By the time you read this, chances are the code requirement will be gone and anyone with a license will be able to get on HF. Those of you who have been on the air, I want you take a new YL, one who has never been on HF (or only on during Field Day) and get her to help you out with a contest. I want to see the logs for each contest as least double, otherwise I will recommend we eliminate some of these contests. It is frustrating to those YLs and OMs who get on and who keep calling CQ YL, CQ YL and no one respond. I am guilty of not working all the contests too so don't think I am excusing myself. I had problems with my rig for Howdy Days but was able to hear some YLs so I'm listed as a checklog, for YL-API was out of town but I don't have an excuse for the other two contest. I plan to try to work at least 2 contest this year. I encourage everyone to try to work at least 1 contest. That alone will increase participation. Ok, off my soap box.

There was only 1 log submitted for the 2006 SSB DXYL to NA YL Contest, - WX4MM who received a first place certificate.

There was only 2 logs submitted for Howdy Days: First Place: WX4MM - 6 points Second Place: K4MHG. - 3 points KC4IYD was a check-log as I had rig problems.

There was 4 logs submitted for YL Anniversary Party SSB Contest: First Place DX -YL Cup: DL3LG - 234 points Second Place DX-YL DJ1TE - 93 points Third Place DX-YL: GM4YMM - 36 points First Place NA-YL Cup: KAOBAT - 48 points

— No logs were submitted for the CW portion. Also, I had to correct scoring on several logs. The scoring is lpoint for every station in your country/ continent and 2 points for a station outside your country / continent. Multiply that by the total number of ARRL sections/ provinces or countries. In addition, the DXYLs were out there but very few NA-YLs were making contacts.

I've noticed that there has been a delay with Tuller Trophy so if you are supposed to receive a cup for one of the contests and haven't received it, let me know. Also, everyone should've received their certificate by the time you read this, if you haven't received a certificate or submitted a log and don't see it listed, please email me. I already had one instance where I had the wrong address for someone so they never received a certificate or trophy.

I didn't think it would actually come to pass, but on December 15 2006,1 received a telephone call from a fellow amateur radio operator who informed me that the Federal **Communications Commission** (FCC) had eliminated Morse code requirements. Morse code will no longer be a requirement for earning any Amateur Radio license.

While many Amateur Radio operators continue to learn and use Morse code, now it is for their own enjoyment of the skill. Amateur Radio operators, for years, have been using newer

Since 1991 it has been possible to earn a Technician class license without passing a Morse code examination, but in order to upgrade to a General or Amateur Extra one was required to pass a 5 words-per-minute Morse code examination. Within just a few days that it had been announced that the Morse code requirement was being dropped, there seemed to be a great demand for study materials for upgrading licenses. Many Amateur Radio operators, including myself, feel as if we will have a growth of Technicians upgrad-



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LIBYA 2006

It doesn't happen often to receive an invitation to participate at a long expected and dreamed DXpedition and the word "LIBYA" sounded great to me. I didn't need much time to take the decision to go or not, but my family was not very convinced to let me go to Libya, it took much time, patience and feminine tactic! To my husband I often talked about all the incoming e-mails, the preparations of the team, the journey, the visa-problems etc. and one day he asked me: Do you really want to go there? Well, of course but only with your permission, I said and soon it was a daily talking about Libya, the trip, how to reach Tripoli and so on. Well, I got the permission as my birthday-gift!

Now my personal preparations could start; I decided to travel on my own instead of joining the team in Frankfurt (a much longer way, with night overstays, twice). So I needed a personal Visa, not a collective one as for the rest of the team and this made things much more complicated. Our 2 main- organizers already had foreseen a date for this DXpedition for March 2006 but the delay of the arrival of the visa made it impossible and they had to change the date for the last two weeks of November, which included the CQWW CW Contest.

I started the usual procedure for the demand of the visa quite early; luckily in Palermo we have the Libyan Consulate. In August, our main organizer Andy DJ7IK told me on his mail that very soon I would receive the official invitation-the visa, directly from Tripoli. Nothing seemed to go wrong until the departure day came closer and I had no visa yet in my hands. As days passed, nothing arrived from Tripoli, but as often happens in Arabian countries, things take much longer than expected. Mustapha DL1BDF our man with Arabian roots and perfect Arab- speaking assured me that the visa would arrive in time, INCHALLAH! But "Allah" never is in a hurry! Day after day the promise for the visa, assured by phone calls from Mustapha, but nothing, what a stress. At the Palermo Airport they told me that without the official invitation- confirm from Tripoli, they would not let me take the plane, strict rules. Waiting, was something 1/ we had to learn during our stay in Libya because the way of estimate or measuring time in Libya or other Arabic countries is much different from ours! Well, at the end, 2 days before my planned departure, the blessed visa arrived, but all written in Arab, I could make out only my passport number. Let's go!

The short trip from Palermo to Tripoli was ok, and at the arrival at the Airport in Tripoli I was supposed to be expected and picked up at the staircase of the plane. But nobody nearby, no known face, so I proceeded to the Main-entrance, then to the passport control, where a gloomy faced man asked me for the VISA which was not in my passport, but supposed to be deposited at his desk!

Problems ahead for me. To make things short, I had to wait for hours; my passport was confiscated, disappeared together with a guy, who remembered his face? Then finally a girl shouted out my name, asked for my passport, I denied having it, and whatever she said was not understandable, her English was on a low level. She asked me for money to change for the payment of the visa and I trustfully handed her 100 Euro and she disappeared for an hour but came back with the rest of the money and the freshly stamped visa on my passport, cost 80 Euro. —Finally, at last!

We claimed my baggage, which was waiting lonely since hours, triple security check where nobody really checked, (I could have illegally introduced a lot of stuff) then out of the building to a waiting car with two men -our bodyguards! I was happy, grateful to have finally reached my destination, tired and thirsty, 4 hours after my arrival in Libya. The Janzour Tourist Village, 20km west of Tripoli, our Hotel for the next 2 weeks, very big and large, directly on the beach of the Mediterranean Sea and with plenty of good places around for all the antennas.

Hotel check- in, room-key handed over and passport taken in custody; I would see it again only on my departure. Hotel bill paid and room-key returned- Rules! At this moment I understood that the girl meeting me at the Airport is a member of ASS AKER, the local radio club.

Our Team of 5A7A was quite international, 8 different countries representing: DJ7IK, Andy DL1EJA, Oliver DL1BDF, Mustapha DL5CW, Andy DF2SS, Volkmar

DL8YHR, FrankDF6QV, FranzDL9USA, Andi DJ2OV, Jurgen HB9DTE, PirminDJ7EO, MarkusIT9ESZ, RuthDJ8NK, Jan JH1NBN, Yuki DJ9CB, Gunter K1LZ, KrassyDK1BT, ManfredIC3LP, DavidDK1II, Franz N2OW, Dima (RA9USU) DK2DO, WolfgangON5GA, AdrianoDK7PE, RudiPAOR, Rein DIC7YY, Falk VE6OH, Mitch DK8FD, Alex

The first thing I wanted to do was to see the operating sight some antennas could be seen from far away and this made my heart beat stronger. I met the entire team at suppertime, which we usually took all together in the Restaurant just below our operating level. The group was quite big, 27 operators from 8 different countries + 5 persons (wives, daughter, friends), all no hams from Germany, had joined us; we were a bunch of 32 people. Among all OM's I had a prestigious place as the only YL operator and was respected, spoiled and I always found help in critical situations, mainly with the Laptop or the antenna...

During the first days of our stay, the OM's were occupied with the set-up of the 6 stations, getting all the antennas up in the right place, connecting all the 10 Laptops from different countries. The cooperation of our specialists was perfect, each one of the team gave his valuable contribution in order to make the operating plan efficient. Rein PAOR and Pirmin HB9DTE took are of the WIN-TEST installation and Mitch was our man for a WLAN. The Butternut HF9V was the first antenna up followed by the 2 Spiderbeams for 5 bands, two 4-Square for 40 and 80 meters, the Titanex V160E for 160 meters and finally the giant Spiderbeam for 20, 30, 40 meters which required strong physical forces. Friday morning 17th of Nov. the last antenna was installed, farther away from the main operating sight, with nearby a military observation point on a hilltop, present night and day, they also kept an eye on what was going on around them and at the sight of the last antenna they asked to move it further away from their watching position, too close by, they said.

The announcement was made during the 2006 Ohio Section Conference (September 16) by Ohio Section Manager, Joe Phillips K8QOE. The late Mr. Severson, who became a silent key in 1997, was a distinguished member of the ARRL Board of Directors and former Ohio SM. The sentence — "His dedication to serve amateur radio inspired a whole generation of Ohio Section Leadership," — is on every Severson memorial certificate. "In every thing she does for Ohio hams, Connie exemplifies the spirit of the late Mr. Severson," Phillips said in announcing the award.

Besides running the Ohio Single Side Band Net (OSSBN), Connie is Assistant Section Manager for Southeast Ohio. In her many appearances at SE Ohio clubs, she is often the first ARRL official to speak at that club in decades. Connie is a longtime Buckeye Belles member as well. Connie was licensed WD8MIO in 1977 and joined the OSSBN to take up traffic handling the very next year. In the early 80s, she served as manager of the 8th call area Region Cycle 2 and received the OSSBN Merit Award in 1982. In 2000, she upgraded to Extra class and changed her call to N8IO. She is currently serving the latest of many terms as OSSBN Net Manager. This is an elected position. Connie is well known throughout Ohio as the "hug lady" as she expects a hug from every one as one would expect a handshake. At the Section Conference on accepting tire honor, Connie led the entire conference in an impromptu version of "Let Me Call You Sweetheart." The award was established in 1992 as Ohio Ham of the Year and was renamed in 1999 to honor Mr. Severson.

She was full of spirit, happiness, laughter and would always make you smile even when you were sad. Judi served as the Vice President of the Anchorage club for several years. She loved her horse and was very active in the planning of the Alaska State Fair and the amateur radio stations set up at the fair each year. In October Judi had heart surgery. While recovering, she suffered a stroke on 1 /10/2007, her 61st birthday. On 1/V7, doctors performed surgery to remove her spleen due to an infection and unfortunately she did not survive the operation.
