Dues are \$8.00 a year, due and payable March 1, and delinquent March 31. For new and reinstating members joining after August 31, dues are prorated by half the annual dues for that fiscal year.

Add \$4.00 for first class postage, if desired, in the U.S.; it is required for Canada and Mexico. Add \$8.00 for air mail for all other DX.

Dues for a licensed YL family member (residing at the same address) are \$2.00. Subscriptions for nonmembers are \$8.00 per year and may not be pro-rated for portions of years. Subscribers may add the same extra postage, if first class or air mail service is desired.

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The President's Hello

Hello everyone and Happy New Year! I am looking forward to the next two years. I had a lot of fun being vice president and overseeing all the YL contests. Now I am looking forward to being your President.

I would really like to see YLRL membership increase. According to the latest estimate, I believe there are about 1500 YLRL members. I think it would be real cool for YLRL to reach the 2000 member mark in time for our 60th Anniversary, with a special prize going to member 2000. Doris, K5BNQ told me she was president when YLRL hit the 1000 member mark and that was in 1961. I believe with more ladies getting into amateur radio we can reach that goal. The ladies would really benefit from joining YLRL.

Now to help us reach the 2000 mark, we need to make it easier for YLs to find about YLRL. One way we can do this is to make sure there is a local YL club (official or unofficial) in each of the 10 US call districts, Alaska, Hawaii and in the DXYL countries to tell them about YLRL. I have received input about YLs clubs in all the US call areas except district 5, 9, Alaska and Hawaii. Internationally, I know of YL clubs or organization in Canada, Germany, England, Australia, New Zealand, Belgium, Japan and Italy. So ladies, I am asking for your help here. Send me info about your YL club (title and location) along with a contact person. I will try to list as many of the different YL clubs and organization that I get in the next issue of YLH.

Now, in order for YLRL to grow, we need more YLs and to get more YLs, we need to tell them about YLRL. To make that easier to do, we need a flyer. Well, if you go to the last page of the directory issue of YLH . .. TADA! . . . there it is! I would like everyone to make ten copies of this tri-fold flyer and pass it out to newly licensed YLs orthose YLs who are not yet a member of YLRL. Be sure to put your name, call sign and phone number for them to contact you, or list the receiving treasurer for your area.

The sunspots are back! Now there is now one less excuse for not participating in the YL contests. I have seen an increase in contest participation and that's great. As was mentioned in the directory issue, the board members were in the process of voting on several proposed changes to the contests. These changes were not included in the directory issue contest listing since we hadn't complete the voting process. The voting is now over and all the proposed changes passed. Several of these changes were based on input I received from those YLs who participated in the contests. Here is summary of what was decided:

- 1) Allow 6m and RTTY contacts for all contests.
- Allow 2m SSB, CWand FM simplex forthe Novice/Tech contest.
- Modify the "operation" section of each contest to make them consistent.

- 4) Remove the penalty for duplicate contact. (Based on the paperwork I have, only the YL-OM contest, lists this penalty.)
- 5) Modify the "log" section of each contest to correspond to, or be more consistent with, the "exchange" section.
- 6) Have all the YL contests occur over a weekend period, either Friday through Sudnay or Saturday through Monday 'provided' there is not a major contest occurring that weekend.

Lastly, I have been keeping in contact with people via email and packet. I have created a distribution list of ladies who are on the internet and have been regularly sending out email to them. If you haven't received my emails, email me at any of the addresses listed below. I get on packet about once a month and am trying to get on more often to read the YL messages. I am also active on HF, RTTY and now, CW. I made my first CW contact in December and I am willing to set up a schedule with YLs. So if you need to get a hold of me, you have a lot of options. Well, that is enough for now, and don't forget to let me know what you think of my ideas or drop me a line just to "hello".

A Letter to Your XYL

Are you a male ham, eternally wishing your wife or girlfriend would share your exciting hobby? Let a proud female ham who was once in your lady's shoes do the convincing for you.

DearOM.

The following is an open letter to yourXYL. It's my experience-still fresh as I write-of becoming a ham after years of disinterest. I'm still not over the surprise! If it encourages just one XYL like me to take a Novice class, it will have served its purpose.

Dear XYL (Ex-Young-Lady),

That's what they call us, you know, these ham-husbands of ours. But before you take offense, be aware that he's your"OM"- Old Man; feel free to call him that. Anyway, if anyone had told me a few months ago that I would (A) be a ham and (B) enjoy being a ham, I'd have suggested a long walk off a short pier.

For seven years, my OM, Bill, N41TE, had suggested wistfully that III ought to try it" or that he'd "like it if I were a ham, too." Because he has one of those minds that can joyfully muck around in picofarads and milliamps and 3-element beams, and I need ON-OFF printed on the kitchen light switch to feel comfortable around electricity, I knew that even if I tried, I could never be a ham. I already couldn't understand half the words in the conversations I overheard on his hand-held transceiver (the little radio with the stubby antenna he carries everywhere; you know the one). And I didn't want to understand. I had no interest in ham radio. Zip. Zero. Nada.

Nothing changed, but one day I finally ran out of excuses: "The kids are too young" (the boys are 22,19,17 and 13 now, and two of them are hams); "The cost is too high" (the Southern Maryland Amateur Radio Club's course was free); "I'll never understand it!" (So what? The basics can be picked up on faith and memorization, and I can take and retake any test until I pass.) I was out of excuses, and I still had no interest whatsoever in ham radio. But I have a strong interest in my OM, even in our 25th year of marriage. As a former officer in the US Marine Corps, wistfulness doesn't come often from him. Yet, it was there, even after seven years of hitting a blank wall with me (that wistfulness is in yourOM's voice. I hear it almost everyday: "Oh gosh, I wish my XYL would.... ""I hope yourOM knows how lucky he is. ... "I've tried for 15 years. ...")

So, I decided I'd let him take me to the first session of a 10-week Novice course. There, my worst fears were realized. I'd have to master Morse code and pass a code test. Then I'd have to take a written test. Most of the students were men who already spoke an electronic language I couldn't grasp (and still can't, by and large), even though they weren't hams yet. But

one look at my OM's barely masked joy at having his XYL there prompted me to do my best. I gritted my teeth and plowed into it.

In spite of our cheerful and knowledgeable instructors (Lee, KF3T; Vic, WA3YVV; Mike, K07V), I didn't enjoy those Monday nights-except for the new friends we began to make. I was tense, frustrated and asked dumb questions ("Well, what/s a radio wave? I still don't see what you mean..."). I struggled with Morse code (I kept hearing "A" for "N" and I lost the whole last part of the alphabet somewhere). But one glance at Bin's happy face kept me going. Fortunately, he was almost always able to clarify, at least partly, whatever eluded me in class.

I practiced code at home for about 30 minutes every day. I recorded the code sessions at class and used the ARRL training tapes. After all, I wanted to give Mr Morse a fair chance at my middle-aged brain. I read chapter after chapterin the manual and I understood about every 20th word, usually "and," "the" or "when."

Suddenly, one Monday night after the code practice session, I was informed that I had passed my 5 WPM requirement (in Morse code, a combination of 25 letters and numbers in 60 seconds works out to just about five words per minute)-that part of my Novice test was behind me! I was stunned. Only then did I understand what the instructors had meant about the code requirements: I had two chances to pass. After copying code for five minutes

or more (a made-up "QSO," or conversation between two hams), I could then have correctly answered seven out of 10 questions based on my copying ("Who is sending this?" "How high is his antenna?" "What is the weather there?") or-andthis was my ticket to a ticket-the examiners could go over my paper and count the correct letters and numbers I'd copied. If I had 25 characters in a row correct anywhere on the paper, it meant I'd 4 1 copied solid" for one minute and I would pass. I'd done it! Somewhere in my spastic code copying, I had written down-or filled in the blanks

correctly afterward on partially copied words (that's perfectly legal)-25 characters in a row correctly. The worst was over. I had passed the code test. I was floored.

A few weeks later, I had memorized enough of the information (or actual answers-the whole current question-and answer pool is in the study manual) to answer 22 of 30 multiple-choice radio-rules and basic electronics questions correctly. Suddenly, it was all over. I was a Novice Amateur Radio

operator. It was unbelievable-1 was in shock. My husband was as proud as a fan-tailed peacock.

During the six-week wait for my "ticket" (an FCC license with my call sign on it) to arrive, I still had no overriding interest in using it. As a Novice, I would not be permitted to talk to my OM via the 2-meter FM repeater (a

station that receives radio waves and sends them back out so hams everywhere in the area can talk as they inch to and from work). To use 2-meter FM repeaters, I'd have to have a Technician class (next step up) license. No way. I'd survived my Novice class and that was enough. Alas, we had no other radio I could use and the

budget was strapped, to say the least. On the way back from my first hamfest, when my husband asked how I felt about being a ham (and here's a ham radio joke-get your OM to "plain it), I told him that my whole ham experience so farseemed to be "all pain and no gain!"

When the license came, informing me that I was KA3VNK, it was just a nice token of a way to please my husband. But a couple of weeks later, Bill saw an ad for a used 10-meter transceiver (the radio is not that big: 10 meters refers to the length of the radio-frequency waves it sends and receives). It was only a bit more than \$ 1 00, so he sold an old receiver and we bought it. For \$20 more and a ball of string, he and our son flung a dipole antenna (a measured length of wire) up 20 feet and stretched it between two trees beside the garage. Then they ran -a length Qrf coaxial cable (heavy round wire) from the center of the antenna wire (attaching the coaxial cable at its center divided it into two halfsections, thus it became a dipole-get it?) in through the family-room window and attached it to the radio. He hooked up a Morse code key and a microphone.

Now, according to our class instructor, I could "work the world." This is called DXing (talking over great distances to other hams in foreign countries).

Because we'd had no HF (high frequency, 1.6 to 30 MHz) radio in years, Bill had not done much DXing. Besides, as he's service-oriented (he's applied to be our county's Amateur Radio Emergency Coordinator, or EC) he enjoyed his 2-meter (tinier antenna!) rig in the car and had not missed the opportunity to get into 10-meter DXing. (There! You understood exactly what I meant by that now-see how fast it can come?)

One dreary Saturday afternoon we turned on our newly acquired IO-meter transceiver and began tuning up and down through the band where Novices are allowed to use "phone" (talking by microphone, rather than sending Morse code). Bill disappeared after listening for a bit and I was alone. It

was all garble and Greek to me, and besides, who would'everhearthe'tiny 25 watts (like a light bulb) of power I put out overthe 200 + watts I could hear the big, booming male hams reporting as output power. Not only that, but it was a contest weekend and most hams were spitting out contacts (QSOs) at the rate of one about every five seconds. But I sat and listened.

I heard what they wanted to have a ham they made contact with say, and because the first attempts this way wouldn't involve a lot of technical ham talk I wasn't quite ready for, I rehearsed my responses in my head, waited for a "QRZed?" ("Who is calling me?") took a deep breath and guavered into my mike "KA3VNK." To my utter amazement and horror, I heard a voice say, "KA3VNK, this is WB5BIR. You are 5 by 9, 59 into Houston, Texas. My name is Al and my 10-10 number is. ..." I sat stunned in my Maryland family room. A piece of wire in the trees and I was talking to someone in Texas! I was honest-he was my very first contact and I had no "10-10 number." whatever it was (helpful hams latertold me and now I have one, tool), but I said he was "5 by 9" (I guessed!) in Maryland and my name was Bobbi. He thanked me, wished me "73" and was gone. (73 means "best regards." 88 means "hugs and kisses." Send it to yourOM or close friends. Or grandchildren. The Latin Americans tend to send them to all XYLs. I ignore that, but off-air, I giggle.) My logbook shows that I waited two minutes to understand what had happened, found another frequency and plunged in.

Seventeen days later, I "hit" Puerto Rico, the next day Canada and Alaska... and one month later, I'd made friends in Europe, Africa, Central and South America. One night I had a gentleman repeat his call sign and I discovered that my tiny rig had taken me to Japan! I was hooked! Overjoyed! Thrilled and delighted to be a ham! After surviving an onslaught of reallife 88s forgetting me into ham radio, my OM was flabbergasted when I worked 89 non-US stations in 44 different countries in the next 30 days-between loads of laundry, carting kids and part-time work. I talked to lots of US hams, too-and heard over and over in every country the wistfulness in your OM's voice. So that's why I'm writing to you.

All this DX activity took place in the last month as I'm writing this down. Yes, I caved in and took the radio club's upgrade course to become a Technician (no more code, just more memorization-and a wee bit more understanding; it'll come. Give me a decade!). I passed that, too! So now I can chat with my OM all the way to his office, 30 miles away.

I went into ham radio with

I had no interest and the course was frustrating. But weeks after it was over and I had passed, I found a sudden joy in an area of ham radio that my OM hadn't yet tried. And I renewed my childhood interest in collecting stamps and postcards as QSL cards (special postcards hams use to verify QSOs) began arriving from all over the US and abroad. Mail time is exciting every day now!

I still don't muck around in picofarads and I still don't understand exactly how a 3-element beam antenna works, but at least I know now what one is! If your husband has given you this letter to read, you can be sure that he's one of the wistful voices I've been hearing. Whether you find your own special niche in ham radio-and I hope the blessing comes for you as it has for me-I can tell you that the joy and pride in your OM's eyes and voice will be worth even/ moment ofthose fewweeks of class. And the feeling you'll have when you hear another OM's voice when he says to your husband, "Boy, are you lucky. I sure wish my XYL..." is incomparable.

WOMEN IN AMATEUR RADIO

PART THREE

Linda Reeder, N7HVF

Editor's Note: This is the third of several parts of the serialization of a documentary that Linda Reeder wrote and recorded several years ago.

Sister Alverna O'Laughlin, WAOSGJ: "Handi-Hams provides tapes for individuals who are blind and adaptive equipment for people that happen to have disabilities that do not render them able to use equipment with ease. We have a newsletter which is called *The Handi-Ham World* and this keeps members in touch with one another. We have two radio camps a year, one in California in January and one in August in Minnesota. We draw volunteers from all over the United States. We had two from the east coast and two from the west coast; one of them from the south and three of them from Ohio, plus people from the local area who have expertise in teaching. They teach all levels of licensing. Amateurs have incentive licensing. Novice, tech, general, advanced and amateur extra class."

Louella Hapster KEORF is one of many recipients who have benefited from Handi-Hams.

Louella Hapster KEORF: "I obtained a book on Amateur Radio. I think it was *Tune in the World.* I started studying it. I had a lot of trouble with that, understanding it, 'cause it was all kind of Greek but I was able to learn the code at home and was tested for that and I past my test after I did get study tools from the Handi-Hams system which were very helpful."

She has attended several of the camps and has her Extra Class license.

Some women are interested in the electronics aspect of ham radio. Janet, KOJE and Janice, KOJA Robadeau own their own repeaters.

Janice, KOJA & Janet, KOJE Robadeau: "We were active on the repeater that we currently own. It was privately owned by four amateur radio operators who were nearing retirement age and, gradually, one by one they left the area. The one person left as owner was looking for new owners to take over. It was too much for one person and he also wanted to retire and maybe leave the area. So hejust let it be known among the users. It's a very informal group that uses Amateur Radio repeaters. It's free to use as in all other aspects of the Amateur Radio hobby. You cannot charge for any of the services that are provided. You may pay a club's due if there's a club involved, but if there's private people involved, it's free. So he told us what he would like to sell the repeater for and we bought it."

"We actually own two repeaters. On is on two meters and one is on 220 mhz. Janet is the trustee of the KOJE repeater on two meters and I am trustee of the KOJA repeater on 220. I should clarify that actually there are three people who own these two repeaters, Janet and I and a friend, WBOIAT, a male friend who really is ourtechnical expertise and we couldn't do without

him. As repeater trustee, you are supposed to monitor the activities on the repeater and make sure that things occur in a legal and proper way and chastise those people who do not operate properly and actually shut down the repeater if you really feel things get abusive. We have nevershut down either repeater because of abuse of that sort. We just ask our users to observe proper and courteous Amateur Radio conduct as any ham should."

Janice and Janet give advantages of being Amateur Radio operators.

"For many years, I drove right across the twin cities, 25 miles to and from work and in the worst kinds of weather here in Minnesota. Very often it was just good to be in contact with other people during that trip. If anything

happened, I could expect them to get help for me and sometimes I actually had them get help for me. Even when you're alone at night in the car, it's not like cellular phone, but there are people out there who can help you and generally hams can be counted on to be friendly and helpful. Then, also we have an RV and when we go outside the twin city area it's nice to know that we can ask people for directions and get help on the road in an emergency."

Fortunately, every time something comes across the screen through the TNC interface, it speaks to me. I love to joke about that. I like to say things like "Nice hearing you, HI HI!" People that know me of course know what I'm talking about. People that don't might really wonder!"


