#### Certificate Custodian News

As everyone knows by now, YLRLhas combined all the certificates (except continuing membership certificates) into one position. Thanks for allowing me to handle the position of Certificates Custodian. I'm going to try to keep everyone updated on what's happening with the certificates and who has earned new certificates through the YLH issues. I just started in this position about a month ago, and have been getting all the information from the former certificate custodians. I believe I have most of it now, so please be patient with me while I get all this organized and onto my computer. We're going to be making some changes ... nothing radical ... to simply the process of applying and receiving your certificates. So far we are discussing and finalizing any changes to the rules. Now don't worry, as I said above there is nothing radical about any of the changes.

Mostly we combining all the rules that are the same in all the certificates and putting that into the "General rules" rather than listing the same thing over and over. We're also going to be accepting applications by e-mail and sending out certificates attached to e-mails as much as possible. But don't worry, if you don't have e-mail or would just prefer to receive a printed certificate, I'll still be accepting applications by postal mail, and sending out printed certificates by mail as well.

While I'm getting all this sorted out, organized, and put into my computer, I hope you'll be patient with me. I do have a couple of applications for various certificates that were sent to me by the former certificate custodians, so they will be the first I'll be sending out. However, if you have sent in an application for a particular certificate and haven't received it yet, would you please send me an e-mail n8st@ att.net and tell me what certificate you applied for, so I can be sure I have everyone's applications.

### **Basic Rules Applicable To All YLRL Certificates**

- 1. Contacts made through repeater devices or any other power relay method cannot be used for any YLRL certificate confirmation.
- 2. All contacts must be made **FROM** the same country.
- 3. **DO NOT SEND QSL CARDS TO THE CUSTODIAN!** Two other Amateurs must sign the log verifying that the QSL cards are in possession of the applicant.
- 4. No charge is made for a certificate, but sufficient postage for first class mail or a stamped legal-size envelope must accompany the application to cover the cost of mailing the certificate.
- 5. For the order in which the contacts must be listed, please check the rules for each certificate.
- 6. All inquiries should be addresses to the appropriate custodian.
- 7. Decisions of the custodians regarding interpretations of the rules as here stated or later amended shall be final.
- 8. Certificate custodians and their addresses are listed in each issue of YL Harmonics.
- DX countries. List requirements are the same as for the original application.

General Rules for YLRL Contests

- 1. Check to make certain you are sending logs to the CURRENT Vice-President.
- 2. Logs must be postmarked no later than 30 days after each contest ends.
- 3. Scoring:
  - •Phone and CW contests will be scored separately. Separate logs must be submitted for each contest.
  - •One point is earned for each different station worked on each band. The same station may be worked on different bands. In the YL-OM contest only, YLs count OMs and OMs count YLs.
  - •Multiplier will be the ARRL sections and/or DX countries, whichever is appropriate. Canadian provinces are counted individually. Multipliers are used only once on all bands when figuring the score.
  - •Contestants running a power output of 100 watts or less on CW and 200 watts PEP or less on SSB, at all times during the contest, earn a power factor of 1.5
  - •Computation is done by multiplying the points times the multiplier times the power factor.
  - •For each duplicate contact that is removed from the log by the Vice-President, a penalty of three additional and equal contacts will be exacted.

### 4. Logs:

- •All logs must show the operator's ARRL section, VE province, or country to qualify for awards. Where applicable, logs must state whether or not the operator is a member of YLRL. For each QSO, logs must also state the power output. If you have 200 or more QSOs, submit a separate log for each band and submit a "dupe" sheet.
- •Please type or print. Do not send carbon copies of logs. Photocopies are OK.
- •Logs must be signed and show claimed score. No logs will be returned.
- •Entries in log must also show time, band, date and transmitter power.
- 5. Exchange: Station worked, QSO number given and received, RS(T) given and received, and section/province/ country.

**ELIGIBILITY:** All licensed men and women operators throughout the world are invited to participate. **PROCEDURE:** OMs call "CQ-YL" and YLs call "CQ-OM."

**OPERATION:** See General Rules. Participants may work only 24 hours of the 36 hours in each contest. Operating breaks must be indicated in the log.

**EXCHANGE:** Station worked, QSO number, RS(T), ARRL section, VE province, or country. Entries in log must also show time, band, and date.

**SCORING:** (1) Phone and CW will be scored as separate contests. Submit separate logs for each contest. (2) Score each band separately. One point is earned for each different station worked on each band; YLs count only OMs and OMs count only YLs. Add together the QSO points earned for each band. (3) Multiply the number of QSOs by the total number of different ARRL sections, VE provinces, and countries worked. (4) Contestants running with a power output of 100 watts or less on CW and 200 watts PEP or less on SSB, AT ALL TIMES, may multiply the results of 3) above by 1.5 (the low power multiplier). The maximum power output that may be used at any time during the contest is 750 watts on CW and 1500 watts PEP on SSB.

**LOGS:** All logs must how your ARRL section, province, or country to qualify for awards. For each QSO, logs must show the station worked, QSO number given and received, RS(T) given and received, the ARRL section, VE province, or country of the station worked, time, band, and date. Logs must also state the power output used and the operating breaks taken. If you have 200 or more QSOs, submit a separate log for each band and submit a "dupe" sheet. Remember to file separate logs for each contest. Logs must show claimed score.

**AWARDS:** First place phone: YL-cup, OM-cup. First place CW: YL-cup, OM-cup. The second and third place YL and OM winners in each contest will receive certificates. The winner of the phone contest cup is also eligible to win the CW cup. Certificates will be awarded to the YL and OM phone and YL and OM CW winners of each U.S. and VE call district and country, provided there are at least ten valid contacts on the log.

Hello again,

I have been attempting to write this column for several days now, but I had no idea what to write about. That was all until I was exploring Echo-Link one day. I was trying to make contacts, and that is when it dawned on me how important EchoLink is. Still being a Technician, I am limited to two meters. When all is quiet I turn to EchoLink. With EchoLink, I can communicate with others from not only the United States, but from around the world.

I am sure most of you, being Amateur Radio operators, know what EchoLink is. You can access EchoLink either with a radio or computer. If you are in range of a FM repeater or simplex station equipped with EchoLink, you can use DTMF commands from your radio to

access the EchoLink network. If you are a licensed Amateur Radio operator with an Internet-connected PC, you can access EchoLink directly from your PC. EchoLink comes in great for checking into weather and other nets that you cannot reach by radio. That is what makes EchoLink so important.

I have made a lot of contacts through EchoLink, especially those from foreign countries. In fact, I have even received QSL cards from some of the licensed operators that I have contacted. EchoLink is not only important, but it is fun. It is even more fun when you are accessing EchoLink with a friend. As a matter of fact, one of my licensed friends and I were accessing EchoLink just the other day. Her and I were just exploring EchoLink, seeing whom we could

contact.

We made roughly around eight contacts. Argentina being one of them. It is fascinating to me, to be able to communicate with licensed operators from other countries. Without Echo-Link, I would not be able to do that, because I do not have my HF license. That is another great thing about EchoLink. I would personally recommend EchoLink to all Amateur Radio operators, especially those that are not familiar with it. ### AN OPEN LETTER TO THE ARRL FROM THE COLORADO-YLS

Since there no longer appears to be a place to send opinions to the Editor in QST the Colorado-YLs are sending out an open letter to the Ham Radio Community.

It has been said that YL clubs don't do anything. No doubt the person did not understand how much YL's do participate in amateur radio services. For example, YL's participate in fox hunts, hot air balloon festivals, health fairs, weather nets, disaster and emergency practices and situations, tornado watch, swap fests, and Field Day. In addition, YL's serve as club officers (they are good club secretaries or treasurers) for various repeater clubs. Although they may not publish any technical articles, they do a good job of typing the manuscripts for the OM who do. The philosophy for most YL clubs is that they contribute their service through the existing clubs that include the OM or their children. The opinion is that this system of cooperation avoids unnecessary competition between YL clubs and other organizations. It has been said that it is surprising how much good you can do if you don't care who gets the credit.

We regret that ARRL no longer recognizes that the YL clubs are contributing organizations the same as DX-ers, Contesters, and other special interest groups of amateur radio.

Congratulations to Amy, KB3HXF on all of her accomplishments!



In addition, YLs serve as club officers (they are good club secretaries or treasurers) for various repeater clubs. Although they may not publish any technical articles, they do a good job of typing the manuscripts for the OM who do. The philosophy for most YL clubs is that they contribute their service through the existing clubs that include the OM or their children. The opinion is that this system of cooperation avoids unnecessary competition between YL clubs and other organizations. It has been said that it is surprising how much good you can do if you don't care who gets the credit.

We regret that ARRL no longer recognizes that the YL clubs are contributing organizations the same as DXers, Contesters, and other special interest groups of amateur radio.

It is my hope that in the future, the ARRL will realize that YL's <u>is</u> a special interest group, too.

### First YL Team Ever in WRTC 2006

Diane Ortiz, K2DO was on hand for the historic event of the first YL team ever for the World Radiosport Team Championship. Here's her report.

They were the first ever YL team to officially participate in the World Radiosport Team Championship. But it almost didn't happen.



There was a financial problem with one of the airlines and their attempt to get replacement tickets was unsuccessful. The head of the steering committee Atilano de Oms, PY5EG announced that the Czech team sent their regrets but would not be able to make the event.

What is the attraction of WRTC? Why do hams, known for their frugal ways, spend thousands of dollars and days and weeks preparing for this event? There is no money prize, no front-page announcement in the world press, no green jacket, no hometown parade. They even have to bring their own radios, computers and accessories (although some were provided). It's a lot of work,

but Amateur Radio operators from all over the world submitted applications to the WRTC committee listing their qualifications, hoping to get a spot on a team or as a referee. Once the selection was announced, the teams had some time to organize, strategize and practice.

They also had to make travel arrangements so they could be in Florianopolis, Brazil July 6-10, 2006.

In the meantime, the Brazilians had a tremendous challenge - finding 47 locations in and around Florianopolis that were within a traveling distance of 3 hrs or less. There had to be reasonable accommodations and, most important, good radio propagation locations. The ideal would be to have all of them exactly equal, but that would be impossible. But

they came very close. Most of the sites had a clear shot to the north and east. Many were inland, but most were on or near the coast. Accommodations ranged from extremely spartan (a campground office in a barnlike structure that was closed for the winter - no bathroom facility), to luxurious (e.g. a hotel suite near HQ, a multilevel private home perched on a hilltop).

The luck of the draw



found Emily P43E and Ann WAIS in the small attic space of a private home not too far from WRTC HQ. Unfortunately there was a large hill to the north, power lines nearby and "Murphy" blew out one of their switches. The entrance to their station was a steep outside staircase and open curtain to an area with a commode and shower (used for luggage storage). An open doorway led to their operating area, set up with two tables, chairs and a window. There wasn't much room for the referee (Fabio Schettino I4UFH) or visitors after all the equipment was set up. They used Writelog on their laptops and two IC-756 Pro 3 transceivers.

Despite the difficulties, the YL team was able to complete the contest using the call PW5J with a score of 878,712 points. "It was a great experience," Ann said. "I can't wait to do it again!"
