Valley Sierra Nevada WSP yL Net Beth Murphy, KD6CDR

A YL net is a great opportunity for women in Amateur Radio to get to know other women in an atmosphere of camaraderie and common interest. The Valley Sierra Nevada WSP YL Net doesn't ask ladies to talk about the newest ham radio equipment they just bought or how much power they are running. They ask what their favorite restaurants are, who their favorite singer is or what their favorite quick recipe might be. Discussions are held about favorite pets, hobbies and vacation ideas, and the ladies participate with interest and enthusiasm. Great ideas are passed around and everyone benefits from the exchanges. After the ladies are finished checking in and discussing the evenings' topic, the gentlemen have a chance to add their comments or just say hi. The support they give to the ladies in Ham Radio is overwhelming and much appreciated by all.

It all started with Claire White, WB6WSP who wanted more women to continue their Amateur Radio education while talking on the radio. She wanted to educate them on the public service aspect of ham radio, as well as provide a pool of YLs who could assist with emergency communications if needed. Claire had inspired YLs to become active on the radio and was always available to answer questions. She died of cancer in July of 1991.

On September 5, 1991, the Valley Sierra WSP YL Net was started by a group of Tuolomne County Amateur Radio Emergency Services (T Cares) women in the Tuolomne and surrounding areas. The net was named in Claire's honor for all of her support of women in Amateur Radio.

The YL net is held every

Thursday evening at 7:30 p.m. and all women are automatically members of the net when they check in. The net was heard only on the W6FEJ repeater in Tuolomne County on 147.945 until Chris Huber, N6ICW set up a link with his repeater in Sacramento on 147.195 in November of 1991. Since that time, over 400 women have checked into the YL net and new members are added every week. The net was switched over to the River City ARCS repeater in 1993 and can be heard on 145.250, and is still linked to the W6FEJ repeater. In 1994, a link was established with Nevada on the WA7RPS repeater, 147.150 on Mt. Rose, which is linked to the

Reno-Sparks repeater on 147.210, At that time the WSP Net was renamed the Valley Sierra Nevada WSP YL Net, expanding the participating and listening audience by a wide margin. With links to the ARCS 441.600 repeater, the YL net can be heard from San Francisco to Nevada City, and from Chico all the way to Fresno. Net controls for the WSP YL Net have ranged from ladies in the Tuolomne area to Contra Costa, Placerville and Sacramento Counties.

In 1992, an idea was born to have remote nets in various places in Northern California. The first remote net was held on September 19 at Rusch Park in Citrus Heights, with 58 hams and family members attending. Equipment set-up was done with the help of organizer Patrick Schamun. KC6ZEA who offered to provide equipment and service for future remote nets. With his and assistance from other hams, it has expanded to pizza parlors, fellow ham houses in Meadow Vista, Auburn, Carmichael, Folsom and Sacramento; to more restaurants, more parks and radio businesses. It has even been done in Lake Tahoe and Sonora.

Plans are being made to go to Hagen Park in Rancho Cordova on April 24 to ride the Sacramento Valley Live Steamers scale model trains while doing the net. Other remote nets have been planned, including setting up equipment and transmitting while riding on boats on the river, and introducing ham radio to senior citizens in skilled nursing facilities. Ideas have been ongoing and the excitement that is still generated with each new remote net is contagious. Meeting hams face to face for the first time after talking on the radio has resulted in many long lasting friendships. The interest has not waned in many years and will continue on in to the future. so long as there are net controls, frequencies, equipment and hams who check in to the Valley Sierra Nevada WSP YL Net.



DEBBY DOES DAYTON

Last year I went to the Dayton Hamvention for the first time. This year was a return engagement for me, and I took Ralph, N7KGA, for his first taste of hamdom's biggest gathering. Every licensed amateur should go to Dayton at least twice. The first year should be a scouting expedition, just to get the lay of the land. It is so big, it is overwhelming. By the second trip you will have a vague idea of where to go and what to do. Last year I just bought an airline ticket and went. I flew to Columbus, Ohio and rented a car to drive to Dayton. This year we paid a very nice bargain Hamvention special fare and flew directly to Dayton. Last year I stayed in a fleabag motel by 1-70. This year we stayed at the Crowne Plaza hotel right in downtown Dayton, which is the hub of the Hamvention social activities.

We flew to Dayton by way of Saint Louis, where we encountered our first other hams headed for Ham Mecca. Ralph spotted a handheld in an open briefcase and suggested that it was time for us to put on our callsign nametags. There we met Bill Tynan, W3X0, president of AMSAT. There were many other hams here also and we began to receive all sorts of invitations for various social activities. By the way, the St. Louis Airport Deli has very good sandwiches, but, alas, no lattes. (Sigh)

When we landed in Dayton, we could actually hear the rain pounding on the skin of the aircraft. At least % inch of water was standing on the runway. One of the Midwest's famed thunderstorms had just passed through. The rest of Hamvention's weekend weather gradually improved. In comparison, last year it was really hot.

We picked up our rental car at the Dayton Airport and headed for the hotel. Upon arriving at the Crowne Plaza, we were a little concerned to find a Ryder Rental Truck parked in front of the hotel. Access to the Crowne Plaza is a little confusing; it is on the east side of the hotel on Jefferson Street, which is one-way northbound.

The Chinese restaurant to the east of the Dayton Convention Center is very good. Their Wonton soup is wonderful, and their jasmine tea has just the right touch of smokey flavor.

We had allowed an extra day to take in some local sights. We quickly discovered that Ralph's 35 year old memories of the area were inadequate for navigation. He was able to get us within about 7 miles of his old alma mater, Antioch College, but he finally had to go against his male inclinations and asked for directions from a local gentleman. The purchase of a current map helped ease further explorations.

There is a McDonald's in Dayton which need have no fear of ever being successfully charged with the crime of being a "fast food restaurant."

When one little girl waiting in the line was carried out by her mother, another patron waiting in line also explained that it was because the little girl was starving to death. We do offer one recommendation: Stick to the Hamvention fleamarket bratwursts.

Up in our hotel room we put up a flexible J-pole antenna in our third floor window which greatly helped with access to the local repeaters. Ralph was surprised when with his handheld and this antenna, he doubled with a net control station, and won!

One of the Hamvention traditions which is really fun is that hams staying at the hotel tape their QSL cards on their room doors. We learned that we were staying in the room next to John Devoldere, ON4UN, famed Low Band DX'erand VKOIR DXpedition Pilot Station. Down the hall was W4MPY, the QSL card man. For some strange reason, possibly evil spirits, our cards kept wandering around on ourdoor, to other doors down the hall, and even disappeared entirely a couple of times, only to mysteriously reappear later.

We also visited the US Air Force Museum on Wright-Patterson Air Force Base northeast of Dayton. This took most of a day for us. It has a tremendous collection of aviation memorabilia from the Wright Brothers (their bicycle shop was in Dayton) to the space age. In the collection is some of my grandfather's WW-1 memorabilia. We got to see one of his

dress uniforms and were allowed to touch it while wearing white cotton gloves. They are careful to avoid having even minor amounts of perspiration and body chemicals come into contact with the artifacts. Many of the items are so fragile due to their age that they cannot be cleaned without possibly causing further damage.

The US Air Force Museum is also one of the places to park your car and catch one of the free shuttle busses to the Hara Arena, site of the Dayton Ham-

vention itself. Other park-and-ride places include one at the Dayton Airport and two local shopping centers. There is limited paid parking space close to the Hara Arena.

Hamvention weekend lasts three days; Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. This is barely adequate to see it all. I have not yet had time to go to any of the seminars. This year I set out to see the entire 3000 plus stalls in the flea market area. Ralph set out to see the five ballrooms filled with vendor's

indoor displays.

Friday evening we attended the DX Dinner. There are several specialty banquets held over the weekend for all sorts of ham radio interests. The main Hamvention Banquet takes place Saturday night. At the DX Dinner one of the hams at our table came from Bulgaria and just happened to be the designer of the ETO 91B HF amplifier. I salivated appropriately.

After the DX Dinner we attended a reception for the VKOIR crew. I purchased a copy of their book and acquired the autographs of 18 of the operators and 4 of the pilot stations for the VKOIR DXpedition. Ralph wanted to get a copy of their Participant's Handbook as a reference to help us plan our own DXpedition to Orcas Island, NA-065, for the Islands-On-The-Air contest in July this summer. Alas, by then our discretionary cash fund was getting low, and we still had to plan forgetting back to Washington.

One of the booths I wanted to see on the inside was the YLRL and **Buckeye Belles** booth. When I found the booth, the YLs were having their photographs taken together by their various OMs. The Buckeye Belles have ceased giving out their famed buckeyes as of this year. Seems that last year someone tried to eat one . . .

Hamvention on Sunday afternoon, I had managed to see all of the flea market area plus the indoor displays. Ralph realized that he could have stocked up with a year's worth of spare parts, but, alas, once again, all that is required is an unlimited amount of cash. And then there is the problem of getting it home. UPS had a shipping booth right at the arena in the East end. We also saw many treasures being carried on the plane towards home. Ralph purchased a used Icom IC-735 to compliment the one I bought at Dayton last year. He also purchased a NorCal 38 Special QRP rig kit, and he picked up about 40 pounds of literature to read through.

Just before the final Grand Prize Drawing in the Main Arena, I finally ran into Barbara, N8EYW. She had taken the year off from being on any Hamvention Committees. She was just enjoying the show this year. None

of us won any of the fabulous prizes.

As we were leaving the Hamvention, the clouds were building and the wind was rising. We picked up our car from the USAF Museum parking lot for the last time and headed for the airport. Just as we started, the rain began, the wind came, and the local SkyWarn weather system was activated on the repeater. The flight back to Saint Louis was uneventful. The fun began after we landed in Saint Louis. We had a long trek toting our luggage and treasures from the gate where we landed to the gate for our flight on to Seattle. It was good exercise. We did stop at that deli for one more of those sandwiches.

Once we did get into the air, the pilot announced that we would be making a slight detour to the South to avoid a long weather front with several violent thunder storms. Later, when the lights below and on the right side of the airplane were identified as those of Oklahoma City, we knew we had really strayed quite a way to the South!

This line of thunder storms to the North was spectacular. Some of the cumulonimbus clouds were continually lit by multicolored lightning bolts. We looked in vain for the recently described red sprites and blue jets; these are discharges going upward from the cloud tops to the ionosphere. I am sure that some of the other passengers wondered what we were doing, huddled under Ralph's coat to keep out the light from the cabin interior, and our noses pressed against the window. Last year, while on the way to Dayton on the red-eye special flight, I did get to watch the Northern Lights all the way across the country.

Let's see ... next year I'll do the entire flea market first because some of the vendors pack up and go home after they have sold out their stuff. Maybe I'll go to a seminar or two. I think I'll try the Contester's Banquet. One thing I am sure of—I'll have the pleasure of seeing and meeting a large number of folks from all over the world; members of that fascinating fellowship of hams.

WOMEN IN AMATEUR RADIO

PARTONE

Linda Reeder, N7HVF

Editor's Note: This is the first of several parts of the serialization of a documentary that Linda Reeder wrote and recorded several years ago. I was particularly moved while transcribing this, since Ethel Smith, K4LMB passed away a few days after I began this project.

Salt Lake City, Utah: I am an Amateur Radio Operator. I have my Extra class license. I am totally blind and have been active in Amateur Radio for nine years. I am featuring women in Amateur Radio. Amatuer Radio, or ham radio, is a way of communicating around the world using Morse code, voice, RTTY, computers and video. The FCC allocates certain frequencies for licensed amateurs to use for personal communications, emergency, public service or just having fun. It has been said that Amateur Radio is a man's hobby. However, women have been active in Amateur Radio since the early 1900s.

Ethel Smith, K4LMB: "In fact, I'll go back to Liz Andonini, W3CDQ who is now a silent key. But she was actually teaching code to the people recovering from injuries in the war there and whatnot in 1917. She got her first license in 1922."

During the war, women in Amateur Radio provided a valuable service.

Ethel Smith, K4LMB: "Lenore Jenson was particularly active, providing the communications to and from overseas to the service people. I've forgotten how many thousands of messages Lenora handled. A lot of other people were involved in that, too. May Burke, W3CUL and so many more. But that was one of the great services that they were able to conduct there during the war period. Their stations were available to the service people there. They would line up, in fact I think sometimes made appointments days in advance in order to get their turn at the transmitter there. Then that would be relayed to other radio stations here in the United States and probably make two or three hops before it got into the local locality where the Amateur then would call the family and pass on the message. It was very efficient, even with all of these hops. It was usually done within a day or two, though. And then they would try to get a message back from the family to the service man. So many of them said that was the thing that kept them going during the war, being able to have that contact at home. Of course the regular telephone lines and whatnot were impossible, but this was a means that was open to them, thanks to Amateur Radio."

Back then, the main way of communicating in ham radio was Morse code. It wasn't like today, where there are so many modes to choose from.

Marcella Stephenhagen, KBODDP of Foley, Minnesota, enjoys sending messages by voice.

Marcella Stephenhagen, KBODDP: "My greatest enjoyment is to talk to Bolivia and talk to a missionary down there. He's all solar powered. It gives you a thrill when you can phone patch someone like that into their parents in the same town that you live in."

Ethel Smith, K4LMB, who we heard from earlier, started a women's radio club, YLRL, in 1939.

Ethel Smith, K4LMB: "As far as women in radio, of course we were fairly few and far between in the early days. In 1939, there was an ad in QST for the book 200 meters and Down and it showed us that heaven only knew how many YLs there were and they wouldn't tell. So of course, I wrote back and said heaven only knew how many YLs there were but I thought they would tell and asked them to write to me. Actually, all I had in mind at the time was kind of getting a list, a directory together and circulating that so we would at least know who the other YLs were. But then, Enid Carter, W9NBX I think was her call at that time and Anita Bean, W8TAY, (I hope I'm right on these calls) kind of picked up and got started on a constitution and by-laws and whatnot and we found enough YLs throughout the country to get district chairmen for the different districts, all nine of them, that existed in those days. The thing took off real good. Within a matter of months I think, we had about 150

YLs. And it went on happily from there. Enid Caldwell started the magazine and they named it Harmonics and we came up with our emblem and all that sort of thing. So by the time that the war came along, everything was going great. And then of course, Amateur Radio was off the air and everybody scattered to the four corners of the earth. But


Anita, in particular, kept the Harmonics throughout the war there, kept sending newsletters to all of the members that she continued to have addresses for. By the time that the war was over, YLRL was up and going strong. So we now have been hovering around 1500 members for most of the time since then I guess. It really is a great organization. We have our conventions about every three or four years. It's just a matter of encouraging YLs and letting them know that it wasn't strictly a man's hobby, that we did have a place in it."

As I write this, I am experiencing a very stressful time. Our proposed Alaska trip has been canceled because of my OM Andy's health problems. The same day as the Jerral storm, several areas from Waco south along 1-35 to Austin had Class 1 funnels that did a lot of damage. One touched down just a mile from our house and took out two nice homes. Thankfully, we had no damage. You cannot believe the donations that have arrived for the Jerral area. Clothing and non-perishable food items donated have filled a large school and a large church. Officials have asked people to stop sending those things because there is no place to put them."

Alma continues, "There is still a great need for money, and wire and posts for pastures and fields. Actor Paul Newman gave 23,280 jars of Newman Spaghetti Sauce, 1,800 bottles of salad dressing, 63,300 packages of spaghetti, and 23,040 heads of lettuce. What do you do with all those items? The lettuce was taken to the Austin Farmers Market and sold, with money going to the Jerral Fund. All the otherthings were placed in Austin food banks, so other people can share in these donations. I like that idea."

We are proud of all our radio amateurs who have spent many long hours working in these and other emergencies and passing traffic to anxious friends and relatives.

Plans are currently being formulated for the TYLRUN Annual Birthday Party, which, we understand, will be in Denton, TX this year.



It was Easter 1995 and I had been asked to go to Romania by some Romanians who had visited my school and seen me teaching severely handicapped children. They had planted the seed in my mind the autumn before: my husband had been driving in a convoy for the previous two years, the girls were of college age, so why shouldn't I go? I would dedicate eight days to visiting various institutions in northeast Romania, and would include home visits, as well as holding seminars for teachers and workers, as there is little teacher training organized since the revolution of 1989-not long in which to organize an education system which prior to that had not recognized handicapped children and orphans. My flight was sponsored by the King's School, Rochester and through my traveling arrangements had been seen to by the group, we were working for, I had been given the address of an FOC member who lived in Bucuresti and I decided to take up the offer and unwind at the end of my tour of duty. (FOC is a club for the 500 top CW keyers in the world.

D-Day for my OM arrived and chaos reigned as I was trying to get myself organized as well. He would be traveling each way for three to four days, with only a short time in between for delivering and unloading the goods: over 3000 miles round trip in ten days. The following day, it was my turn and my driver was kept waiting for two hours while I tried to come to grips with my own chaos. I had decided to stay in Earl's Court that night, so as to be within easy traveling distance from Heathrow. I set up my half wave co-linear on a biscuit tin lid and switched on my FT290R with its 2.5w. Quite by chance, Dorreen - G0MTL in Grays, Essex picked up my signal. It was Dorreen who had encouraged me to join BYLARA and I felt this was a good omen. However, after a good night's sleep, I realized I had left my single reflex camera in the car and I had bought that camera especially for the journey. My daughter had to go all the way to Sidcup from Rochester, pick up the camera and then meet me at Heathrow in time for my flight. A long-standing friend of mine, Susan, who works at the airport.

ushered me through customs and on to the plane for my first-ever flight and then waved me good-bye, I suspect with a sigh of relief. The flight took place only one week afterthe TARO air crash at Bucuresti Airport and my confidence was not enhanced by the sight of an air hostess crossing herself as we took off. I took videos and audio cassettes to record my experiences and must have taken a photograph of every cloud formation. It was daylight, but the moon above made me feel as if I were on a space journey. As we flew over the snow-capped Transylvanian Mountains, I began to wonder whether I should have taken some garlic with me, flying as I was into the unknown.

It was sunset as we landed at Bucuresti. Broken planes lay strewn along the runway, but I had made it. Inside I was met by a small reception

committee and presented with three red tulips and gypsophilia, while having my hand kissed by perfect strangers. Apparently this is the custom and I do miss it! I then had a five hour journey to the northeast, not that far from the Russian border. and spent the night in a hotel. The following day, the driver took me further for another one and a half hours into a snow-clad valley. I asked him if he would mind if I put my

mag-mount on his Dacia roof. I didn't know the Romanian for that particular phrase, but he seemed to understand. He drove through the villages as if he were a member of the old Securitate and was just approaching 60 mph when the aerial dropped of in quite a spectacular way. That made me doubt the metallic content of the whole car and also deflated my driver's ego.

The town of Onesti was to my HQ while I stayed with a family. The two sisters there had given up their careers to found a day centre for children called 'Bless the Children' and they hoped to expand it and make it a centre of excellence for other centres and schools, with outside assistance, while building closer links with the emerging Romanian Government agencies. The two sisters acted as my interpreters and I spent time getting to know the children and the problems faced by the teachers and caregivers. The ages ranged from infants to teenagers. There were mental and physical handicaps, but also some bright children who spoke English, but who

had been denied a place in mainstream education because of slight physical imperfections. The teachers employed by the Government used formal methods.. wore suits and high heels and could not understand why the children found it difficult to write, for instance, I introduced them to task analysis, breaking learning into tiny stops; could the children actually hold a pen and did they realize the teacher was there at all? I introduced learning through play and dance and soon everyone was walking about in tracksuits and trainers and relaxing with the children, even a teacher who had worn mourning black for the best part of the year. One of the boys there was obviously used to ruling the roost and I showed, by example, behavior management strategies to bring him back into the fold. I was introduced to Valentin, the driver of the minibus which had been donated. A further hand-kissing session, and then we set off to fetch a teenager who had not wanted to come to school that day. A musical box put together by David, G4VFQ did the trick of soothing the troubled brow and luring him back to the centre. A teddy bear given by Colin, G3VTT had had Velcro sewn on the back and I demonstrated how that bear and similar toys could be attached to clothing, enabling children who cannot hold toys the pleasure of feeling that toy close by.

The three days of seminars for the adults covered topics such as physiotherapy, speech therapy, the three Rs, sexual development, dealing with parents' problems and behavior management. I had to be ready for whatever would be fired at me as this was the first time they had had someone to ask. Valentin had a problem: namely the particularly difficult boy, Silvio, who did not want to get off at the stop he should be getting off at, but who preferred another one. What could be done? I established there was no bus escort nor anyone to meet Silvio and I couldn't advocate just pushing him off the bus. It was time for everyone to take a united stance in dealing with this child, for his own sake. Valentin was to take Silvio to the appointed drop-off place, switch of his en-

gine and wait for Silvio to leave the bus. It might take an hour or two and Valentin could bring some sandwiches (not for Silvio!), but they had to call Silvio's bluff or suffer the consequences. There were to be no words spoken after the initial instruction to leave the bus nor any further eye contact. I could tell by looking at my audience that this method had never been considered. I wonder if Valentin is still waiting??
