



Youth News de Emily Bishop, WE4MB

Last time we talked about the 6 meters, the Magic Band and how much fun it can be. This time I want to talk about 2 meters. I have a 10element 2-meter beam installed horizontally on my tower. Installing a 2-meter beam horizontally works better for single sideband operation. For FM operation you would install the beam vertically because of the pattern needed for FM repeater use. On another tower we have what is called a Cubit Ouad 2m/440 beam. It is an 8element beam (4 elements are 2 meters and 4 elements are 440). This beam can be used for either FM or SSB operation, but if you turn it 90 degrees it can be used for both FM and SSB. By installing the beam in tliis fashion it will become less efficient (meaning it will not work as good if installed horizontal or vertically but will work well enough to use for FM and SSB operation). Most 2 meter radios are FM only but there are several all mode radios made today that can operate 2 meter SSB. All mode means the radio can operate AM/FM/SSB.

The calling frequency for 2 meter SSB is 144.200 USB. It is not uncommon to make contacts 100 miles away even if there isn't a band opening. When the band is open you may be able to make contact 1000 miles away. Most hams in local areas

use 2-meter repeaters to talk to each other. It is not uncommon to be able to talk 75 or even 100 miles away if you are using a repeater that is installed on a mountaintop with plenty of elevation. Some hams talk to each other by using FM simplex. FM Simplex is simply talking in FM mode on a single frequency radio to radio. When talking radio to radio by FM simplex the rules of VHF come into play and that is the VHF signals are "Line of Sight" meaning that VHF signals will not go over mountains or ridges. The landscape has to be flat or each operator needs an antenna that is high enough to send signals over the higher spots of the landscape. Most times you cannot talk very far by using FM simplex. If you are in a good location talking you may be able to talk 10 or 20 miles on a good day. If you are mobile or on a handi talkie the range is much less. By using 2 meter SSB you talk much further because of the way the signal travels. You are not limited by "Line of Sight" any longer because of the path of a horizontally installed antenna.

If you do not have a radio capable of operating 2 meter SSB see if you can find a ham in your local area or radio club who has one. I'm sure they will be happy to show you the fun in 2 meter SSB operation.

As most of you know I started High School last fall. I am a freshman at Walker Valley High School in Bradley County, Tennessee. I found out very fast that High School in nothing like middle school and the work is very different and in most case much harder. I was and still am having a little trouble with math but with the help and dedication from my teachers and parents I am doing better. I understand nothing is more important at this stage of my life (other than my Lord Jesus Christ) than my education. In this day and time and our Nation's economic condition we, as young people need a college education more than ever. I encourage each of you to rededicate yourself to getting a good education and to concentrate more than ever on your grades. I am told High School is the most fun time in one's life but don't get lost in the fun and lose sight of your education. I want go into the medical field and the only way I can do this is by having good grades.

CLARA MEMBER AIDS HAITI

Margaret, VE2ZOO, has had her ham license since she was 12 and she has been a CLARA member most of that time. The peak *of* her ham activity was when she was 14 and we all went to St Paul Is., 15 miles off the coast of Nova Scotia as CY9CWI. Margaret became very good at working 20 meter pile-ups!

In 2007 Margaret invested her life savings in a 1970s 50-foot steel schooner, *SV Drummer*. She laboured for three winters in a central Florida boatyard, overhauling it from stem to stern. Drummer was finally launched into the muddy Caloosahatchee River in early December 2009. As HF radio is a valuable long-distance aid to blue-water cruisers, we gave her our trusty Icom IC-735 transceiver, the same radio she used on St. Paul Is. in 1994.1 (Fred) installed it and a 34' vertical antenna in December, and as a reward went on *Drummer's* first fully rigged sail since she went into storage in Glades Boatyard 20 years before!

Margaret, with her crew Chrissie and Nathan, cast off in January, sailed down the Caloosahatchie River out to Sanibel Island, off Ft. Myers. By February 12, 2010, after Haiti's earthquake. *Drummer* was moored off Key West with other blue water cruisers and friends of Chrissie's. They learned of a Key West group, the "Conch Republic Navy", which was organizing sailboats to deliver aid to a little port in Haiti. Many Haitian ports are too shallow for large boats, and many have received little or no assistance. Margaret volunteered, loaded two tonnes of

relief supplies in Key West, then sailed on to Nassau, then George Town, Exeuma (Bahamas) to await the rest of the flotilla.

Word Went out in the "Conch Republic Navy" that Margaret was an experienced ham operator, licensed since she was 12. She hadn't operated since she was 14, but apparently, Margaret had more ham knowhow than anyone else in the flotilla! After various delays waiting for all boats to load and arrive, the flotilla left George Town for Haiti on about March 4. It included the schooners *Liberty*, **Wo** Z/(Capt. Finbar), and *Drummer* (Cap't. Margaret), and other sailboats *Hiatus*, *En Cavale*, *Conch Republic*, and *Tranquility*, all members in good standing of the "Conch Republic Navy". OceanWatch boats *Wild Woman* (Capt., Judy), and *De Capo*, were also part of the group.

The flotilla's departure date, course, and arrival port were kept as secret as possible for fear of hungry and piratical people with boats. Margaret radioed in most days on the Waterway Net (7268 kHz) or the Maritime Service Net (14300 kHz), or both. These nets were also very good about relaying when needed. It was a very nice feeling to talk to her from our station at 25 Canard St. here in Nova Scotia!

March 9 and Margaret was in the small Haitian port. The first boat to arrive, the *Wolf on* the 8th, had found chaos, with hungry people packing the beach, and *Wolf's* cargo did not go to the right people: they Watched helplessly as the landed cargo was snatched by marauders. When *Drummer* arrived a local Episcopal priest, Pere Soner, and the police chief were there, and Margaret's cargo, about 2 tonnes, was unloaded from *Drummer* into dugout canoes, and was directed to the proper people.

There were tense hours on March 9th when we tried without success to reach her by HF radio to relay a message about off-loading, and there were satellite phone reports that no one had heard from *SV Drummer*. This was during the CLARA contest, so there was a while during prime contest time that I was not able to give out the mystery op points!

Margaret asked me (Helen) on the radio to phone the mother of one of her crew (Nathan) to tell her that he was safe but I got the phone number wrong in the static & crackles. Darn! I'd love to have passed that message!

Margaret was in Haiti at the same time as Governor General Michaelle Jean, but Mme. Jean was on a much bigger boat and drew much more media attention. The Florida media were quite interested in the flotilla, but they were not encouraged to publicize the event because of the danger of piracy.

The organizers said good things about Margaret, because of all the captains, she was the one who could use amateur radio to keep those back in North America apprised of their progress.

102-year-old woman tunes back in to ham

ST. CATHARINES — The crackle emanating from the little black box transported Ethel Williamson back in time a few decades and whisked her halfway around the world at the same time.

The former lighthouse keeper, who turned 103 in March, clapped her hands in delight as the voice of a stranger in Melbourne, Australia, broke the static on the little ham radio that sits by the window in her room at a St. Catharines long-term-care home.

"Can you imagine what it is?" she said Monday afternoon, shortly after chatting to the man through the radio's hand-held microphone. "To be able to talk to Australia — it's a miracle, it really is."

It had been at least 20 years since Williamson had spoken to anyone via radio, but the Welland branch of the Handy Ham Amateur Radio Club of Canada set up a radio for her at Niagara Ina Grafton Gage Village so she could get back on the airwaves.

"I can't believe that. It's wonderful, it's just wonderful," she said after testing it out the first time.

Williamson learned how to operate ham radios after the Second World War when she and her late husband, Cyril, raised their sons, Doug and Bruce, while running the Port Weller lighthouse.

The couple lived at the landmark overlooking the lake for 25 years.

Williamson learned Morse code and earned her radio operator's licence nearly 60 years ago, taking the call letters she still has today — VE3DTW.

Decades before the advent of personal computers, e-mail and Facebook, ham radios made the world a smaller place.

"I love meeting new people more than anything else," Williamson said. "It was lonely out there (at the lighthouse) sometimes and the radio allowed me to meet people from all over the world."

But radio wasn't Williamson's only way to speak out. She wrote about her family's life in the lighthouse in a 1972 book, A Light on the Seaway, and penned numerous articles for newspapers and magazines.

"It was the most wonderful life you can ever imagine," she said.

Williamson's husband died in 1988 after the couple had been married for 61 years and son Bruce, a printer at The Standard for 43 years, died three weeks ago.

An energetic and healthy centenarian, Williamson keeps her hands busy most days knitting wool hats to keep the needy warm in winter. She has made more than 1,500 of them over the years and donated them to various charities around Niagara.

"I love to make them. I give them to anyone who needs one."

Williamson expects her newly installed ham radio may prompt her to put down her knitting needles and once again strike up conversations with other radio enthusiasts around the globe.

"Once I get over the excitement, I think I'll use it," she said.

For radio buffs, Williamson's repeater can be found at frequency 147300, tone of 107.2 and an IRLP of 2248.

So HF operations during emergency or normal operations are a critical component of communication with remote Alaska.

Some of you may be aware that I volunteered to assist with the new YLRL web site upgrades. In an effort to preserve our organization history and also to Page 22

lead our organization into the 21st century.

Some of the new items that you will notice include: a Silent Key Page, a Photo Gallery area. Links to each officer, a membership application page, a scholarship page where we hope to place current information and past winners information and more information about the history of YLRL and YLRL products that are available.

This has been an enjoyable project for me and as someone who cannot attend the conferences; it is my way of contributing to the organization from a distance. While I have contributed greatly to the overhaul of the web site, Nancy KC4IYD will remain the primary Webmaster.

The other major upgrades are a members only section which will have the current issues of YL HARMONICS available to members and we hope to archive issues of YL *Harmonics* as they are scanned and preserved.

Basic Rules Applicable To All YLRL Certificates

- 1. Contacts made through repeater devices or any other power relay method cannot be used for any YLRL certificate confirmation.
- 2. All contacts must be made **FROM** the same country.
- 3. **DO NOT SEND QSL CARDS TO THE CUSTODIAN!** Two other Amateurs must sign the log verifying that the QSL cards are in possession of the applicant.
- 4. No charge is made for a certificate, but sufficient postage for first class mail or a stamped legal-size envelope must accompany the application to cover the cost of mailing the certificate.
- 5. For the order in which the contacts must be listed, please check the rules for each certificate.
- 6. All inquiries should be addresses to the appropriate custodian.
- 7. Decisions of the custodians regarding interpretations of the rules as here stated or later amended shall be final.
- 8. Certificate custodians and their addresses are listed in each issue of YL Harmonics.

The YLRL Certificates program is off to a good start for 2010. Remember we have a new certificate for 2010 only. It's called the YLRL Birthday Certificate and is a little easier than the 2009 Certificate. This year you only have to work 12 YLs (well, you might need to work more than 12 to get the right combination). What you need is one YL who has a birthday for each month of the year. We already have one YL who has completed this award. Send only your log ... no need to wait for QSL cards for this one. But you have to make all contacts within the year of 2010. 2010 YLRL Birthday Certificate

Certificate number 1 goes to Linda Harvey VE1QT from N.S. CANADA. Linda was the first to complete last year's certificate too. It will be interesting to see if she can keep this up every year. <Grin>

WAS-YL (Worked All States)
