Have you ever wondered how the Miss America contestants **really** look before they appear on TV on the final night of the pageant? If you're fortunate enough to live in the Atlantic City area and hold a valid amateur license, you are more than welcome to come down to Convention Hall and see for yourself. Of course, you will be obligated to devote some time at the radio station.

During Miss America Pageant week, September 14-19, 1998, the Southern Counties Amateur Radio Association (SCARA) will again sponsor a special event station from Convention Hall, in Atlantic City. Talk about a fun time!! The antenna crew does their installation on Sunday (praying for good weather, of course) and the actual operating begins .on Monday, to coincide with the preliminary competition. Our booth is set up between the Hospitality Room and the entrance to Convention Hall, where contestants are continuously going back and forth. Jeff Margolis. nationally recognized director, sets up his "camp" directly opposite our booth, always with a unique theme.

Each contestant is given a supply of "Pageantgrams" (radiograms on pink paper, with the Miss America Crown) so she can send messages to those at home that were unable to make the trip to Atlantic City. They fill them out, bring them back to our booth and we send them out as formal traffic on the National Traffic System.

Believe it or not, these contestants just love all the attention from the support people at the Pageant. They willingly pose for pictures with us, sign our programs, share little anecdotes, or sometimes just take a deep breath, with their backs to the rest of the world. They're always escorted by their local Pageant Hostess, of course, and overthe years, we've become familiar with many of the hostesses.

Usually there are two or three positions operating simultaneously—one CW and one or two SSB stations. The call is K2BR. Stations operate on all bands, but the phone stations are easier to find, because they are able to state exactly who they are and what they're doing, while the CW station usually just sends the call.

Last year, the crew from CNN kept coming over to watch Jan-KJ4N on CW. They were fascinated by it, because they were totally unfamiliar with that mode of communication. Finally, they taped a segment, and we had our 15second claim to fame on Friday, September 13th, with an **all YL crew** operating the station. What a thrill!!! (See Photo) Toni-N2CYL who coordinates the special event station each year, was a most articulate spokesperson.

The QSL card is very distinctive photo of the newly crowned Miss America. So if you'd like to work the

Send QSL with #10 SASE to: SCARA, P.O. Box 121, Linwood, NJ 08221. Please be patient, as SCARA must wait for approval of a Miss America photo, then have cards printed. However, if you work the station and send a SASE, you win eventually receive a QSL.

YL LUNCHEON SPEAKER-Janet Margelli W60MF, popular manager of Ham Radio Outlet in Anaheim, holds an extra class license. She and her OM Chip have traveled the globe on various DXpeditions. Janet was the first YL operator granted operating permission from the People's Republic of China, after she and Chip traveled there and helped train Chinese operators during the early phases of the rebirth of Amateur Radio. In 1994 they were invited to Cuba to participate in ARRL's June VHF QSO Party. Janet's article documenting the trip was featured in the December 1994 issue of *QST*.

BANQUET MASTER OF CEREMONIES - Dave Bell W6AQ is a TV, Film, Independent Producer, Emmy winner, and currently produces the television show "LAPD, Cop on the Beat". He has also produced videos for ARRL, and is a very popular Southern California amateur radio MC.

BANQUET SPEAKER - Cynthia "Cindy" Wall KA7ITT is the author of the popular Amateur Radio adventure series for children. Her latest book "A Spark to the Past" takes her two main characters, Kim and Marc, back in time to 1845 where they use their 20th century knowledge of radio to save a wagon train. Oregon author, Cynthia "Cindy" Wall, KA7ITT will be the banquet speaker for YLRL1999 Convention aboard the Queen Mary in Long Beach, CA.

Cynthia interest in Amateur Radio runs in the family. Her Grandfather was a radio pioneer who demonstrated a spark gap transmitter at the 1906 World's Fair. Her late stepmother, Lenore Jenson, W6NAZwasone of the founding mothers of YLRL and author of the book, "Inside Amateur Radio". It goes without saying that Lenore was an influence on Cindy to get her license.

Cindy writes a popular series of adventures centered around Amateur Radio. Her latest book is *A Spark to the Past*, in which her main characters, Kim and Mark, travel back through time to a wagon train on the Oregon Trail in 1845. Only their 20th century technical knowledge and Amateur Radio (of course!) can save the wagon train.

"As an Oregonian, I've always been

fascinated with the courage and determination of the pioneers who came west," said Cindy. "I started thinking about a way to get my characterto that era and my grandfather's spark gap transmitter came to mind. It's what zaps them to the past. It was my brother's inventiveness that brings them back to the present."

Steve Jensen, W6HRM, her brother, is not only one of her technical resources for writing the books, he's also often a character in them. Whenever Kim can't think of a solution for a dilemma, she imagines what "Uncle Steve" would do.

The adventure books have been warmly received in schools and are the core of theTitle I program curriculum at Waldo Middle School in Salem. Each yearthe students, staff and Cindy go out to the site of one of the stories to reenact the adventure.

The other books in the series include *Night Signals, Hostage in the Woods, Firewatch!, Easy Target, and Disappearing Act* and are \$5 plus shipping. *A Spark to the Past* is \$6. 

Following is the current award regulations listed with the Foundation of Amateur Radio (FAR) as written by Ethel Smith, K4LMB several years ago. When Ethel became a silent key, YLRL voted to honor her by changing the scholarship name. This is the wording that will appear under Sec. 20 of the YLRL Procedure Policy.

"The Scholarship Fund provided in ARTICLE XIV of the YLRL Constitution and By-Laws shall consist entirely of voluntary contributions. No money shall be taken from dues for this purpose."

"The Ethel Smith-K4LMB Memorial Scholarship sponsored by the Young Ladies' Radio pays \$1500. Applicants must hold at least an FCC Technicain Class or equivalent foreign authorization and intend to seek a baccalaureate or graduate degree from a U. S. college or university. There are no residence or course restrictions. Preference will be given to female applicants. "



YLRL Scholarship Recipients

Since 1978, there have 22 scholarships given by the YLRL, for a total of \$17,150 awarded. The first scholarship awarded was for \$300. Our scholarships are now worth \$1500!

I have written to YLRL Scholarship recipients for updates on their lives. This letter is from another of our early winners, Ann Waines Huff, KA8CSM. Ann won \$300 (I!) in 1980. How times change!

Ann Waines Huff, KA8CSM—1980

Hi Marte!

Sorry it has taken me so long to write back. Since I won the YLRL scholarship, I completed my undergraduate degree in Electrical Engineering from Ohio Northern University in Ada, Ohio in 1991. I have been working for the Ohio Valley Electric Corporation (OVEC), which is an electric utility facility that supplies power to the Department of Energy's uranium enrichment facility in Southern Ohio, since 1982.

I started out as a Field Engineer, getting an opportunity to work on relaying, metering, and communications equipment. I obtained my First Class (now General Class) Radiotelephone License so I could work on the company's microwave equipment. I upgraded my Amateur Radio license to Advanced Class in 1991. My title now is System Engineer-Computers, and I have been busy establishing a corporate Ethernet TCP/IP network, and maintaining the company's load control computer system. I am currently in the process of bringing up a Windows NT server, and migrating over from Banyan Vinesto a Windows NT network. *continued on page 3*



An Aroericam YL in Nicaragua

Dear Gang at YLRL:

10 May 1998

After upgrading to Advanced in 1995 (at a testing in which the man handing out the 61 Os first passed me overcompletely and then assumed I should be in the code-less-tech line because I was a YL), my call changed KC4GPZ to KS4ZQ. In 1996 1 joined the Peace Corps and was placed in Nicaragua. I had a year long fight with Peace Corps administration who thought that operating a ham radio would make Nicaraguans think I was a CIA agent. The Nicaraguan version of the FCC requires you to know the coordinates of your station down to the second, but (oh-by-the-way) all such records were destroyed in the civil war. I was finally given a year license with the call was YN9MJR which I likedto say stood forYN9"mujer" or "woman" in Spanish. I thinkthey were trying to give me my initials, which are JRM, but could never figure out which was my first name.

My station in Nicaragua was in the "Casa Cural" or Catholic Church offices and priests' residence. Dating back to pre-civil war days, the Drake TR4 was older than I and still has most of its original tubes intact. Legend has it that the Sandinistas confiscated the rig during the war, but brought it back in disgust 2 weeks later. With the help of the young priests in training, I strung up a 20-meter homebrew half-wave dipole. Unfortunately for my signal, two-story concrete buildings surrounded the patio of the Casa Cural, and with the dearth of tall trees, effectively left my antenna in a cement well. The Amerique Mountains to the north also channeled my signal into uninhabited regions of the Costa Rican rain forest instead of toward my family in the eastern U.S. Although my success with YN9MJR was less than I had hoped for, I did manage a few shaky CW contacts with my dad KS4ZR before a small electrical fire caused me to give up the ham radio ghost in Central America. Any and all field-day experiences should seem luxurious after this!

I'm now back from Peace Corps and looking to work with one of the nongovernmental organizations involved with either the environment or Latin Americans in the U.S. In spite of the inherent trials of amateur radio, I've enjoyed the last 10 years of being a licensed op, and feel that ham radio has given me the opportunity to meet a wide variety of people, all ages and races. I plan to put the hobby on the back burner for the next couple years. However, one of the great things about ham radio is that you can always come back to it!
