YLRL is a non-profit organization, granted under section (501) (c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, comprised of women amateur radio operators, incorporated as such under the laws of the state of California. Dues are \$15.00 a year US and \$25.00 per year DX, (which included airmail) due and payable January 1, and delinquent February 1st. For new and reinstating (lapsed more than 2 years) members joining after June 30th, dues are pro-rated by half the annual dues for that fiscal year. An additional \$4.00 required for Canada and Mexico airmail. Dues for a licensed YL family member (residing at the same address) are \$3.00. Subscriptions for non-members are \$15.00 per year and may not be pro-rated for portions of years. Subscribers must add the same extra postage, for mailing outside of the United States of \$10.00.

Basic Rules Applicable To All YLRL Certificates

- 1. Contacts made through repeater devices or any other power relay method cannot be used for any YLRL certificate confirmation.
- 2. All contacts must be made **FROM** the same country.
- 3. **DO NOT SEND QSL CARDS TO THE CUSTODIAN!** Two other Amateurs must sign the log verifying that the QSL cards are in possession of the applicant .
- 4. No charge is made for a certificate, but sufficient postage for first class mail or a stamped legal-size envelope must accompany the application to cover the cost of mailing the certificate.
- 5. For the order in which the contacts must be listed, please check the rules for each certificate.
- 6. All inquiries should be addresses to the appropriate custodian.
- 7. Decisions of the custodians regarding interpretations of the rules as here stated or later amended shall be final.
- 8. Certificate custodians and their addresses are listed in each issue of YL Harmonics.

YL Contests, Nets and Hamfest Booths

October brings our next contest. The NA/ DXYL Anniversary Contest is October 5-7.

The modes are CW, SSB and digital. The contest is open to YLs in North America and all DX entities. If you have never worked DX before now was a good time to try. I can tell you from personal experience that there is a real thrill when you make that first DX contact. It is great fun to talk to YLs all over the world.

YLs with a tech license to have some privileges in the HF bands just check the band plan to verify where they are as it is always important to operate within your privileges. So why not give contesting a try?

The rules are listed below. I am looking forward to receiving many logs with lots of contacts.

DX/NA YL Anniversary Contest

Oct 5-7, 2012

SSB/CW/Digital

General Rules for YLRL Contests

- 1. Check to make certain you are sending logs to the CURRENT Vice-President.
- 2. Logs must be postmarked no later than 30 days after each contest ends.
- 3. Scoring:
- Phone and CW contests will be scored separately. Separate logs must be submitted for each contest.
- •One point is earned for each different station worked on each band. The same station may be worked on different bands. In the YL-OM contest only, YLs count OMs and OMs count YLs.
- •Multiplier will be the ARRL sections and/or DX countries, whichever is appropriate. Canadian provinces are counted individually. Multipliers are used only once on all bands when figuring the score.
- •Contestants running 5W or less will be considered QRP and earn a power factor of 3. Contestants running 5W to 100W will be considered low power and earn a power factor of 1.5. Contestants running over 100W will be high power. If no transmitter power is listed on logs, no power factor will be given.
- Total scored claimed is calculated by multiplying the points times the multiplier times the power factor.
- 4. Logs:
- •All logs must show the operator's ARRL section, VE province, or country to qualify for awards. Where applicable, logs must state whether or not the operator is a member of YLRL. For each QSO, logs must also state the power output. If you have 200 or more QSOs, submit a separate log for each band and submit a "dupe" sheet.
- Please type or print. If you print a log from a logging program or photocopy your log book, be sure they include all the required information.
- Logs must be signed and show claimed score. No logs will be returned.
- Entries in log must also show time, band, date and transmitter power.
- 5. Exchange:

Station worked, QSO number given and received, RS(T) given and received, and section/province/country.

6. Entry categories:

Single operator and YL clubs/groups.

HISTORY OF HAYLARC

In early 1977 some licensed amateur radio YLs decided they would like to form a club. The idea soon became reality as the group met in February of that year to organize. It was decided at that time to call the group HAYLARC (Huntsville Area Young Ladies Amateur Radio Club).

The group was formed as a service club and one of the first projects was a directory of "hams" in the North Alabama area.

Another project, which continued for many years, was the school program. Because there were teachers in HAYLARC, it was not difficult to offer the program and for a number of years ladies from HAYLARC went regularly to schools in the Huntsville area. Students were shown videos about amateur radio and demonstrations were given using Morse Code and someone would be contacted on 2 meters. This always was exciting to the students and frequently one of them was allowed to say "hello". The HAYLARCS also presented programs to HARC and other radio clubs in the area. There eventually was no longer a demand for the school program due to school schedules and technology.

Some of the other projects of the group included providing communications for different events--especially the annual Christmas Parade, participation in Field Day, local nets including one of our own, and the Hamfest.

In recent years the group has published a cookbook, helped with the annual Angel Tree of the Salvation Army, helped with SVHFS Convention in 2003 and hosted the YLRL International Convention here in Huntsville in 2008.

Books and other amateur radio materials have been donated to the local library as well. The annual Huntsville Hamfest registration is still one of the main projects of the group as well as having a breakfast for YLs and guests on Sunday morning of the Hamfest.

It is our understanding that HAYLARC is one of the few groups of YLs who have been in existence for this length of time. We remain active but small; however, we are always looking for new members in the North Alabama area.

DX News & DX Treasurer de Rose-Marie Battig, KB4RM

Dear YL friends,

Summer is here and winter for some and I hope everyone is having a wonderful time.

DXing has its problem in the summer months and the conditions are not the best. Monday DX-YL net on 14.288 at 15:00z, we go to 21.400 after calling on 20m for short time. Signals are much better on 15m for DXing, but not good to hear your own country YLs.

Dxing is best to Europe for us in USA at 21:00z and 0300z which means you have to stay up late and Europe has to get up early.

Do check in and if you don't hear us on 20m wait and listen on 15m.

I hope many of you got to work Yemen 7O6T, I did and waiting for the QSL card to confirm it. I still have thirteen more to reach the top.

I haven't got very much news from you and I haven't been to any ham events so I will let you know what I learned about my station.

For my station I have an FT1000D, amplifier Alpha 9500 and a 14 element three band Force12, beam, at 70 feet.

The amplifier is fairly new and is fully automatic which is good for me as I am not very technical and call for my OM as soon as anything is not working right.

One Monday the amplifier shutoff as it believed it was getting a higher line voltage than it should. It automatically shut down, to prevent any damage.

We contacted Molly at RF Concepts, who then guided us in connecting a usb cable between the amplifier and our computer.

She then was able to run a diagnostic program and determine that the amplifier was misreading the ac line voltage.

With her remote link to our computer and amplifier she was able to recalibrate the amplifier line voltage circuit. Problem solved with modern technology.

We have come a long way, not to have to send the radio back to be fixed.
