The Lake District of England was also especially beautiful with its narrow, deep lakes formed by the same type of glaciation and very similar to our Finger Lakes of New York State...something I had never realized.

The rapid five-day Atlantic crossing to New York on the Queen Elizabeth was a rather rough, cold affair, enlightened only by my winning the women's table tennis tournament and receiving a beautiful red-leather-encased travel alarm clock as prize. It gave me that lovely feeling that there's life in the old gal yet!

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Well, gals, I think I speak for all of us when I say that we appreciate your telling us of your trips. There probably isn't a one of us who wouldn't have gladly traded places with you, either one, hi! Glad to have you home again.

A couple of our gals made very interesting trips this past summer. We didn't wish to leave out any of their accounts of their trips so we are printing them in their entirety here rather than burying them in the District News. First, we hear from Liz, W3CDQ.

Liz spent a very enjoyable six weeks this past summer touring Germany, Austria Italy and Switzerland. This was the second visit to Europe for Liz. She and her sister, Marie, left Idlewild International Airport July 3rd on Sabena Jet Airlines for Germany via Brussels, Belgium.

In Germany, they spent two weeks touring Wiesbaden, Neurburg, Frankfurt, Munich and Baden-Baden, seeing such intermediate places as Mittenwald, famous for its violin makers, Oberammergau, site of the Passion Plays, (Liz and Marie spent a full day attending these plays), Lake Constance, the Black Forest and Triberg, famed for its Cuckoo Clock industry.

On July 13th, Liz flew on to Zurich, Switzerland while her sister continued on to Copenhagen, Denmark. In Switzerland, Liz enjoyed such famous places as Basle, Baden, Winterthur (important for its engineering industry), and St. Gallen, center of beautiful lace embroideries.

Austria held great expectations for Liz as she arrived in gay Vienna. Here Liz dined in the beautiful Viennese restaurants, tasted the latest vintage in a friendly musical Viennese atmosphere. She was impressed with such sites as St. Stephen's Cathedral with its 400 foot tower, Schoenbrunn Castle, the only place in Europe still furnished as it was when its Imperial tenants left it, and the recently reconstructed Opera House. Liz visited Salzburg, the birthplace of Mozart and famous for its Mozart Festivals. From there, she went to Cortinz d'Ampezzo in the Dolomites, site of the 1956 winter Olympic Games, enjoyed a glide in a gondola on the Grand Canal in Venice, thence to Milan, viewing some of the beautiful lakes and lakeside restaurants of Italy before returning to Zurich, Switzerland.

Liz and Marie rejoined each other in Zurich and preceeded to Rome, Italy where they spent several days seeing Naples, Milan and visiting with a local family before departing for home on August 19th. The only regret Liz expressed was that she was unable to see WAYLARC's adopted YL, Christl, while she was in Germany.

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Next we have the complete account Dot, W4UF, sent of her trip.

My trip around the world was even more interesting than I had expected it to be. The first stage was by train from Florida, via the beautiful Canadian Rockies and a stop-over at Lake Louise, to Vancouver. There I embarked on the British P&O Line's 30,000-ton, all air conditioned "Arcadia", the largest passenger liner which regularly crosses the Pacific. Shore trips were made in San Francisco, Los Angeles Honolulu, Yokohama (where I left the ship for a 3-day overland trip to Tokyo, Nikko Kyoto, etc. and rejoined her at Kobe), Hong Kong, Manila, and Australia, (Sydney, Melbourne and Fremantle-Perth), Singapore, Ceylon, Aden, Port Said in Egypt, Lisbon and London.

The servise was excellent and food really superb. Being always interested in food, the latter point was an important one to me! Along the way I toyed with such items as smoked salmon from Scotland, quail from the Nile Valley, grouse, pheasant, venison, and lovely thick fillet mignons which were available three times a day if desired. The laden tea tables every afternoon at four o'clock included sixty-seven different kinds of cakes each week, and wonderful assortments of scones as well. By more sheer will power than I would have believed I possessed, I spent ten long wonderful weeks on the "Arcadia" and managed to gain only five pounds.

The ancient Cryptomeria forests of Nikko, Japan and the Australian inland "bush" country, the latter just coming into its fantastic spring bloom, were two of the outstanding sights of the trip. But there were other unexpected ones as well, due to the wonderful cooperation of the ship's captain. Our trip down it was the first time a ship of our size had ever made the voyage the full length inside the Great Barrier Reef of Australia. It was beautiful and exciting as we threaded our way, hour after hour, along the tortuous channels between the coral reefs, twisting and turning between the little islands. He also took us somewhat off the straightest course from Australia to Singapore to include Christmas Island. We were not more than 1000 feet off-shore as we encircled about 3/4 of the island, seeing the

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|-----------------------|------------------------------|-----------------------|
| 1 onion, minced | 1 tblsp prepared mustard | 1/4 cup vinegar |
| 1/2 cup minced celery | 1 cup catsup | 1/3 cup boiling water |
| 3 tblsp margarine | 2 tblsp lemon juice | 1 tsp salt |
| 3 tblsp honey | 1 tblsp Worcestershire sause | 10 frankfurters |

Saute the onion and celery in the margarine for 5 minutes. Add the honey, catsup, mustard, vinegar, lemon juice, Worcestershire sauce and water and heat 1 minute. Add salt. Start oven, set at 375 degrees. Place frankfurters in shallow pan, prick skins with fork, pour the sauce over them and bake for 15 minutes.

| 2 tblsp boiling water | 1/4 cup brown sugar |
| 2 tblsp prepared mustard | 1/4 tsp cinnamon |

Set oven at 350 degrees. Rub a deep baking dish with margarine. Cut frankfurters in halves, lengthwise. Brown the cut surfaces quickly in frying pan with boiling water and reserve the liquid. Place frankfurters in the baking dish. Spread with mustard. Cover them with apples. Mix the sugar and cinnamon, sprinkle over the apples. Pour water from frying pan over the top, cover and bake 25 minutes. Uncover, sprinkle with cheese and bake 10 minutes more--or until cheese bubbles.

A FEW CONTEST COMMENTS

K9TUD - It's a good thing there was a 2 week gap. I'm still not recovered. Why does it all take place on 20? I swore I'd have a 20 meter antenna - at least a dipole up for this one. Maybe next year. Only heard a few on 40 meters later. Did they all go to bed? Are the phone gals tougher than us CW ops? Let's get on 80 next year! Phone. If you hear an OM calling you desperately, be kind, it may be a fellow YL who's just getting over a cold. I got to the point where I stated same when I called at times. Some of the gals asked if I was a YL.. So, I wonder how many of the gals who didn't answer heard me but thought I was an OM?

VE3DDA - Had a lot of fun and met several new YLs on phone, but what happened to the gals on CW, only heard a couple of YLs on CW about 3520. We are only on 75 meters due to antenna.

TIME: Start--Wednesday, April 12, 1961 - 12 noon, EST
End----Thursday, April 13, 1961 - 12 midnight, EST

ELIGIBILITY: All licensed YL and EYL operators are invited to participate. YLRL members only are eligible for the WRONE award. A non-member will receive a certificate. Contacts with OMs will not count. A special certificate for highest scoring Novice operator.

OPERATION: Bands - 50 Mc and above are to be used - phone and/or CW. Crossband operation is not permitted. Only one contact with each station will be counted. A section may be counted only once toward multipliers.

PROCEDURE: Call CQ-YL

EXCHANGE: Station worked, QSO number, RST report, ARRL section, U.S. possession, VE district or country. Entries in log should also show; band worked at time of contact; whether A1 or A3; time of contact; date; xmitter and power.

SCORING: Multiply number of contacts by the total number of ARRL sections, U.S. possessions, VE districts or countries worked. Contestants running 50 watts input or less at all times, may multiply the above results by 1.25 - low power multiplier.

AWARDS: Highest Score - WRONE award (YLRL member only.)
Top 3 scores will receive Certificates.
Highest score in each ARRL section, U.S. possession, VE district and country will receive a Certificate.
Highest Novice score will receive a Certificate.

LOGS: Copies of all logs must show claimed score, be signed by the operator and be postmarked not later than April 28, 1961 and received not later than May 12, 1961. Send copies of logs to "Onie" Woodward, W1ZEN, 14 Emmett St., Marlboro, Massachusetts.

Tenth Anniversary issue (Oct-Nov) was largest, with 31 pages. It contained pictures of all officers, district chairmen & publicity chairman. It had special items on YLRL's ten years of life; a feature story "The YLRL Story", with pictures of the founder, Ethel Smith; a crossword puzzle; anniversary greetings from George E. Sterling, W3OF, Commissioner, FCC, Wm. S. Paley, Chairman of the Board, CBS, Larry Lekashman, W2IOP, F. L. Ankenbrandt, Maj Gen USAF, Dir of Communications, and Howard Donham, V.P. for Public Relations, the American Red Cross; and numerous other special and different articles.

July 1949 - June 1950

The June-July issue started a "new look" with the 8½ x 11 size sheet divided into two vertical columns. New features started in this issue were: "Let's Get-Together" a report of all kinds of get-togethers from "gabfests" to conventions; "How did it happen to you?" a feature of how the individual YLs became interested in getting their own amateur license.

The September issue started using a multilith method of reproduction. It required the typing on mats.

Only YLRL members were eligible for YL prizes. It was scored by allowing 1 point per contact, multiplied by total number of states, territories, countries, and VE provinces worked. CW won by YL's W3CUL, W6YYM & W3NHI, and OM's W1BFT, W0ULM & W4MLH. Fone won by YL's KH6TI W3CUL, & W1QON and OM's W1BFT, W0ULM and W5OZE.

Net Contests: A certificate was to be awarded to each member of the CW net having the most participants for the season. For the YL being most active on the 10 meter fone nets, a certificate was to be awarded. The only announced winner was W5PTW of the 10 meter fone net.

Publicity: Louisa DeSoto, W2OOH, Chairman

A recording of a meeting of the District of Columbia YL's at the QTH of W3OLY was made for Voice of America.

Prize to be a cup donated by Vice--Pres Lou Littlefield W1MCW; cup to be passed to new winner of Anniversary Party each year. A member winning the cup three times gained permanent possession. Annette Thompson W4CWV, placed highest. Miriam Brown, W7JFB, took first for CW scores. She was given a paper weight, donated by Clarice, W7FTX.

"Gabfest Contest and Dit-Dah Special", May 24 - 26
(Wednesday thru Friday)

Rules same as anniversary Party. Won by Helen McKeral W9FZO, and Annette Thompson, W4LKM. Certificates were mailed to winners.

Publicity: Amelia Black Lobsenz, W2OLB/6, Chairman

Catholic Digest, Sept 1948, carried an article featuring Rosemarie, W9AWI, written by Edward Harrigan & Nat McKelvey. It was condensed from "Marianist" & titled "Third Sight by Short Wave."

Other: The Permanent Treasury of \$100.00 was repealed from Constitution. (See Feb-Mar 1949 YL Harmonics)
