

Basic Rules Applicable to All YLRL Certificates

- 1. Contacts made through repeater devices or any other power relay method cannot be used for any YLRL certificate confirmation.
- 2. All contacts must be made FROM the same country.
- 3. DO NOT SEND THE QSL CARDS TO THE CUSTODIAN! Two other amateurs must sign the log verifying that the QSL cards are in the possession of the applicant.
- 4. No charge is made for a certificate, but sufficient postage for first class mail or a stamped legal-sized envelope must accompany the application to cover the cost of mailing the certificate.
- 5. For the order in which the contacts must be listed, please check the rules for each certificate.
- 6. All inquiries should be addressed to the appropriate custodian.
- 7. Decisions of the custodians regarding interpretations of the rules as here stated or later amended shall be final.
- 8. Certificate custodians and their addresses are listed above this section.

DX-YL Certificate

Available to licensed YL operators only, for working 25 DIFFERENT licensed women operators outside your own country, on or after April 1,1958. USA and possessions are counted as separate countries, as well as Alaska and Hawaii. Any and all amateur bands may be used.

Contact do not have to be with 25 different countries, just 25 different DX YLs.

Tire call used is immaterial, provided it is licensed to the applicant.

The log must show date, time, station worked, frequency, her report, your report, mode, her name and QTH and must be arranged alphabetically by her last name.

Endorsements: Stickers will be awarded for each 10 additional DX YLs, subject to the same confirmation as above.

Continuous Membership Certificate

Hiis certificate is available ONLY to YLRL members. It is awarded automatically to any YL who has been a member, continuously for five years. Diamond-shaped stickers are awarded for each additional five years of continuous membership.No application is necessary, but if you have any questions, contact the continuous membership certificate custodian.

The catastrophic events of the past year have emphasized the need for trained amateur radio operators during communications failures. Our threats have increased over the last few years and we owe it to our communities to be a part of the disaster preparedness team. There are numerous courses online that you can take. The ARRL sponsors the Emcomm Levels I. II and III courses and FEMA provides Incident Command System, National Incident Management and the National Response Plan courses on their

website at <u>www.fema.gov.</u> I encourage all of you to take the courses so you will be more prepared in the face of a disaster. Many YLs also mentor the ARRL courses and I commend all of them for giving their time to assist others. Write your DC and share what you are doing with emergency communications organizations.

It seems we have had some sort of contest every other year or so to sign up more YL members. I'd like to do something a little different this year. I am going to donate a very special prize to the YLRL member who is "most radio active" in 2006. Keep a log showing date, time, band, RST, name, and whether the YL you contact is a YLRL member or not, for every YL you contact on the air in 2006. Everything counts, nets, contests, rag chews, but it must be on the air via amateur radio. Each YL counts only once on each band.

On the honor system, at the end of the year, send me your logs of YL contacts (sorted by band please). Hie log showing the most on the air YL contacts will receive the prize. The thought is if you get on the ah' and talk about YLRL it will bring more members into the organization and get more YLs radio active. Don't forget the YL-OM contest in February. General Rules for YLRL Contests

1. Check to make certain you are sending logs to the **CURRENT** Vice-President.

2. Logs must be postmarked no later than 30 days after each contest ends.

3. Scoring:

*Phone and CW contests will be scored separately. Separate logs must be submitted for each contest.

*One point is earned for each different station worked on each band. The same station may be worked on different bands, hr the YL-OM contest only, YLs count OMs and OMs count YLs.

*Multiplier will be the ARRL sections and/or DX countries, whichever is appropriate. Canadian provinces are counted individually. Multipliers are used only once on all bands when figuring the score.

^Contestants running a power output of 100 watts or less on CW and 200 watts PEP or less on SSB, at all times during the contest, earn a power factor of 1.5

^Computation is done by multiplying the points times the multiplier times the power factor.

*For each duplicate contact that is removed from the log by the Vice-President, a penalty of three additional and equal contacts will be exacted.

4. Logs:

*A11 logs must show the operator's ARRL section, VE province, or country to qualify for awards. Where applicable, logs must state whether or not the operator is a member of YLRL. For each QSO, logs must also state the power output. If you have 200 or more QSOs, submit a separate log for each band and submit a "dupe" sheet.

*Please type or print. Do not send carbon copies of logs. Photocopies are OK.

*Logs must be signed and show claimed score. No logs will be returned.

*Entries in log must also show time, band, date and transmitter power.

5. Exchange: Station worked, QSO number given and received, RS(T) given and received, and section/province/ country.

ELIGIBILITY: All licensed men and women operators throughout the world are invited to participate.

PROCEDURE: OMs call "CQ-YL" and YLs call "CQ-OM."

<u>OPERATION</u>: See General Rules. Participants may work only 24 hours of the 36 hours in each contest. Operating breaks must be indicated in the log.

EXCHANGE: Station worked, QSO number, RS(T), ARRL section, VE province, or country. Entries in log must also show time, band, and date.

YL-OM Contest Information continued from page 7

SCORING: (1) Phone and CW will be scored as separate contests. Submit separate logs for each contest. (2) Score each band separately. One point is earned for each different station worked on each band; YLs count only OMs and OMs count only YLs. Add together the QSO points earned for each band. (3) Multiply the number of QSOs by the total number of different ARRL sections, VE provinces, and countries worked. (4) Contestants running with a power output of 100 watts or less on CW and 200 watts PEP or less on SSB, AT ALL TIMES, may multiply the results of 3) above by 1.5 (the low power multiplier). The maximum power output that may be used at any time during the contest is 750 watts on CW and 1500 watts PEP on SSB.

LOGS: All logs must how your ARRL section, province, or country to qualify for awards. For each QSO, logs must show the station worked, QSO number given and received, RS(T) given and received, the ARRL section, VE province, or country of the station worked, time, band, and date. Logs must also state the power output used and the operating breaks taken. If you have 200 or more QSOs, submit a separate log for each band and submit a "dupe" sheet. Remember to file separate logs for each contest. Logs must show claimed score.

AWARDS: First place phone: YL-cup, OM-cup. First place CW: YL-cup, OM-cup. The second and third place YL and OM winners in each contest will receive certificates. The winner of the phone contest cup is also eligible to win the CW cup. Certificates will be awarded to the YL and OM phone and YL and OM CW winners of each U.S. and VE call district and country, provided there are at least ten valid contacts on the log.

PRESS RELEASE FROM G6HZI

Female radio hams often like to have a chat with other ladies on the air - there aren't too many around at the moment though, ladies have reported feeling slightly intimidated when faced with so many male operators and often prefer to sit on the sidelines and become SWL's.

So, here in England, UK we have come up with a groundbreaking new idea - Em IRLP/Echolink Conference Server especially for YL's.

UKLOTA * can be found on node 270165 - Echolink and will be home to YL's worldwide. The Conference Server was set up by G6HZI - Linda here in Central England.

Lin has been licensed for 24 years but spent far more time as an SWL than an operator due to raising a family and feeling a little offput by so many males on the air - "I often felt that it would be nice to have a chat with another YL, but there didn't seem many around. I have since learnt that many other YL's feel the same way so, I decided to set up my own Conference Server to help all the YL's feel more confident on the radio," says Lin, G6HZI.

Once the problem was realised, G4LCH (Repeater Keeper/Sysop for GB3DX and England Conference Server - node 7125) was asked to assist with setting up the node, which he has done and the node is now fully operational. *UI<LOTA* hope to arrange regular skeds and nets and an interactive website is currently being developed.

She and her late husband George, who was a professor at Haskell Indian Nations University and also a radio amateur, had to give up HF operation when they moved from their farm to deed-restricted quarters in town. Fortunately, the retirement home was within range of a VFIF net. The Bergs had been active in MARS—in Emma's case since 1961.

"She is very spry for her age," said Kansas State MARS Director John Halladay, AAA7KS. "Always

busy—a person we could be

proud to emulate in our own aging." Over the years Berg has served as net control operator on Kansas CW nets and was a first lieutenant in the Civil Air Patrol.

Berg, who edited the Sunflower Seeds newsletter in her younger years—when she was in her 90s—,now pens the publication's "Fun & Relaxation" articles. Her column is described as "a genial collection of aphorisms and witticisms."

The philosophy she expressed in the lead item of her New Year's Day 2005 column may sum up her view of retirement, if not of human existence in general.

"Bread may be the staff of life," she wrote, "but this is no reason anyone's life should be a continual loaf."

Emma Berg certainly has no plans for loafing. She recently renewed her Amateur Radio license for another 10 years. — Contributed by Bill Sexton, N1IN

In Our Thoughts

ADAH ELLIOTT, W9RTH A HAM FOR 64 YEARS

I first met Adali in 1958 when she gave Mike, John and I our novice exams. I had heard much about Adali, W9RTH before I went to her house because she was well known locally, the state as well as the US.

Adah got her ham license in Feb. of 1941. She often told me how she and her husband, Dick, both worked to get their license. The nearest place one could take the FCC exam in those days was in Chicago at the FCC Field Office. The both worked as well as had a family, so everyone had to pile into the family car and make a late night drive to get there and take the code and theory exam.

Adah got her license before Dick and she told me he had built a little CW rig for her and had it ready when she got home the day her Ecense came. One had to wait for the FCC to mail you license and it could be from 8 to 10 weeks before it came, so excitement ran high while one waited, wondering what call they might get. Her first contact was on 160 meters and the ham answering her was a ham located in Indianapolis where the Elliotts lived.

Decembei⁻ 7,1941 shut the ham bands down so Adah had to wait until they were open to hams again. Adah was one of the first ladies to join the Young Ladies' Radio League or YLRL. She was instrumental in organizing HAWKS, the Hoosier Amateur Women ldub, which was active over many years and she was one of the net controls for the Indiana Traffic Net and passed many messages in this area.

For a few years she and Dick moved to St. Paul, Minnesota and she had the call WORTH, but got her old call back when she returned to Seymour. It was while they were in St. Paul that Dick died of a heart attack. She came back to a telephone job that she had held before they moved and said that was what ruined her hearing.

Many of the hams around Seymour can thank Adali for helping them get their licenses because she would work with anyone interested. She was a member of the Seymour Radio Club and loved Field Day. Adah would be at Freeman Field helping to set up on Saturday and operated until time for her to go to work. Then about 4 am, she would be back operating until time to quit. She also laughed about incidents that happened like the State Police calling and telling her that she was coming in on their radio. She just lived two blocks from the State Post. Several of the young hams laughed when they heard her coming over the church speakers one Sunday.

Over the years she added QCWA (Quarter Century Wireless Association) to her list of clubs as well as QCWW (Quarter Century Wireless Women). One had to have had their license 25 years before they could belong to that group and she went on to belong to the OOT (Old, Old Times Association) where one had to be a ham for 40 years.

Adah and I went to many ham conventions all over the country and we even made the Dayton Hamvention when it was still held in a downtown hotel as well as several times later.

When Adah moved to Franklin to the Masonic Home, she took her rig with her, had an antenna for 40 meters and checked into the Indiana Traffic net whenever possible. She still held her license arid was proud of W9RTH. When I would go to visit her, she would tell me to remind her when she needed to renew her license.

The Ham community has lost a wonderful Amateur Radio Operator. We'll all miss hearing your call, Adah. Adah was 99 years old.
