



#### Howdy Days CW & SSB: 1400 UTC September 11, 2007 to 0200 September 13, 2007

**ELIGIBILITY:** All licensed women operators throughout the world are invited to participate. **PROCEDURE:** Call "CQ YL."

**OPERATION:** All bands and modes of emission may be used. A station may be worked and counted once on each band and mode for QSO points. The maximum power output that may be used at any time during the contest is 750 watts on CW and 1500 watts PEP on SSB. Participants may work only 24 hours of the 36 hours in each contest. Operating breaks must be indicated in the log. RTTY will count as CW.

**EXCHANGE:** YLRL member or non-YLRL member? Entries in log must also show date, time, band, call or station worked. SCORING: Score two points for each YLRL member worked and one point for each non-YLRL member worked. There are no multipliers.

SUGGESTED FREQUENCIES: Try listening around 7.233, 14.288, 14.298, 21.388, 28.433 on voice, basically frequencies ending in 33 or 88. Similarly for CW.

**LOGS:** All logs must show if operator is a YLRL member or non-member to be eligible for awards. **AWARDS:** Top scoring YLRL member will receive her choice of a YLRL pin, charm, or stationery. Top scoring non-YLRL member will receive a one-year YLRL membership.

#### **General Rules for YLRL Contests**

- 1. Check to make certain you are sending logs to the CURRENT Vice-President.
- 2. Logs must be postmarked no later than 30 days after each contest ends.
- 3. Scoring:
  - Phone and CW contests will be scored separately. Separate logs must be submitted for each contest. One point is earned for each different station worked on each band. The same station may be worked on different bands. In the YL-OM contest only, YLs count OMs and OMs count YLs.
  - Multiplier will be the ARRL sections and/or DX countries, whichever is appropriate. Canadian provinces are counted individually. Multipliers are used only once on all bands when figuring the score.
  - Contestants running a power output of 100 watts or less on CW and 200 watts PEP or less on SSB, at all times during the contest, earn a power factor of 1.5
  - Computation is done by multiplying the points times the multiplier times the power factor.
  - For each duplicate contact that is removed from the log by the Vice-President, a penalty of three additional and equal contacts will be exacted.
- 4. Logs:
  - All logs must show the operator's ARRL section, VE province, or country to qualify for awards. Where applicable, logs must state whether or not the operator is a member of YLRL. For each QSO, logs must also state the power output. If you have 200 or more QSOs, submit a separate log for each band and submit a "dupe" sheet.

Please type or print. Do not send carbon copies of logs. Photocopies are OK.

Logs must be signed and show claimed score. No logs will be returned.

Entries in log must also show time, band, date and transmitter power.

5. Exchange: Station worked, QSO number given and received, RS(T) given and received, and section/ province/country.



#### My Trip to Italy By Laura, KB3NSW

"My daughter, who at the time was all of 14 years of age, and I wanted to share an adventure in something that was new to both of us before she went off to boarding school, in Tyrone PA (The Grier School). We decided to learn Amateur Radio because we could continue to share this adventure over our distance of 150 miles and communicate. During the summer of 2006 we studied and passed our tests with the help of Reading Radio Club. These men were tireless with their help, advice and time. I passed General and failed Tech while my daughter Bridget passed Tech. Months later I passed Tech and was so excited about CW that I immediately bought Bridget and I keys. Our adventure into the fascinating and engaging world of Amateur Radio had only just begun.

She with her portable Yaesu and I with my Icom 746 embarked to join a science and a global community that welcomed and started to educate us. Soon we discovered we were only on the tip of the iceberg. We are still astonished by the infinite field of radio that would take life times to fully learn; the possibilities of our choices in its various fields are still so inspiring.

In March we plotted a trip to Italy, we couldn't resist to take Bridget's Yaesu with a 2 meter automobile antennae on our travels for use in our hotel rooms that were reserved throughout Northern and Central Italy. Through Bridget's search for a radio club near her school we met WB3EFQ, Lois, who encouraged us to transmit during our travels. Lois also introduced us to YLRL, which we gladly joined right away on line.

As we sweated with anxiety to get through security at the airport we came up with a secondary plan of purchasing another Yaesu in the event that our radio would be confiscated. After all, I was also prepared with an electronic interpreter to ensure language would not be a barrier. Minutes later we were on board our plane with our radio and antennae and thinking wildly about all the European contacts we were going to make.

As fate had it we could not understand a word being transmitted in our hotel room in Rome. We went to Rome's computer bars to find Radio Associations. We had no luck as the third day gave us no returned emails. To shorten this story I wounded up taking a cell phone to a tourist center in Milan and had a clerk speak in Italian to a radio repair shop that I had found online. The shopkeeper knew of several radio operators and assured me a contact after I gave him my number.

Two days later Bridget and I were with IK3RIY, Martino transmitting back home with a HF/50 MHz Transceiver FT-2000 Yaesu (I have got to have one of these!!) with a KLM 4 element in Northern Italy's, Venice's Lido Island. WOW! The radio community is truly global. During my first conversation I told him I had a radio with me. From that point on I spoke to Martino by radio on 2 Meter. Bridget and I are very green and here an operator opened his home and shared his DXing expedition with us without a second thought.

After returning home I had my Extra in one week. Bridget and I had taken ARRL's books for the long train rides throughout Italy so I only needed one week to review. The trip was remarkable and as we passed through Bologna we chatted about Marconi and chanced using our Yaesu once more. Getting a signal on a train was not successful but it did give us an idea of a second trip in 2008. We will trace his achievements in England. Bridget will have some time this summer to get her General and we will make contacts before we leave to transmit. Perhaps we will know enough to take our own radio for CW communication.

We have a summer planned with all sorts of radio kits and antennae ideas. I even ordered a few used solar panels to make us self-sufficient. I can't wait to see her face split when she discovers our nice KLM 6 element!!! Surprise!!!

It's funny how we passed up all the Gucci shops, all the glass art in Venice and the fashion markets in Milan without a second look as we scanned cityscapes to see what type of antennas were being used in hopes of spotting a ham. We could not find a single radio shop because of the language barrier but it meant little to us. We had our trophy thanks to IK3RIY.

We enjoyed Italy's history immensely and we can never think of her with out thinking of who gave us an ear to the world.

I recently found out that in late August I have to take a trip to Hong Kong. As I told Bridget my news with heavy heart because it would mean I would be away. She said, "That is surrounded by salt water". I replied with a nod as we gave each other that familiar smile that every ham wears so well."
