Anita Kemmerer, AB1QB:





Ria Jairam, N2RJ:

The 13 colonies special event has been held every year since 2009 during the week of Independence day. Special callsigns from K2A through K2M are issued, one for each of the 13 original colonies. There is a special certificate for working all of the stations. There is also a special station WM3PEN in Philadelphia and GB13COL in Britain for special endorsements.

Ria, N2RJ had initially learned of the event from sorting bureau QSL cards, and decided to get on and work the stations and apply for the certificate. After working them all she saw that her friend Eric, N2KOJ, was one of the operators and asked about operating. After contacting Mike, KA2FIR, she was added to the roster and while she only operated approximately 3 hours, she made over 400 contacts. She will be operating next year and hopes to do a full effort with more operating time.

Andrea Slack, K2EZ:

I guess one piece of old, yet new news, is from the January VHF contest. The ARRL finally published the results in QST. In the Limited Rover category, I got a second place nationally with a score very close to the first place station and won the Great Lakes Division. The ARRL gave me a good mention in the article as well mentioning the 27 grids I activated set a record for grid activations.



The ARRL also included a picture of my January VHF Contest QSL which shows my 1700-mile route.

On the weekend of June 11th and 12th I was active in the June VHF for the second time. Since my start point was within the Cape Cod National Seashore, I did a National Parks On the Air (NPOTA) activation a couple hours before the VHF contest started. That was my 17th National Parks Activation and I worked just about 50 stations in an hour or so of operating.

This is a picture of my vehicle at my Cape Cod location configured for the VHF contest and the NPOTA activation.

The June VHF contest was exciting as well as a learning experience. Once again I was operating as a Limited Rover and was hoping to activate 14 or 15 grids. For those not familiar with the VHF contest, a rover station is one that moves from one grid to another during the contest. "Activating" a grid means making one or more QSOs from within that grid.

The 14 to 15 grid plan was much less demanding than my 27 grid effort in January, but still would require the better portion of 1000 road miles during the contest period. That doesn't include all the miles from NJ to my starting point in Cape Cod.

For a rover like me, the vehicle always seems to play a big part in contest preparation and issues during the contest. I have had radio and antenna problems, but these have been small compared to vehicle headaches.

As usual the vehicle comes due for an oil change and starts leaking coolant just days before the contest. I could not get the coolant issue resolved before the contest so had to evaluate if I had to cancel or scale it back my participation in the contest. It seemed that it would only leak when cold and that when warmed up the leak rate was really slow. So with gallons of extra water I headed out to Cape Cod.

The contest itself started out slow. While I was in a relatively rare grid, other stations rarely pointed their beams my way because there was little more than open ocean. Had 6m been open the rare grid would have drawn lots of attention to me, but alas 6m was not open. About 90 minutes into the contest I proceeded to head off the Cape for the next grid in my route. About an hour away from the Cape, 6m opens up big time. My dumb luck!!! There was no way to know how long it would be open so I proceeded on my route. Had I known it would be open for most of the day and most of the next day I probably would have turned around and at least operated there as long as I could continue to get contacts.

The big thing that everyone will remember from this June's VHF contest will be the 6M opening. There was amazing 6m propagation from where I was north into Canada, down to Florida, out to Texas, much of the Midwest and event out into Arizona. As a rover, with limited 6m antenna, this opening did not favor me as much as it favored fixed stations with big beams. Another consequence of the big 6m opening meant most of the single operator stations were off on 6m which cost me lots of opportunity for 2M and higher band contacts. What I picked up in 6m multipliers were canceled out by multipliers that were not gotten on 2M, 1.25m and 70cm.

The most exciting time of the contest was after 11:30pm on Saturday. Usually things die down as stations go off the air for the night and it becomes hard to get a QSO. This contest was different. As 6m closed, suddenly those who were off on other bands back on 2m and the higher bands. From 11:30pm till when I went to bed I worked 50 QSOs. That is about 20% of all the QSOs I worked in the contest! Previously I would have been lucky to get 5 or 10 QSOs that late.

Despite all the concerns about the coolant, this was not a problem. Except for the four hours I was sleeping, the vehicle was running almost continuously for the 33-hour contest period. By early afternoon

Sunday things were looking positive. My concerns about an overheat were distant. I was in Maryland and had just crossed into a new grid. There was a rest area about half a mile away that sat atop a hill. That was my intended stop to work some stations. It was also, just about as far as I was going to get from home Sunday. Then suddenly I hear a horrible noise and feel a drag on the vehicle. One of my front tires had ruptured. I had to get off the road immediately and couldn't make the rest area. By the time I got stopped the tire was partly off the rim.

Making matters worse, the jack wouldn't fit under the car. It was over an hour before I was able to get moving again with the spare. I was hot, dirty, nasty, sore and had lost a great deal of time. I finally got to that rest stop, but instead of working the stations I had a sked with, I went inside to get cooled off and wash myself as best as I could.

I got myself an Ice Cream cone.

With ice cream gone my mind turned back to the fact that I was in Maryland and there was another 8 hours of contest left. I had no idea how well the spare would hold up. I didn't have another. From where I was it was just as long to continue the loop thru Maryland and Pennsylvania as to reverse my route and head home. I decided to continue the loop since it would let me get a couple more grids and get to a couple very good VHF locations. I did decide to shorten the route and stay stopped in the good spots longer and this way it was no more miles than reversing my route and heading home. In the end, instead of the 14 or 15 grids I hoped to activate I was only able to activate a dozen.

Murphy was not done with me however. My shortened route had me reach my FN11 spot while it was still daylight. In the other two other times I reached this spot after dark. There are some residences along the road. I picked a spot along the road between residences so I wouldn't be right in front of someone's house. Little did I realize that daylight was going to be a problem.

Because it was daylight the antenna array on my vehicle was much more evident. No sooner had I stopped when someone in another vehicle coming up the road stops and rolls down his window. After taking a minute to explain, he drove off and I started to operate. I work a few stations when someone else stops. I roll down my window mid QSO and complete the QSO before turning to him. Once again I explain. While talking with him someone else stops.

Now the road is blocked with one vehicle that was going one way stopped in the middle of the road and another vehicle going the other way stopped too. No big deal, despite all the attention this really isn't a busy road. It just seemed everyone was stopping!! The guys were very nice and polite and were just were curious. 


KK4IWN and WA4VGZ at the Stone River ARC Field Day Site

Please welcome our new District 6 Chairwoman, Dr. Carol Milazzo, KP4MD!

Carol remembers building her first crystal radio kit as a child in the 60's in New York City. Her aunt's old Grundig multi-band radio with exotic places like London, Berlin and Moscow on its tuning dial sparked her fascination with short waves. While in 6th grade, Carol first heard a 75-meter AM ham conversation on her own 3-band transistor portable, and she was hooked.

As a high school student Carol collected short wave listener QSL cards for a few years until 1970 when she learned Morse code with an LP and earned her Technician class license, WB2OZA. She built her first rig—a Knight Kit 2 meter AM transceiver, and soon added equipment for 6 meters and 439 MHz amateur television.

In 1971 she won the New York City-Long Island Section Award for the ARRL June VHF QSO Party contest and upgraded to Advanced class. As a college student, she built her first SSB radio in 1972, a Heathkit HW-101, joined Air Force MARS, and was active with the Fordham University Amateur Radio Club K2FO where she gave Novice classes and exams. With the help of W1AW code practice sessions, she upgraded to Amateur Extra class in 1974.

Carol remained active in ham radio after moving to Puerto Rico in 1976, and dropped the WB2 call sign for KP4EMN and later the two letter call sign KP4MD under incentive licensing. After serving as a US Navy Medical Corps officer at Roosevelt Roads Naval Hospital, Puerto Rico, she moved to Omaha, Nebraska in 1987 and taught at Creighton University Medical School until moving to Sacramento in 1999. Carol has been a member of ARRL since 1973, the Medical Amateur Radio Council (MARCO) since 1977 and YLRL since 2005.

Carol and her husband Roger, ICI6FYF, are Life members of the ARRL where she currently serves as ARRL Sacramento Valley Section Manager. She maintains a personal web page at gsl.net/kp4md and is n6na.org webmaster for the River City Amateur Radio Communications Society.

Carol has published articles on satellite tracking calculations, filter design programming, and antenna modeling and analysis, and has presented an original video documentary on the Arecibo Observatory at ARRL National and Regional Conventions with Nobel Prize Laureate Dr. Joe Taylor, K1JT.

When her busy pediatric practice permits, Carol plays piano and is active from 160 meters through 432 MHz, with special interests in home brewing, antennas, radio propagation, CW, digital modes, mobile operating and computer software and interfacing.



Now we are at home again to more gardening etc.


We have enjoyed our activations and Ken is already planning where to go next.

I hope to meet many of you on Echo link soon!



Handihams' Sister Alverna O'Laughlin, ex-WA0SGJ, SK

Handiham stalwart Sister Alverna O'Laughlin, ex-WA0SGJ, of Rochester, Minnesota, died on May 30. She was 84.

Sister Alverna joined the then-fledgling organization in its earliest days, when founder Ned Carman, W0ZSW, came up with the idea of sharing Amateur Radio with people who had disabilities.

"Ned enlisted the help of a group of local nuns, the Sisters of St Francis, on April 30, 1967," retired Handiham Program Coordinator Patrick Tice, WA0TDA, recounted on the Handiham website. "The sisters were committed to helping Ned with his new project, and several received their licenses. Among them was Sister Alverna O'Laughlin, WA0SGJ, who would eventually become the Educational Coordinator for the Handiham System at Courage Center in Golden Valley, Minnesota."

Tice praised Sister Alverna's "kindness and patience" and said her guidance, encouragement, and hard work led to many new radio amateurs over the years. "She knew that radio would open a line of communications between those she taught and the rest of the world," Tice said.

"Making friends on the radio, learning the math and science of electronics, and striving toward goals were all things that would make the lives of Handiham members better."

ARRL Now Offering New “Radio and Wireless Technology” Patch Program for Girl Scouts

The ARRL has begun offering a new Girl Scouts “**Radio and Wireless Technology**” patch program that offers opportunities for participants to learn about wireless technology, including Amateur Radio. Scout leaders and Amateur Radio volunteers associated with the Greater Atlanta Girl Scout Council, and Girl Scouts of the Green and White Mountains developed the program to incorporate information and exploratory activities that provide a backdrop for understanding radio communication. The program will encourage Girl Scouts to take on activities in which they will gain knowledge and skills, as well as kindle an interest in science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) subjects and careers.

“The initiative for the program came about through my conversations with hams who wanted to work with Girl Scouts as well as Boy Scouts and wanted a patch program that would introduce ham radio, as the ‘Radio’ merit badge does in the Boy Scouts,” said ARRL Education Services Manager Debra Johnson, K1DMJ. “I was introduced to a group of leaders with Girl Scouts of Greater Atlanta who wanted to work in developing a new fun patch program for radio that would fit with the **Girl Scout Leadership Experience** structure. This group was joined by Jill Gaius, KB1SWV, of the Girl Scouts of the Green and White Mountains in New Hampshire. We collaborated on this over the course of several years.” Gaius’s father, “Skip” Youngberg, K1NKR, and a team from the **Nashoba Valley Radio Club** helped test drive the new patch program during “Thinking Day on the Air” this past February with Girl Scouts in Raymond, New Hampshire.

The program defines the requirements for Girl Scouts to earn the patch at the Brownie, Junior, Cadette, Senior, and Ambassador levels. Girl Scouts can learn the fundamentals of radio communication and wireless technology from broadcasting to smartphones and apply what they learn to connect people, provide safety, and explore related careers. In addition to acquiring the fundamentals, participants can explore radio science through hands-on learning with Amateur Radio, and use radio to talk around the world and for public service. They also can learn about the role of wireless technology in everyday life and in careers.

The program supports the Girl Scout Leadership Experience by enabling participants to discover, by exploring the natural world to learn about radio communications and wireless technologies; to connect by using knowledge of wireless technology to understand its capabilities and its limitations, and by becoming an informed citizen who understands how wireless technologies are regulated and used, and to take action to make a difference in their communities by making friends through radio contacts, providing public service and emergency communication, and raising awareness of career opportunities.


Continuous Membership Certificate

6. All inquiries should be addresses to the appropriate custodian.
7. Decisions of the custodians regarding interpretations of the rules as here stated or later amended shall be final.
8. Certificate custodians and their addresses are listed in each issue of *YL Harmonics*.

ORIGIN OF 33

The History and Proper Use of 33 “33”, the signature used between YLs is often mis-used and its origin tends to get lost. YLRL was organized in 1939 and it was at this time that, through YLRL women amateur Radio Operators seemed to find their niche. “YL” was adopted as a general term denoting any licensed Amateur feminine operator, regardless of age or marital status.

“33” was originated in 1939 by Clara, W2RUF (ex W8ICYR) and adopted by YLRL for exclusive YL use. It means “Love sealed with friendship between one YL and another YL”. With this background and meaning, it is very understandable that “33” is not only exclusive with YLs but is NEVER used in the plural. We sign “33”, never 33’s.

NOTE: Contest is always on the last FULL weekend of August

ELIGIBILITY: All licensed operators throughout the world are invited to participate.

OBJECT: To encourage YLs in the use of amateur radio. YLs work everyone; OMs work YLs

CONTEST: Combined phone and CW run over 24

Saturday 27[^] August 2015 0600 hours UTC to Sunday 28[^] August 0559 hours

SUGGESTED FREQUENCIES: All HF Bands to be used except 160m & WARC

Contacts made on ECHOLINK and TWO METRES will also be accepted. (Separate logs for these would be preferred)

OPERATION: Single operator only (1 operator per call)

NB If YL is operating as a 2^{nc}* operator her husband/partner CANNOT participate in the contest. Every individual phone or CW contact may be counted.

There must be an interval of greater than 1 hour between contacts with any one station on any one band and in the same mode.

All contacts must be made in accordance with operator and station licence regulations.

PROCEDURE: Phone: Call "CQ ALARA contest"
CW: YLs call "CQ test ALARA"
OMs call "CQ YL"

EXCHANGES: ALARA member: RS (T) A, name. (59A /599A)
YL non-member, OM: RS (T), serial no. starting at 001, name and whether YL or OM.
OMs work YLs

SCORING: Phone: 5 points for ALARA member logged
4 points for YL non-member logged
3 points for OM logged
All contacts made on CW count for double points
5 points for ALARA member logged
4 points for YL non-member logged

Multipliers: 1 per VK/ZL Call area worked per band and 1 per DX YL

LOGS: Single log entry. Logs must show date, UTC time, band, mode, call sign worked, report and serial number sent, report and serial number received, name of operator of station worked and points claimed.

Paper logs and electronic logs both welcome.

LOGS MUST BE SIGNED. Logs also to show full name, call sign and address of operator; and show final score (points claimed). Logs must be legible. No logs will be returned. Decision of the Contest Manager will be final, and no correspondence will be entered into.

Definition of a YL

There have been many controversies over the definitions of YL versus XYL. The term YL was first defined in a Traffic Report signed The American Radio Relay League by E. C. Adams on May 13, 1920 to Miss M. Adaire Garmhausen, 3BCK. He was replying to her submission of an article submitted to QST on "How to Build a Wireless Station".

In it he called her "My Dear YL-" and stated, "We have had to coin a new phrase for your benefit as you will readily see that OM will not fit and OL [Old Lady] would certainly be most in applicable." Even though Miss Garmhausen wasn't the first YL ham radio operator, this is when the term was first applied specifically to label all women as Young Ladies no matter what their age.

The article was published in the July 1920 issue of QST and a second article of hers followed in May 1921, but it wasn't until the October 1922 had the column "Who's Who in Amateur Wireless" that M. Adaire's picture was printed as she was honored along with another YL, Miss Winifred Dow, 7CP, from Tacoma, WA.

Many OMs have used XYL (meaning Ex-Young Lady) to describe a wife versus a single lady, but some women, though not all, take offence at this term feeling that getting married does not mean a female is no longer a Young Lady.

In May 1940, the YLRL set forth the policy for YL-Harmonics and YLRL that the term "YL" was to be used of all licensed amateur operators of the feminine sex. This meant they were all young ladies no matter what their marital status was. A licensed woman is a YL while an XYL is a non-licensed wife.

In the April, 1925, QST, under strays, it says, "8ACY says that 8UH has obtained a storm and strife with the insane idea of making an OW of her. We think it would be a much nicer idea to make her a YL. At any rate the Mrs. can do ten words per minute already."
