Dues are \$15.00 (US dollars) a year due and payable January 1, and delinquent February1st. For new and reinstating (lapsed more than 2 years) members joining after June 30th, dues are pro-rated by half the annual dues for that fiscal year.



Rules for All YLRL Contests

- 1. Check to make certain you are sending logs to the CURRENT Vice-President.
- 2. Logs must be postmarked no later than 30 days after each contest ends.
- 3. Scoring:
- 4. Phone and CW contests will be scored separately. Separate logs must be submitted for each contest.
- 5. One point is earned for each different station worked on each band. The same station may be worked on different bands. In the YL-OM contest only, YLs count OMs and OMs count YLs.
- 6. Multiplier will be the ARRL sections and/or DX countries, whichever is appropriate. Canadian provinces are counted individually. Multipliers are used only once on all bands when figuring the score.
- 7. Contestants running 5W or less will be considered QRP and earn a power factor of 3. Contestants running 5W to 100W will be considered low power and earn a power factor of 1.5. Contestants running over 100W will be high power. If no transmitter power is listed on logs, no power factor will be given.

Total scored claimed is calculated by multiplying the points times the multiplier times the power factor.

Logs

- 1. All logs must show the operator's ARRL section, VE province, or country to qualify for awards. Where applicable, logs must state whether or not the operator is a member of YLRL. For each QSO, logs must also state the power output. If you have 200 or more QSOs, submit a separate log for each band and submit a "dupe" sheet.
- 2. Please type or print. If you print a log from a logging program or photocopy your log book, be sure they include all the required information.
- 3. Logs must be signed and show claimed score. No logs will be returned. Entries in log must also show time, band, date and transmitter power.

Exchange

Station worked, QSO number given and received, RS(T) given and received, and section/province/country.

Single operator and YL clubs/groups.

Report from the YLRL Board Meeting September 29 - October 4

The YLRL Board met via email beginning on September 29 to discuss two documents.

The first document was the YLRL Constitution and By-Laws, which defines the foundation and structure of YLRL, identifies who YLRL is, what we do, and how we do it. Parliamentarian Anne Manna, WB1ARU, formed a committee to look at those documents for readability and grammar as well as looking for anything that was incorrect or out of date. Membership renewal for three years was the major addition to the By-Laws. After the Board approved the updated document during the Sept./Oct. meeting, I asked for the addition of a Website Committee that would be a standing committee, designed to help Webmistress Val Lemko with updates and changes to the website. Thanks, Anne, for taking that back to the committee. Thanks to Anne, WB1ARU, and the By-Laws Committee for looking closely at the YLRL Constitution and By-Laws. The committee is made up of Anne Manna, WB1ARU; Anne Dirkman, KC9YL; Dot Timmerman, AC4HH; Rita McConnell, NE0DB; and Robin Resnick, KJ7BI. It takes many eyes to make those updates; thanks for being there to make the edits. After the edits are finished the membership will vote on the updated document. That timetable is in the works; there should be more information about that in the near future. Until the membership approves the updated Constitution and By-Laws, membership dues payment for three years will not take effect, nor will the Website Committee be formed.

The second document the Board discussed was the Membership Privacy Policy. Please remember that the privacy policy is a policy, a course of action that the Board can decide to take. Policies need board approval to become part of the actions that YLRL can take. With the Board's approval the Membership Privacy Policy became part of the list of actions that YLRL takes. See the Procedure Policy for other YLRL policies and procedures; find the link on the ylrl.org website.

Michelle Carey, W5MQC, and Nancy Rabel Hall, KC4IYD, were very helpful and knowledgeable when it came to developing the Membership Privacy Policy. What we put together is not complicated, and should get the job done with regard to identifying what personal data YLRL collects from members. As an organization, YLRL is a ham radio club for women; we do not share or sell the personal data we collect. <u>YL Harmonics</u> and the ylrl.org website make use of what information and pictures we have from our members for the benefit of the members. Thanks to Michelle and Nancy for sharing their time to put together the privacy policy, and thanks to the Board for understanding the importance of the privacy policy to YLRL members.

As always, implementation is everything. To provide the platform for members to consent to the policy, the membership application has seen some additions. We ask that when you renew your membership for 2021 that you consent to the Membership Privacy Policy and the Privacy Policy for the ylrl.org website. As with many of these policies, if you do not choose to consent to the policy you cannot be a member. If you are unable to permit YLRL to collect your information to maintain our membership records, as well as to include members in <u>YLH</u> and the website, then you cannot be a member.

Margaret has reproduced the updated membership application in this <u>YLH</u> issue to give you an idea of what it will look like. Feel free to copy the membership form and use it to send in with your check to renew for 2021. Give us a bit more time for the web version to be up and available to use with PayPal membership payments. It should be out just after the first of November. The two Receiving Treasurers and the Database Manager, a position we are looking at filling for the first time in several years, will work with the membership records and ensure that a member's consent to the privacy policy is added with the rest of the membership data. At the other end of the process, the Database Manager will work with the <u>YL Harmonics</u> Editor to ensure that the personal information in our publication is being published properly. As you can see, this is another one of the YLRL team efforts that depends on good communications and everyone pitching in to do their job, all of which keep YLRL moving along. After the Receiving Treasurers, Database Manager, and <u>YLH</u> Editor have added the Membership Privacy Policy into what they do, I will work with the Board to decide the best path to take to determine what form the Directory issue will take, if we determine we are able to publish it.

The Board meeting finished up on October 4 after two announcements. The first announcement was that Leah Ohse, W3LEO, has agreed to become the incoming Supplies Chairwoman. Leah is working with Barb Bender, KA3VXR, and the committee that is helping with the sales of as many of the supplies as possible to facilitate the transfer of the remaining supplies from Barb to Leah. Leah will work with the committee to put up new supplies ideas. Thanks to Leah for volunteering to succeed Barb as well as to Lois Gutshall, WB3EFQ; Anne Dirkman, KC9YL; and Rita, NE0DB for facilitating the supplies sale and the transfer of supplies to Leah. The second announcement was that Linda Hynan, AC5QQ, Chair of the Budget and Finance Committee, has named the committee members, for 2020 and 2021. Thanks to Judi Jaksa, WQ0JJ; Susan King, K5DU; and Margaret Hardwick, AE7MB; for agreeing to serve on the Budget and Finance Committee.

The Sept./Oct. Board meeting represents the next step in the process to fully implement email delivery of <u>YLH</u> as well as adding the three year membership renewal. With guidance from the privacy policy we are in a better position to take actions that will reduce the exposure of members' personal information to the harm that can be found on the internet. Thanks to the Board for their support.

Privacy/Security Policy

The Young Ladies Radio League, Inc. (hereafter referred to as "the operator" or "YLRL", is a registered Non-Profit in the USA. Our website address is https://www.ylhamonics.com.

We recognize that respecting user privacy in <u>YL Harmonics</u> (<u>YLH</u>) and in our correspondence is of utmost importance.

This privacy statement is designed to provide information about policy and data collection practices for the YL Harmonics and during our correspondence with members.

Identifying Information

YLRL collects the following information when you join: name, call sign, address, phone, and email, and other appropriate information needed to provide you with these services. YLRL officers, committee members, and members may also have name, call sign, address, phone, email, and likeness included in YL Harmonics abd the YLRL websites. In all instances, if you receive a newsletter or mailing from us, you will always be able to "unsubscribe" from these mailings at any time.

Data Security

We implement a variety of security measures to maintain the safety of your personal information.

Contact Forms

We use the contact form to manage contact form submissions. The information is sent as email messages that only a select few are allowed to access. The information is also stored in the database on our hosting server for backup and later reference purposes.

We do no set a particular time limit on storing information because we need it for future reference. If you want your information to be removed from out database, please contact us. We will remove it anytime there are concerns about your privacy.

What we will do with your information

If you choose to give use personal information for any of the purposes above, this information is retained by the operator and will only be used by the operator to support your membership relationship with us.

We will not add you to a mailing list, or newsletter without your explicit registration for such service

We will only contact you if further information is required from you to complete a service, for example, as District Chairwoman requesting news for YLH. In that situation we will blind carbon copy (BCC) the distribution list or use a mailing service that does not show everyone's email address.

What Others May Do With Your Information

We **do not** share, rent, or sell any personally identifying information provided to any outside organization for use in its marketing or solicitations.

Non-Identifiable Information

We **will not** share aggregate information about our members and our web site visitors to any advertisers, business partners, and other third parties.

Children's Privacy Protection

We are sensitive to the heightened need to protect the privacy of children under the age of 18. <u>YL Harmonics</u> does not knowingly collect data from children. If we learn that we have received personal data from a child, we will remove this information from out database, unless we have parental approval.


From Barbara Irby KC1KGS:


With work and some radio, life seems to be very busy. I think the antennas to my rig are now all set—let's just hope the fall and winter winds don't do them in!



From Linda Robinson, W1MP:

In the end my son, who is studying for his license, did both repairs. For 2 months the grounding clamp was on the counter next to the basement door. I was going to make that repair before my son got here and, nobody will be surprised, it had disappeared and still hasn't been found. So I had to order it again, curbside pickup from the local hardware store.

My son followed all the instructions and suggestions given to me by a local ham friend. The hardest repair, of course, was to the ladder line. I've included pictures, not sure how easy it will be to see the repair. On Monday [in early August] we fired up the rig and tried the antennas, it didn't transmit but was able to tune the dipole for 80M and maybe I will get onto Yankee Lassies at some point to get a report.

Here's the first part of the repair, he stripped back to good clean copper wire and made the twists. One side went very well because there was room to swing the wire end around but the other side was quite difficult because now he had to work in space of about an inch wide.



Then soldered it all, the red zip ties were to help relieve any strain on the joint,



wrap in electrician tape,



and then wrap in ordinary duct tape.

District 4

The following is news from Nancy, N4ZM: I designed and erected an 80-meter full-wave horizontal loop. Unfortunately, I could only put it 10-feet high, but is still works great. I also became an Official Relay Station for the ARRL and I'm a "net rep" between the Tropical Fast net and the Eagle net. The Tropical Fast Net is an acronym for the Tropical Florida Amateur Sideband net, which is a statewide Florida net. The Eagle net is a daily net meeting each evening serving the Southwest Florida section, comprised of 10 counties.

From Dot, AC4HH: My OM and I put up a 100-foot long wire half-wave antenna from the balcony on our second-floor apartment to a tree in the side yard. This is a replacement for an antenna we lost during the tornado in the spring. We are still chasing RF interference caused by something in the apartment complex. We found one source of some minor interference in our own apartment—the source was some Plug-in devices touted to repel insects. However, the documentation with them stated that they could cause radio and television interference. So, we unplugged the three we had and trashed them. (They may have repelled some insects, but not all anyway.)

The Chattanooga Amateur Radio Club has recently offered a couple of training opportunities. The first was a 4-hour session on using Winlink. The second was on a Saturday and Sunday at an outside pavilion at a County Park. The theme for these sessions was "Putting It All Together" and covered a variety of ham-related activities including: radio power connections; coax cable connections (soldered and solder-free); connecting radios to power sources, antennas, and grounding; using portable antennas; and radio direction finding (search and rescue operations and how to locate sources of interference). The power sources discussed were: AC (shore power), automotive power (battery), and solar power.

Carol Laferty, K4SAF in Kentucky writes:

The 2020 Pandemic restrictions have been difficult for me, but amateur radio has helped me get through it. When I bought the new Yaesu FTdx101D, a year and a half ago, I knew I wanted to do much more hamming. But I had no idea that I would have more fun than in my 63 years of being a ham!

In July I participated in the 13 Colonies Event. I worked all colony stations, plus the bonus WM3PEN, all on each mode: CW, SSB, and Digital. The Great Britain station eluded me. Next year! I participated in the Route 66 Event in September and worked all 21 stations across the Route 66 states, from Chicago to California's coast. The QSLs are still coming in. Both Events are annual and are a lot of fun.

Mixed, and along with that, WAS endorsements on 80, 40, 30, and 20 meters. Also, I completed WAS Digital, 80, 40, 30, and 20. The most prized so far for me is the CW WAS

What makes the successs in earning the awards even more meaningful to me is that I have done it with 100 watts max and a wire, low off-center-feed dipole (OFC) up about 35 feet.

DXCC is within reach and if all entities confirm, I will have more than 100. The world-wide Pandemic has interfered with Direct QSLs over the world. Another goal of mine is the ARRL Triple Play award. All contacts must be confirmed on LoTW, Logbook of the World, ARRL's Logbook. My CW and Digital 50 states are completed, and now I must get on SSB and work all 50 states to complete it. SSB has never been my mode of choice, but I will be much prominent on the phone bands while I try to complete that. One award I have long sought is the YLRL Worked All States YL. That one is by far the hardest to come by. I need four more states for that and am trying every means I know to make it happen. I need Delaware, Montana, Rhode Island and Utah. It will happen someday, but it will not be easy to complete. We need more of our YLs active on all bands.



To keep the YL QSL cards for WAS, I put them in old photo books. I wrote the state abbreviations on the pages, so I could easily see what is still needed. The only state confirmed through LoTW is Oregon, and the YL worked is Amy Haptonstall, AG7GP, a YLRL member. She was on one of her SOTA treks when I talked to her on CW. We both confirmed through LoTW. There has been some discussion of how we count that for YL WAS. I printed the confirmation info to put in the photo book. I think that is the way to go on that when it does come up.
