read off the pressure changes to John. I could practically see the movement of the needle as it went down. It got all the way to 28.60 before starting back up.

They say the back side of a storm is worse than the front, but I couldn't tell the difference. It started back up about 7:30 or so, and to me, it seemed about like it had been just before the eye, only from the opposite direction. We had been told it would be that way so we were ready for that. I opened the windows that had been closed, and closed the windows that had been opened. Understand that we do not have glass windows. We learned that from Hugo. We have wooden louvers over screens. We don't have to board up; we just crank the louvers closed. I had heard that you should keep some windows opened to keep the pressure from building and taking off your roof. That's the reason for the opening and closing windows routine. Keep them closed to windward and open to leeward. Maybe it worked— the roof stayed on.

About an hour or so after the eye had passed, we decided we had seen the worst so we could go to bed. John went down to turn off the generator, which worried me a bit, but he assured me that the wind was not that bad and that he could make it. He was right, he made it fine.

Oddly enough I actually slept. I never thought I would, but I guess knowing that the worst was over calmed me enough to allow me to sleep. That's one advantage of going through the eye. You know where you stand.

The next morning we looked around to see the damage. There was plenty, but not like Hugo. Most of the houses were standing, and most had roofs. Some didn't though, and some of our friends have lost their homes.

Some will go back to the States. Things will never be the same.

St. Thomas got it worse than we did—some say as bad as we got it in Hugo. We feel very sad for them because we know what they are going through.

When we checked Lou's house we found that he had lost the roof over his bedroom, just as he did in Hugo. He was having some difficulty dealing with that so we suggested he go to visit his daughter in St. Louis. He's there now and feeling much better. The roof is back on and some friends are staying at his house and taking care of Nikko.

After the storm, the hams came through, as always. For at least a week the only communication between St. Croix, St. John, and St. Thomas, was by two amateur radio 2-meter repeaters. One is the repeater maintained and operated by the ARES - RACES group, and the other is John's machine. The ARES - RACES machine was up from the beginning, and they got the generator going to John's a day or so later. Many of our hams spent long hours at the Emergency Operations Center passing traffic between the various government agencies.

Because there was some phone service after the storm, we didn't have to handle as much health and welfare traffic as after Hugo. I think we only passed about 200 messages from here, and I expect it was about the same for the other hams.

Meanwhile, recovery goes on slowly—too slowly. It has been almost three weeks now (written on October 3), and it appears that it will be many more before we see power again.

Many decisions will have to be made in the coming months. Many people will decide to leave, many to stay. We too, must decide. We came through fine, but do we want to do this again? The aftermath is what gets you down. Time will tell.

June 21st was the start of a life-long dream I never expected would be a reality. Three Franciscans, Sisters Regina, Alice, and myself, loaded our green Mercury with food and clothing for the month. Of course, the two radios, HF and VHF, were already in place. Our journey took us up the Alaskan Highway, through the rugged country of the Northwest Territory, into the state of Alaska, down through the inner passage via ferry to Prince Rupert and east through Jasper, Lake Louise, and back home.

Lots of planning assured us of a place to stay, as well as a way to be contacted by folks back home. Daily we prayed for divine protection, knowing our guardian angels would need to be on watch 24 hours a day. We were not so naive to think we could safely travel 12,000 miles without heavenly assistance!

The first big stop was the International Peace Gardens—two different countries working toward peace. It made me feel proud to see the flags flying together this way. It brought a tear of joy!

As a mobile station, I listened a lot and transmitted less frequently, because it was Field Day weekend. You can imagine my pleasure to hear KOLTC, the Robbinsdale radio club station. When the operator repeated my call slowly, "WA0SGH/VE6," his voice was much louder as he said, "Hey, it's Sister Alverna!" to the folks in earshot. Later I contacted the Albert Lea station NOLDT with similar results. It was great fun!

Two lovely days were spent with friends in Fairview, Alberta, with VE6FAK, Alan and Sandy Kreutzer. We toured the city, learning a lot about the early settlers as well as the people now living there. We really enjoyed their wonderful strawberry patch. Sandy gave us a large plastic container full to enjoy while traveling.

Early Monday morning we left for Fort St. Johns where we met HANDI-HAM VE7EQO, Vinny, and Armony Samarco at the Shepherds Inn. We feasted on warm freshly-baked breads and coffee: There was lots of news to catch up on and so little time. We had a good hour to visit before it seemed wise to get back on the highway. Travel was uncertain—300 miles can be a long drive when roads are poor. Gratefully, they're in good condition, a nice surprise!

The early risers left Ft. Nelson feeling refreshed. Soon road construction began to hamper travels. There was loose gravel and rocks. One fellow needed to replace his gas tank, another the windshield. We arrived in Watson Lake, tired but safe. After dinner we felt refreshed. That evening we posted our sign at the famous historical sign post forest. We checked out many of the 20,000 there already. Awesome!

Preparing to leave the motel the next morning, Sister Alice was

checking the car when a fellow came over and asked her, "Are you a ham?" "No, but she is a pro."

Glancing at me, he said, "I'm KOOUX." I replied, "I'm WAOSGJ." "I thought you were Sister Alverna!"

Vic and a friend had driven their Harley Davidsons up the same road we did the day before and were able to exchange stories. He had been up the Alaskan Highway a couple of times so nothing surprised him.

Band conditions in Northern British Columbia and the Yukon were very poor. I heard few stations during this time, but then out of nowhere KL7AM came through 5-9. He told me that his name was Bob, age 87, and that he was in Fairbanks. I told him we would be staying in Fairbanks that night. "Call me when you get to Fairbanks!" he said.

When I had not called him by 10:00 a.m. the following morning, he called us at the motel. He had spoken to his wife Louisa and they wanted us to have dinner at their home. Bob and Louisa (WL7BNX) Hisamoto were delightful. Seven of their 15 children have amateur licenses! As we became better acquainted I remembered meeting him some 12 years ago in Cedar Rapids, lowa, at the ARRL National Convention where he was the banquet speaker. Bob is a physicist and still enjoys stretching his mind during weekly seminars on "Creative Thinking" he conducts at his home. He tells those present, "I want to stimulate your thinking to benefit you." It was 10:30 p.m. before we knew it. Louisa drove us back to the hotel.

Though it was late, arrangements had been made to see HANDI-HAM members Lee and Mike Rice, NL7YD and KL7YV. Apologetically, I introduced myself to Mike as he came to the door. He assured us that is the way things are done in Alaska. People do anything when it is light, even if it is 11:00 p.m. They showed us Fairbanks. Mike told us interesting bits about the city; we saw the pipeline; permafrost holes; homes that were tipping due to the permafrost, and the university where they are students. The local spring has wonderful water so we came home with a gallon.

Denali Park was lovely! I was disappointed I did not see a bear up close. There were smaller animals.

We stopped at the Trapper Creek General Store for directions. When the storekeeper saw our car he said, "You better stay here! You will never make it. That's deep in the bush!"

"Well, we came all the way up the Alaskan Highway just fine," I said.

"You will never make it."

"Oh, sure we will," I said, confidently.

"In THAT?" he said, pointing to our Mercury Tracer. "And where are your MEN?"

But we pressed on, dodging monster potholes, the likes of which we hadn't seen...even in Minnesota, and we made it! McKinley Foothills B&B

was home for two nights. HANDI-HAM member Vilma, NL7YK, and Bob Anderson own three cabins nestled in the bush country near Trapper Creek. They generate their own electricity, fish for King Salmon in the river—life is simple and hard in this quite out-of-the way place. It would be hard to get someone to come fix things that need repair or replacement. As Vilma said, "We don't toss anything out, it is recycled. There is always someone that needs what we don't use."

Patricia Daft, AL7PF, lives in Willow with her wonderful dog who enjoys walking along the gravel roads, pulling Pat's wheelchair. They make a great team. I expressed concern for her safety out in the forest. She said, "It's better than where I came from back East. I have good neighbors." We saw that to be true as we walked—the road crews all greeted her, asking if she needed anything.

In Haines, we visited with HANDI-HAM member Paul Fitzpatrick, AL7CI. He met us at the Chilkat Bakery where we visited and ate a second breakfast, then it was off to the ferry by 10:30. Juneau was our next stop—the only access was by water.

Juneau, the capital of Alaska, has a population of 26,800 and is a beautiful, well-kept city on the waterway. Saturday evening after Mass, the priest invited all the visitors to stand up and tell where they were from. "We are three Franciscan Sisters from Rochester, Minnesota," said Sister Alice,

From behind me a fellow stood up and said, "I know that Sister. She is from Iona, Minnesota."

Sister Alice looked puzzled and said, "Who are you?"

"Victor Voss, Joe's son. We went to school together."

Once she confirmed that they did in fact know each other, Vic said, "lona is a town of 300 people in southwestern Minnesota. We attended the same Catholic school." Everyone clapped. After a short visit, we agreed to have breakfast at their house at 8:00 a.m. There was lots to say. One of the most interesting questions was, "What do you do way up here?"

"I'm the Treasurer for the state of Alaska." So ends the saga of this most memorable visit to Alaska's capital.

Our trip down the waterway was lovely and informative. There were forest rangers on the ferry giving informative sessions about sea life, glaciers, and the people who make their living on the water. It was not until we got to Jasper, B.C., that we saw a plentiful number of animals. They were so tame they walked along next to our car.

We all agreed the trip was enhanced greatly by being able to talk with people around the world. Contacts with W0ZSW, the HANDI-HAM Headquarters, were always a joy. All of us take every chance we have to share what we have seen. It was a near perfect trip.

Eila Russell, WA8EBS—Persona Extraordinaire

Eila Davis was a legal secretary. Jim Russell, W8BU, was a young lawyer. They married September 15, 1922, and moved to Fairview Park, Ohio, in the early '30s.

Eila wanted Fairview Park to remain one of the best school systems in the westside suburbs of Cleveland. She served on the Board of Education for 20 years and was a trustee of the Ohio School Board Association, speaking on panels and serving as moderator at national board association conventions. She was a member of the city's Recreation Board for 12 years, serving as President and then Secretary.

Eila joined the Fairview Community Church, where she became a contralto soloist, choir director, and President of the Women's Association. In 1957, she was Fairview Park's Citizen of the Year.

The family had a cottage on Kelly's Island, where Eila and Jim were host to friends and family during the summers. The garden at 4348 West 223rd also needed attention. Watering and weeding was done by the family, and when harvest time came, Eila was canning tomatoes, beans, peppers, and whatever else they had grown. Her larder was well-supplied for the fall and winter so she could entertain economically! Eila was proud of her domestic activities and skills.

In 1962, Eila decided to join Jim in his Amateur Radio endeavors and earned the callsign WA8EBS. She immediately became involved with the women's activities and joined The Chixon-Six, the Buckeye Belles, YLRL, and several local radio clubs.

In 1973, Eila was elected Vice-President of YLRL and later served two terms as President, in 1974 and 1978. She was responsible for the YLRL Scholarship Program, even though it was in the idea stage for some time, and it was through her untiring efforts that YLRL's non-profit status was finally granted.

The Continuous Membership Program of the Buckeye Belles was instigated by Eila, and she has been President of The Chix and the Buckeye Belles numerous times throughout the years.

In September, 1992, Mayor Karl Kubb issued a proclamation in recognition of Eila's and Jim's 70th wedding anniversary. During the last few years when Eila's health suffered, she still attended the meetings of the Chix and Belles whenever she was able, including a Chix meeting in April, 1995, in Cleveland Heights.

At age 94, on August 12, 1995, Eila went to sleep peacefully after having visited with Jim and other family members. She was a very special person, and we are grateful for knowing her.

WRONE had three gatherings in 1995. In May, the Spring Luncheon was held in Pembroke, Massachusetts. It was well-attended and a great time was had by all. In August, a Family Picnic was held at Otter River State Park, in Baldwinville, Massachusetts. Those who were able to attend had such a wonderful time that another is planned for '96. 
