YLRL is a non-profit organization, granted under section (501)(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, comprised of women amateur radio operators, incorporated as such under the laws of the state of California. Dues are \$15.00 a year US and \$25.00 per year DX, (which included airmail) due and payable January 1, and delinquent February 1st. For new and reinstating (lapsed more than 2 years) members joining after June 30th, dues are pro-rated by half the annual dues for that fiscal year. An additional \$4.00 required for Canada and Mexico airmail. Dues for a licensed YL family member (residing at the same address) are \$3.00. Subscriptions for non-members are **\$15.00** per year and may not be pro-rated for portions of years. Subscribers must add the same extra postage, for mailing outside of the United States of \$10.00.



Thank you to all the members of North Fulton Amateur Radio League for your support and encouragement and for being there to assist with ham radio specialties. Thank you to all of you reading this magazine as I'm sure by being a participant in this hobby, you too have benefited from as well as provided support to others in this hobby when they needed it most.

Yes – it's wonderful to know that just about anywhere you go, there's a few ham radio operators close by you can meet and with whom you can enjoy this hobby and form lasting friendships. Ruth, KM4LAO shares just such an experience with us. She writes:

As amateur radio operators, it's easy to forget that we are part of a larger community of licensed operators. I was reminded of this in December of 2016 when I wanted to operate under my own callsign during the ARRL Rookie Roundup, but I was hundreds of miles away from my home shack. While there are many aspects of amateur radio that can be done individually with good results, operating among friends often creates longer lasting memories

I began attending Kettering University in Michigan in October 2016. I am very active in my amateur radio club in Georgia, and I thought it would be rewarding to get involved in a local club near school as well. I was certainly right! I contacted the president Jeff, K8KZB who was thrilled to tell me more about the local club, the Genesee County Radio Club, and how to get involved. I started attending meetings in October and have felt very welcomed. In addition, once Jeff and his wife Amy, WA8MY found out that I did not have a radio to operate at school, they graciously offered me to opportunity to use their shack. I have had a blast learning from them and using their radios.

One of my favorite aspects of ham radio is Morse code. I learned CW from the CWOps CW Academy Level One course in the fall of 2015 and have the desire to improve my skills. Participating in National Parks on the Air taught me how to manage CW pileups, since I activated several park units using CW. I have been looking forward to participating in the ARRL CW Rookie Roundup all year. I found out that the event date was December 18, 2016, and, to my disappointment, I realized that I wasn't going to be home since my college finals would end the day before. Then I remembered my new friends at the Genesee County Radio Club. I quickly sent an email to Jeff and Amy asking if I could use their shack to participate in the Rookie Roundup before heading home to Georgia, and they readily agreed.

What a crazy week that was! As my mother Sharon, KM4TVU drove up from Georgia, I was busy preparing for and taking my final exams. She arrived in town just before a snowstorm hit Michigan and we were thankful we didn't have to leave until Sunday giving time for the roads to be plowed before our departure home. After loading our van with my college belongings and checking out of my dorm room by noon on December 18th, we very carefully drove through the ice and snow to Jeff and Amy's home.

We arrived around two o'clock that afternoon and were warmly welcomed by Jeff, Amy and their dogs. In a short time, I was on the air and my mom and Amy were getting to know each other. I decided to start on 20 meters so I tuned the antenna, asked if a frequency was in use and, hearing nothing, started calling CQ. I made a few contacts the first hour, but I was surprised how slow it was. Then Jeff checked in on me and noticed that I was actually on the 40 meter vertical antenna! As soon as we switched to the 20 meter beam antenna, the rate of stations worked per hour increased dramatically. After a number of hours operating on 20 meters, I switched to 40 meters in order to get more contacts and multipliers before Rookie Roundup ended. The contest lasted from one o'clock to seven o'clock eastern time, and I was able to operate most of that time.

Working Rookie Roundup was a good challenge for me and definitely increased my confidence in sending and receiving morse code. During some contacts, I found myself having to explain what I was doing since the station I was working was unfamiliar with CW Rookie Roundup. This gave me a good chance to practice sending and receiving longer sentences. In addition, at one point I wanted to work my friends in Georgia, so I had to learn how to do that with equipment I was relatively unfamiliar with. I saw first-hand that the type of antenna I use impacts who I may be able to contact.

A beam antenna also added a new element to my operating since I had to remember to switch to the correct antenna for the current band and to also ask if a frequency I was operating on was in use each time I turned the beam antenna. I was fascinated by the number of states that I worked right away from Michigan that would have been hard to work from my home shack in Georgia.

While operating in a contest from my own shack is fun, this contest was even more enjoyable because I could experience it with my family and friends. Some of my favorite memories from the day were running CW pileups, talking with friends on and off the radio, and experiencing the camaraderie that developed that afternoon between us all as we spent time together in Jeff and Amy's shack. My first CW Rookie

Roundup was a blast, and I owe a big thank you to Jeff and Amy for the hospitality they showed to me and my mom!

Ruth was also able to have another awesome ham radio experience thanks to encouragement from her amateur radio friends. She and her mom Sharon, KM4TVU were able to participate in the Youth DXpedition to Saba Island in 2016! She writes about her experience. Another strange weather fact is that it snowed on December 15th, then because of the below freezing temperatures, many Portlanders (most of my neighbors anyway) are clearing their driveways! I have had some material that I believe you could find interesting and now feels like the perfect time to share it.

I belong to an emergency response group called NETs (Neighborhood Emergency Teams). NETs are Portland residents trained by the Portland Bureau of Emergency Management and Portland Fire & Rescue to provide emergency disaster assistance within their own neighborhoods. NET members are trained to save lives and property until professional responders can arrive. These volunteers are specially trained to help others without putting themselves in harm's way. NET members are:

Prepared to be self-sufficient for two weeks during any emergency;

designation.

Able to provide emergency assistance to their family and immediate neighbors;

Able to work within an emergency response team to save lives and property in their neighborhood;

Able to guide untrained volunteers who want to help others during a disaster.

NETs are strongly encouraged to obtain their Ham licenses. The sole point which I dislike is that most of these people get their licenses then never upgrade! A NET Amateur Radio Operator (ARO) is a volunteer who has received basic training on radio principles, has a valid FCC amateur radio license, and has completed radio operations training. Once a NET volunteer has completed those steps, they receive a NET ID with the ARO

- 2. A rose is a rose. If they then give you pink roses or blue roses, that's all right. BUT, you can't ask them for a specific color of a rose.
- 3. If you don't have a favorite flower, go to a website and look at all the different flowers. Then choose one that is unusual.



I am sorry to announce the passing of Eleanor (Ellie) Van Winkle, NØQCX. While Ellie was not a member of the YLRL recently, though she was for years. Even if she hadn't been, though, she was a person who we should remember for her involvement in amateur radio. I first met Ellie about 30 years ago, when my husband finally got

his license, but before I did. The Boulder Area Radio Club—BARC—held a family picnic in the foothills. Adult hams were partnered with children to complete a fox hunt, with the "fox" hidden in the brush, trees, and rocks around the picnic area. Each child used an HT and his or her body to shield the signal to find the source, and Ellie supervised to make sure they were all safe.

Along with her husband Rip, she was a founding and guiding spirit of the BARC Juniors, an extraordinarily active youth group which over the years has mentored many, many children and youth in amateur radio. Rip took charge of the technical side, with a complete laboratory of equipment for building and analyzing. The club took charge of providing elmers. Ellie took charge of the kid side, with safety, snacks, and socialization.

She also worked with them to make appearances at Dayton every year, in the Youth Forum. Every year, she invited the Colorado YL's to hear the first presentation of the selected youth, so that by the time they presented at Dayton they had had opportunity not just to practice but to improve. She held a tech license, and never felt the need to get a higher one, because it was enough for what she wanted to do. She always had the radio on in the kitchen, and listened for anyone—especially one of her young hams—who wanted to talk.

You can use it without having a login, or you can log in and use a few more of its features (free). You can usually find our weather station, N0RUX-13, there (-13 means weather station). We are transmitting out on two meters, and various people put it on the internet via an I-gate.

Youth Column

Adventures from Saba as PJ6Y from Ruth, KM4LAO (and her mother Sharon, KM4TUV)

One of the most unexpected and thrilling adventures I had in 2016 was being selected as a member of the 2016 Dave Kalter Memorial Youth DX Adventure. I first heard about the Youth DX Adventure in February 2016 from a guest speaker on the North Fulton Amateur Radio League Youth Net. I was very interested in it and my friends encouraged me to apply, which I did. After a period of waiting I was ecstatic to find out that mom and I were a part of the team.

The Youth DX Adventure (YDXA) is a trip organized by experienced DXers giving youth the opportunity to operate from a DXCC entity. The 2016 YDXA team was selected through an application process and was announced near the end of February by the team leaders, Don DuBon-N6JRL and Jim Storms-AB8YK. Team members included Morgan Croucher, KD8ZLK; his mentor Joe Binkley, KD8YPY from Ohio; Faith Hannah Lea, AE4FH; her father James Lea, WX4TV from Florida; and myself, Ruth Willet ,KM4LAO; and my mother Sharon Willet, KM4TVU from Georgia.

Our destination was the Caribbean island of Saba. Saba, known as the Unspoiled Queen because of her unspoiled nature and inhabitants, is the smallest special municipality of the Netherlands at only 5 square miles across. She is only accessible by first flying to St. Maarten and then taking a small boat or plane to Saba. The boat rides offer incredible views of the island while the plane rides are full of adventure as travelers enjoy the views from above and then touch down on the 400 meter airstrip, the smallest commercial airstrip in the world. The team greatly enjoyed the thrill of taking the plane ride to Saba.

We were able to travel to Saba due to the generosity of our host, Jeff Jolie NM1Y, who is an experienced DXer. He has hosted and been a part of many contest winning teams of DXers on Saba. He was a member of the 2015 K1N Navassa Island DXpedition and is on the roster of the 2018 3YØZ Bouvet Island DXpedition.

The two objectives of the trip were experiencing and learning local culture and making contacts around the world. Although learning about the island, experiencing the only road in Saba, scuba diving, and exploring tide pools near the airport were amazing, the best part of the trip was operating radio from Saba as PJ6Y.

One skill that the team developed all week long was effective satellite communications. It was a thrill to work though amateur satellites since many members of the team had never done so before, and it took a team effort to make it a success. It was neat to be a part of the effort to put the rare grid FK87 on the air in this way. By the end of the trip we had worked about 10 passes and made 50 contacts through the SO-50 and the AO-85 satellites. The ultimate highlight on satellites, however, was breaking the distance world record on the SO-50 satellite! It was a several day process that took lots of tweaking of our technique and location, but we were successful on August 7 when we worked WD9EWK in Arizona with stations that were 5,169 km apart.

HF operating from Saba was incredible. We had two radios up and running nearly all the time using a Hustler 6BTV vertical antenna on Jeff's roof and a center fed Windom antenna the team erected. It was a joy to operate from Saba because of the sheer number of people calling. The pileups were absolutely incredible on SSB and CW. No matter our skill levels, the whole team learned and grew as HF operators because of them. The more we operated, the more we learned about how to handle the pileups and soon we were caught up in the thrill of working hundreds of stations - both people we knew and those we didn't.

However, one of the most special things that happened as result of being on the team was that my mom was propelled into ham radio. When I started ham radio, no one in my immediate family was licensed. My mom slowly became interested and I was excited that she was willing to get her license in order for me to go on the YDXA. In fact, we tested together on Mother's Day this past May where I passed the Extra and she passed the Technician

exam. In fact, she upgraded to a General class license before coming to Saba and it was very special to operate side by side from Saba. We have continued to have a wonderful time together doing amateur radio activities all year long.

Our final contact totals on HF were as follows: 4,261 QSOs in 101 countries, 50 states, 6 continents, and 26 CQ zones, which included 3,843 SSB QSOs and 418 CW QSOs. Because of propagation, over half of the SSB contacts were made on 20 meters with the rest of the QSOs split almost evenly between 40m and 17m. On CW, we made contacts on 20m and 30m, with 30 meters becoming the primary band once contests started up the weekend we were on Saba. What an incredible adventure the 2016 YDXA was! It was bittersweet

when we lifted off from

the beautiful island of Saba and headed home. Although our memory of the exact number of QSOs we made that week may be forgotten, I will never forget the way the Amateur radio community came together



to support us throughout the trip and the amazing experiences we had being on the air from Saba.

ORIGIN OF 33

The History and Proper Use of 33, the signature used between YLs is often misused and its origin tends to get lost. YLRL was organized in 1939 and it was at this time that, through YLRL women amateur Radio Operators seemed to find their niche. "YL" was adopted as a general term denoting any licensed Amateur feminine operator, regardless of age or marital status.

"33" was originated in 1939 by Clara, W2RUF and adopted by YLRL for exclusive YL use. It means "Love sealed with friendship between one YL and another YL". With this background and meaning, it is very understandable that "33" is not only exclusive with YLs but is NEVER used in the plural. We sign "33", never 33's. Reprinted from YL Harmonics, Issue #2, 1980. Thanks to Lea AB5TY for the reference. (Note also that 73 and 88 should NEVER be used in the plural form. You would not say Best Regards's nor Hugs and Kisses's would you?)
