YLRL Certificates Basic Rules Applicable to All YLRL Certificates

- 1. Contacts made through repeater devices or any other power relay method cannot be used for any YLRL certificate confirmation.
- 2. All contacts must be made FROM the same country.
- 3. DO NOT SEND THE QSL CARDS TO THE CUSTODIAN! Two other amateurs must sign the log verifying that the QSL cards are in the possession of the applicant.
- 4. No charge is made for a certificate, but sufficient postage for fust class mail or a stamped legal-sized envelope must accompany the application to cover the cost of mailing the certificate.
- 5. For the order in which the contacts must be listed, please check the rules for each certificate.
- 6. All inquiries should be addressed to the appropriate custodian.
- 7. Decisions of the custodians regarding interpretations of the rules as here stated or later amended shall be final.
- 8. Certificate custodians and their addresses are listed at the end of this section.

YL Century Club (YLCC)

Available to all licensed radio amateurs. Two-way communications must be established on authorized Amateur bands, with stations, mobile or fixed, operated by 100 different licensed women Amateurs. The same YL using different call letters will NOT count. Any and all amateur bands may be used.

Contacts with YLs anywhere in the world are recognized, provided only that confirmations clearly indicate the stations were operated by duly licensed women Amateur Radio operators.

List of claimed contacts, including the full name of the operator, must be alphabetically arranged by LAST name, and also include the call sign, date, band, mode, and RS(T) of each contact.

Endorsements: Confirmations of contacts accompanied by an alphabetical list, as described above, from stations operated by additional YLs may be submitted for credit each time 50 additional confirmations are available.

Endorsements will be made to the original certificate when application is approved. Gold stickers will be awarded to applicants who have worked their additional contacts from the same country; other wise, silver stickers will be awarded.

Upcoming Events Hamfests, Conventions and More

DX YL to North American YL Contest CW:1400 UTC April 6, 2005 to 0200 UTC April 8, 2005 SSB:1400 UTC April 13, 2005 to 0200 UTC April 15, 2005

ELIGIBILITY: All licensed women operators throughout the world are invited to participate.

PROCEDURE: DX YLs call "CQ North American YL". North American YLs call "CO DX YL."

OPERATION: All bands may be used. Contacts with OMs do not count. Participants may work only 24 hours of the 36 hours in each contest. Operating breaks must be shown in the log.

EXCHANGE: Station worked, QSO number, RS(T), ARRL section/VE province/country. Entries in log must also show time, band, date, and transmitter power.

SCORING: (1) Phone and CW will be scored as separate contests. Submit separate logs for each contest. (2) DX YLs, including Hawaii and Alaska, may contact all the North American continent, which includes the 48 contiguous states and the Canadian provinces. (3) Contestants on the North American continent (including the 48 contiguous states and Canadian provinces) may contact DX YL stations, including Hawaii and Alaska. (4) A station may be counted once on each band for credit and one point is earned for each station worked once on each band. (5) Multiply the number of QSOs by the number of different ARRL sections/VE provinces/countries worked. A multiplier is counted only once in the contest. (6) Contestants running 150 watts or less on CW and 300 watts PEP or less on SSB, at all times, may multiply the results of 5) above by 1.5 (the low power multiplier).

LOGS: All logs must show your ARRL section/VE province/country to qualify for awards. For each QSO, logs must show the station worked, QSO number given and received, RS(T) given and received, ARRL section/VE province/country of station worked, time, band, and date. Logs must also state the power output used. If you have 200 or more QSOs, submit a separate log for each band and submit a "dupe" sheet. Photocopies are OK, but not carbon copies will be accepted. File separate logs fore each contest.



Elizabeth, VE3YL and Gwen, VK3DYL will operate from Vanuatu in May. Urey will be in Port Vila from May 2 -8, then on Aore Island May 9-19. Both will be IOTA OC-035. The YL callsign is not yet known.

They will then fly to Tonga and operate from Nukualofa (IOTA OC-049) May 24-29, and then from Vava'u (IOTA OC-064) May 31-June 8 Their callsign will probably be A35YL.

QSL will be via VK3DYL, 3 Gould Court, Mt Waverley, 3149, Australia with a SASE and \$2US or one current IRC, or via the VK3 Bureau. No e-QSLs or old IRCs will be accepted.

March 10-24 Rosel, DL3KWR and her OM Hardy, DL3ICWF will be in Madeira (Island in the Atlantic) again. Then in April the will be operating from Kreta Island as SV9/homecall and the end of May from Morokulien. In the WPX contest the fourth weekend (of May?) will offer again the very desirable multipliers ...Hardy will operate as SJ9WL, and Rosel will operate as LG5LG.

I trust that everyone had a GREAT holiday season, and I hope this column finds everyone healthy, happy, and ready for an awesome 2005! What's your New Year's resolution? If you haven't made one (or even if you have), I have a suggestion. Why not make your New Year's resolution to get at least one person involved in Amateur Radio this year?

And, since this is the Young Ladies Radio League, why not involve a young lady in Amateur Radio? Just think, if everyone who is reading this got just one young lady involved in Amateur Radio, it would create hundreds of newly licensed young ladies! So, whether you're a young ham yourself or a kid-at-heart wanting to get youth involved, it is up to YOU to spread the word. Now that you are motivated (hopefully), here are some tips for involving youth in Amateur Radio.

The first step is to make youth want to be involved in Amateur Radio because without a desire, one will probably not put forth the effort to earn their license, and if they do get their license, they will most likely become inactive relatively quickly.

As you're probably well aware, there are MANY competing activities that youth like to get involved in, and our job is to "sell" Amateur Radio to youth so that they'll chose it over all of the other options. If you're reading this column, it probably means that you know how much fun ham radio is; now, we just have to convince the new people.

The biggest challenge, in my opinion, in "selling" Amateur Radio is making it look as much fun as it really is in a short period of time. Let's face it, youth (really, people in general) have short attention spans, and they're only getting shorter. Luckily, organizations such as the American Radio Relay League (<u>www.arrl.org</u>) provide materials, such as colorful brochures, videos, and PowerPoint presentations, to assist us in promoting our hobby and service.

Even with these "promotion aides," it is really up to the individual to think of creative ways to promote Amateur Radio. For example, at age 11, looking at radios and antennas didn't excite me. However, when I walked up to a local Field Day site and saw one ham on stilts, learned the entire phonetic alphabet, and got to participant in an Amateur Radio scavenger hunt (complete with prizes), I was suddenly interested. After they had my attention, they showed me the radio and allowed me to make five FIF contacts at about midnight; of course, I loved that, too. Thanks to a "creative start," I was hooked from that day forward.

So, if you can think of a way to present Amateur Radio that makes it appealing to the inexperienced, without throwing in too much technical knowledge, you can give them more background on it once they're excited about it.

Now, are you ready to begin telling others, especially young YLs, about Amateur Radio? You should be; after all, youth *are* the future of Amateur Radio. And, once you get a young YL involved in Amateur Radio, be sure to share your story with me because your experience may give others ideas. On Wednesday February 9th 2005, the Anniston ARMY Depot and the Calhoun County Alabama EMA held their annual (CSEPP) Chemical Stockpile Emergency Preparedness Program. Hie Anniston ARMY Depot uses an Incinerator to destroy stockpiles of chemical weapons.

This exercise was conducted to see how well the communications at the EOC's would work together as a team. The Calhoun County ARES/RACES group participated in the event. Randall Landers KG4EUD, the Calhoun county EC headed up the group from the Calhoun county EOC and Alabama Section Emergency Coordinator Jay Isabel KA4KUN and staff headed up communications at the Homeland Security and FEMA Noble Training Center Joint Information Center at FT. McClellan for health and well fare simcell messages.

The exercise consisted of a drill that the scenario was that 36 land mines exploded and VX Nerve Agent was released into the county. The ARES/RACES group gave updates and sent amateurs to Hospitals, schools and EAS radio stations where we gave the official press releases. The EOC simulated all communications at the EOC was down except amateur radio.

The FEMA region 4 representatives said that the amateur radio group was the best they have evaluated and their knowledge of radio and communications was excellent.

Life in Bombay

Hi everyone!

Wow, Bombay (only the Hindus call it Mumbai) is a FANTASTIC city!! Yes, it's enormous, crowded, polluted, and dirty, but what overpopulated city isn't? Well, I shall begin this saga way back—is it only eleven days ago?—at the beginning.

I came down with the flu during the week we left Vagator. I wasn't "stay in bed" ill, but I was nauseated, and couldn't eat until about 10/28, four days before we left Bombay. (My weight was down to 132, a portion of the scale I haven't seen since age 12!) So, after much debate about whether I should remain at home, I went, with Mom and Avi, to Condolim, and stayed overnight at a place on the beach called Tire Golden Eye. The vacation began one day early because the house was fumigated. The location was fantastic, literally ON the beach, and the food was nice, but I couldn't really enjoy anything because I was feeling quite crappy. On Saturday afternoon, our wonderful friend/taxi driver, Nani, picked us up and took us to Madgaon Station in the city of Margao, to catch the Konkan Railway train. Avi and Mom told me that I would have a difficult time climbing up into the train, but it was a piece of cake! Even though I faded in and out of nausea and fever, I thoroughly enjoyed the train Wallas—men who CON-STANTLY walk through the train selling food and drink. There must be a train Walla

school because all these guys sound identical! There was a lassi walla, a bread omelet (French toast?) walla, a Nescafe walla, a chai (tea) walla, a pani (water) walla, a lollipop (sort of like Indian buffalo wings) walla, a pakora walla, a biryani walla, and funniest (to me) of all was the fruit mix walla! Fruit mix is just a papaya, banana, watermelon, and pineapple fruit salad. The hilarious thing about these wallas is the voice used to hawk their wares—monotone and nasal. Mom and I constantly cracked up whenever one of these guys came through, and we are STILL cracking up. Fruit mix, fruit mix? Coffee, coffee. Nescafe?

We were in what's called First Class, but we learned that the best seats are ones where the compartment is enclosed. Our seats were padded benches, two parallel, and one perpendicular. The benches were comfortable, and doubled as beds. Also, there were benches above our seats for sleeping; luckily, other people had the joy of sleeping up there! Hie 2nd class seats are triple tiered!! At night, a "blanket walla" passed out sheets, pillows, and blankets. On the train going to Bombay, "they" were quite strict; lights out at nine PM, wake up at 6 AM. At 6:15, we arrived at CST, the final station on the journey.

CST station has improved, as has Bombay, in the five years since the Almeidas were last there. Avi was able to hire a coolie (personally, I don't like that word) to handle all of the luggage (Mom packed for a

year! I had only my backpack), as well as a coolie who brought a wheelchair! There was even one handicapped parking spot!! Bombay has "improved," according to the Almeidas, in that there is less honking of horns, less dirt and garbage, and less pollution. Tire latter may be true because rickshaws (little for hire motorized three seaters, kind of like Cushmans) are banned in certain areas. There are 300,000 of these little polluters within Bombay (and 60,000 taxis!), and limiting their ability to go in certain areas MUST be helping the environment.

So, we arrive amidst a crush of humanity, and lo and behold, here's Melroy, my cousin! We got out of the station in no time! Melroy borrowed his father's (Avi's sister's husband) great big Sumo (an Indian brand of SUV) to pick us up. The drive to Celvita (another cousin, Melroy's sister) and Glenn's took about 11/2 hours with NO traffic jams. Ute city is absolutely fascinating!!! There are beautiful, artistic high rises right next to tent cities! Modern (wealthy) clothing and home furnishing stores are alongside lean to shacks! But, like in any other metropolis, homeless people are sleeping anywhere they can. I love the vibrancy and energy of the place!

Melroy first took us to Celvita and Glenn's as we couldn't check in until 4PM. Celvita and Glenn are yuppies. They live in a lovely high-rise complex and belong to the country club next door. Glenn plays tennis every day, and

Celvita plays squash whenever she can. Melroy and Andrea (his wife) live in my kind of neighborhood; you can hear kids playing and yelling, shops line the streets, and the everpresent hordes of people press against you. Their building is also a high rise, but much less fancy than Glenn and Cel's—no doorman, no marble foyer. I also visited Angel (Avi's brother's daughter), her husband Joe Joe, and her mother-inlaw's flat. They live in a company complex. Joe Joe has a job with Godrej, a huge manufacturer of everything from refrigeration units to missiles. Then there was a visit to Celine. Avi's sister, and Marshall's flat. Uris home is where Celine raised three children, and it is tiny, consisting of a ?living room?, a walk through bedroom, a bathroom, and a teensy weensy kitchen. The building, which is two stories, is among those, which are owned by their church, walking distance away. I also went to Sabina (Avi's first cousin) and Oscar's flat, which was similar to Celine and Marshall's. Sabina's mother, Mary Aunty, and sister, Assunta, live in a flat across the courtyard. Mary Aunty is an adorable 80 year old, who never

stops talking in Konkanee (the language of Goa, from where she hails). She was SO thrilled to meet me, and she raved about the fact that I was wearing a sari!

Speaking of sari wearing, I also wore one the next day. In the hotel dining room all eyes stared at me, and the staff gushed compliments. Indians are always so impressed when a white woman wears a sari! I plan on wearing them when I get home, too, because I look really good in a sari.

The hotel, Lotus Suites, is touted as an "ecotel". Everything is recycled, one can request that the bed not be changed daily, there is a water treatment plant in the basement, and they don't allow cut flowers, only live plants! It is a beautiful four-star hotel, working towards five stars by building a health club. The food is buffet, and wonderful! Staff is really wonderful; they train for six months before beginning any job. One could easily forget that this is Lidia!

Celvita had to go to Delhi on business—she is the executive secretary to the President of DHL India (the courier company)—most of the time we were in Bombay. I did get to spend Sunday afternoon with them. They had planned to take me sightseeing, but we ended up hanging out at their apartment and talking.

Sunday night Marshall and Celine took us to the train station, via a short sight seeing tour. Marshall drove through the Moslem area of town. Despite the heat, the women wear traditional dress, including face covering. We arrived at CST, coolies took our luggage and me in a wheelchair, we boarded the train, made up our beds, and went to sleep. No hitches during the entire Bombay stay! Avi developed a bad eye infection and a cold, and Mom caught Avi's cold, but I returned to Vagator unscathed! Mom and Avi had led me to expect the absolute worst in Bombay, as did my friend, Barry, but I found the entire trip EXHILARATING!

Now, I'm waiting for Dick's (and Obbie's, Dick's friend and traveling companion) arrival in two months. I can use the down time until then. I'm amazed that Goa is a mere 600 kilometers from Bombay; no poEution, no noise. There are many more cows in the street here, too. Bombay only had a few poking around garbage areas.


