YLRL is a non-profit organization, granted under section (501) (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, comprised of women amateur radio operators, incorporated as such under the laws of the state of California. Dues are \$15.00 a year US and \$25.00 per year DX, (which included airmail) due and payable January 1, and delinquent February 1st. For new and reinstating (lapsed more than 2 years) members joining after June 30th, dues are pro-rated by half the annual dues for that fiscal year. An additional \$4.00 required for Canada and Mexico airmail. Dues for a licensed YL family member (residing at the same address) are \$3.00. Subscriptions for non-members are \$15.00 per year and may not be pro-rated for portions of years. Subscribers must add the same extra postage, for mailing outside of the United States of \$10.00.

Thank-you again.








New Members for March/April 2014



Basic Rules Applicable To All YLRL Certificates

- 1. Contacts made through repeater devices or any other power relay method cannot be used for any YLRL certificate confirmation.
- 2. All contacts must be made **FROM** the same country.
- 3. **DO NOT SEND QSL CARDS TO THE CUSTODIAN!** Two other Amateurs must sign the log verifying that the QSL cards are in possession of the applicant.
- 4. No charge is made for a certificate, but sufficient postage for first class mail or a stamped legal-size envelope must accompany the application to cover the cost of mailing the certificate.
- 5. For the order in which the contacts must be listed, please check the rules for each certificate.
- 6. All inquiries should be addresses to the appropriate custodian.
- 7. Decisions of the custodians regarding interpretations of the rules as here stated or later amended shall be final.
- 8. Certificate custodians and their addresses are listed in each issue of YL Harmonics.


Hello YLs:

From Shirley Volkening daughter of Raymond Wardell, W8ROX

Dear Lois

Thank you for the information. Providing scholarships as you all do is a very fine thing to do and you are right to he proud of YLRL for doing so. It was good that my parents could share their interest in radio. Without Morse code they would never have met.

My dad, Ray, W8ROS got his amateur radio license as a teenager and was finishing his first shipping season working as a radio operator on a Great Lakes freighter when the LIS entered WWII. He enlisted, went to radio school and then to England to serve as a radio operator on a B'17. Meanwhile my mother who was working as a secretary saved up her money and went to school to learn to be a civilian instructress in Morse code, which lead to a job teaching code in the radio school at an air base.

When my dad had finished flying his combat missions he returned to the States and was assigned to keep order in a classroom at an airbase - my mother's classroom. She did not know that the soldier assigned to her classroom knew code until he sent her a message one day on an empty key. Sort of like to-day's young people texting I guess. That was the beginning. My dad always was involved in ham radio and also worked for some years in commercial radio. In the early sixties my mother got involved in electronics first by building a Heathkit stereo. Then sometime in the late sixties 1 remember accompanying her when she went in to take her tests for her amateur radio license. She and my dad were also members of the Motor City Radio Club. She helped a lot of people prepare for the Morse code test. Anyway my parents' house was always easy to spot. It was the one with the 48-foot tower in the back yard.

1 am working hard on my senior thesis and look forward to graduation in May. All the best! Thanks again!





You asked about weather here in Finland. Everything is quite upside down, I think. We had no snow at Christmas and we don't have snow now, in January. I will tell about the situation in the area where I live. Kuopio is about 400 km north from Helsinki the capital city of Finland. The northern area of Finland we call by the name Lapland and their climate is different, colder.

Here in Kuopio we normally get snow; I mean snow that does not melt away before spring, sometimes in October, sometimes in November and not very often in December. I remember that couple of decades ago we had winter game in October but nowadays seldom. I think that lately the beginning of winter (snow) comes more and more often in December.

Yesterday when I went shopping and dentist, temperature was plus 4 degrees Celsius. Incredible!!! Everything looks very dark and very ugly there are no colors, normally we have pure white snow everywhere.

Yesterday in the evening, TV-news told that there has been very cold area over USA

(A cold area that normally is near the center of North Pole had moved over USA) and it had effected also to other countries. Because of it we have been so warm.

They promised that it will be fixed later this week and the weatherman has promised us colder weather and snow that would be very fine.

Our winter with cold weather is not the same as you suffered now. Here can be minus 30 C, but people use cars and go to work and children to school. The life goes on. In Lapland it can be minus 40 degrees and a little bit more. The weather is very dry in winter.

Inside of our homes temperature is plus 20-23 degrees Celsius. Our windows have triple glass and we have central heating on all day and night and houses have isolation inside their walls. From postcard to Ham Radio!

One of my hobbies is collecting postcards. My imagination was stimulated by the amateur radio through this interest. The virus of amateur radio took me for a walk on the highest mountain in the Black Forest. The radio amateur Lothar, managed his equipment, bike and trailer to his QTH the Hornisgrinde.



This weekend, a contest ran to 10 GHz. Lothar answered my questions, explained his act and my OM and I QSOs with Switzerland and Austria. He made us aware of the DARC and explained to us the meaning of a QSL - card. My Postcard enthusiasm grew wings. From the experience, I was intrigued and asked me to speak, using a microphone and a radio with a station in Japan, as well, as for how get a postcard. Thus my heart was beating a little faster and I dreamed of postcards from around the world. For this purpose, I had yet something to be learned and implement. I had no idea of electronics and radio technology, as seen on the photo, I was busy in botany. With the support of my OM Hans I learned formulas convert, calculate,

measure current and voltage, circuit diagrams draw, read laws, as well as radio operating under the call sign DN4IG, all this in a period of about 6 months.

Then the day of the test came with the regulatory authority. With the passing the exam and the call sign DB1ICB in my pocket; I was "ON THE AIR".

The compounds were in the 2m and 70cm band not bad, but not so according to my wishes. It was not to USA, Asia, and Africa directly. My conclusion: this was only possible after a CW test. For my goal QSL - cards were missing me the Morse code. CW I have seen as a foreign language and learned as such. Support in the learning phase, I got myself in botany. All plants and trees in my QRL are marked with signs. Thus I was able to implement the whole day the learned Morse code and test what I had learned.

On 29 November 2002, the examination CW was announced. On this day the dream DX came true for me. With the call sign DL1ICB In November 2002, 1 am on the air. My equipment is a 5 band cellular antenna on the railing on our balcony on the 3rd Stock, and a ICOM IC -756 Pro II.

During the 10m contest in December I worked stations from North and South America, Asia and Europe. Now it was no longer a dream but I could still dream of DX QSL - cards. In 2006, QTH change; in the new QTH our antenna system was further expanded. An 18 m lattice tower, and a 5 band 16 elements Opti Beam, OB 16-5 since 2007 to 700 m above sea level. The 100 watts of IC 756 have been adjusted by an EXPERT KI, 750 watts. In 2010, we secured a double Zepp on the property. With the Double Zepp and a symmetrical coupler around the KW area can be tuned, in addition a Kelemen dipole for 40, 20,15 and 10 m.

Well after a few years as well as amateur radio DX, my interest has been extended: Collect information from YLs from around the world. In between time, I have data from approximately 51,000 YLs with call sign, address, e-mail, stored in folders by country and call sign. Through this YL data I can, in between time have contact with several YLs sked. The fascination with DX and especially to YLs

is unbroken. Due to the amateur radio I can still wander into the distance and dream, dream! Christiane (Tina), DL1CBI

Running with Restrictions



What are your earliest memories of ham radio? Strange sounds from far away? Racks of equipment glowing in the dark? For me, nothing screams ham radio like a gleaming antenna on a tower. Unfortunately many of us live in apartment or a neighborhood with covenants and restrictions that limit our ability to erect useful antennas.

I live part time in a small condo in a city. When I was first licensed, all I had was an HT. In nice weather, I used a park picnic table in my neighborhood as my shack. That was OK, but rain, cold or people having lunch gave me a less than reliable QTH. When I upgraded my license and gained HF privileges, I tried everything at my condo including loading up a gutter (think sparks!) using a thin wire as a vertical outside my window, running a wire on the floor. Nothing worked well plus the location had terrible line noise. During my experimentation, I earned a "Worked All Appliances" having interfered with just about every electronic device in my building. Finally, I had an idea that just might work.

My OM and I also have a place on a lake about 30 miles from town. That location is in a restricted community, but with plenty of trees our wire antennas are almost invisible. Given its rural location we generally have no line noise or other interference. The issue was how to use that location's antennas from our city condominium.

Although I have had a computer for years, a computer is not a radio. It does not look like a radio or have controls like a radio. So computer control was out for me. I found a device that allowed me to separate the control head of my ICOM 706 from the radio body by many miles using the internet. Since both locations had internet access already, I figured it was a go. A few weeks later the postman arrived with two small boxes and a separation cable. After the normal confusion of configuring something for the internet along with the need to cut a perfectly good (and expensive) separation cable in half and solder wires that looked about the size of a strand of hair I was ready to try it out. Voila! It worked. The strange sounds of ham radio poured from the radio with no gleaming antennas in sight!
