I'm really looking forward to working with each of them throughout this year and next.

Great thanks go to Anne Dirkman, KC9YL ,and Vicky Luetzelschwab, AE9YL, who worked exceptionally hard to get the transition from mail delivery of YL Harmonicst to email delivery right. It was quite a ride. Sending the postcards was a learning experience that several YLs said we should do again, because as a membership renewal device, it was a success. In fact, the whole process of developing the email database that delivers the link to the PDF YL Harmonics was interesting as Anne and Vicky worked their magic with the email list and the YLRL membership database. Anne and Vicky worked hard to ensure that the email addresses were correct and that the membership renewals were up to date so that the May-June YL Harmonics went via email to those members who requested it and that the hard copies were mailed to the correct addresses. The Transition Committee included Anne and Vicky in addition to Margaret Hardwick, AE7MB; Cheryl Muhr, N0WBV; Rita McConnell, NE0DB; Michelle Carey, W5MQC; and me. Without Michelle's understanding of Mailchimp and the process to get it started we might still be snail mailing YLH. Without Cheryl's understanding of the publication and mail distribution of YLH things could have gone differently. Margaret has been the YLH Editor for a few years and really appreciated being able to work on the first "digital" version. Rita and I asked questions throughout the whole process trying to ensure we were going in the right direction with the transition.

Thankfully we have received very positive comments on the May-June PDF version of <u>YL Har-monics</u> that was emailed to most of the YLRL membership. There is something about viewing the <u>YLH</u> PDF file with color photos that definitely makes it worth the effort. Thanks to Editor Margaret Hardwick, AE7MB, who created the file in a way that was visually pleasing and easy to navigate.

The By-Laws direct the President to appoint one of the District Chairs to be the Nominating Committee Chair by July of the first year of her term. Michelle Carey, W5MQC, said "Yes" when I asked. She will ask a couple more members to be part of the Nominating Committee. Then they will go about finding who among the elected officials of YLRL want to continue in their position, who are not able to continue, and to find YLs who want to run for the open offices in 2021. Thanks, Michelle, for taking on this task. I know that next year's ballot will look good.

The YLRL Board met the last full week in June and discussed many items. Barb Bender KA3VXR, Supplies Chairwoman, has been selling our supplies for over 10 years and needs to retire. The board discussed what supplies we want to continue to have in stock and how we want to do business. Anne, KC9YL, and Rita, NE0DB, volunteered to help with the transition of the supplies, which are located at Barb's QTH, to a new location and ideally a new Supplies Chairwoman. Anne and Rita will work on what to do with what we have, and figure out what our next Supplies catalog will look like. Thanks to Barb for her many years as Supplies Chair, and to Anne and Rita for agreeing to help out with the transition. Vice President Rita, NE0DB, received a contest proposal from a member that she discussed with the Board. Everyone agreed that there was not time this year to plan an additional contest or operating event. Rita has started to form a committee to work on the ideas the Board discussed. Rita will fill you in when she has more information. It is exciting that we may have more opportunities to get on the air.

For those of you who have found FT8, the Board verified that FT8 is among the digital modes for which we accept logs for our contests. I discovered it not long ago and am hooked. Now to finish this article so I can play radio.

With <u>YL Harmonics</u> being distributed via email and a few hard copies via the postal service, there have been many questions about the impact of this move on our membership dues. It is a valid question for which we do not have enough information to make a responsible decision yet. This July-August issue will be the second one sent via email, and I expect it to be easier than the May-June issue, but we need to see it play out. Later this year the Board will discuss the options and begin to make sense of what has changed. Until then we need to be sure all of the I's are dotted and the T's are crossed, and know that the system is stable and will continue to be.

Thanks to all of our members for their support of YLRL as we continue to make YLRL the best it can be.

Although we are in the depth of summertime, we are also in the depth of Covid 19 with no signs of relief. Oh, those pesky masks; but I continue to wear a mask. So many precautions, but we still have our radios and new ventures for exploring and keeping in touch. A good example is "Zoom" which is growing in popularity amongst our league as well as your local clubs. My message to YLs in this issue is the upcoming DX/NA YL contest. It's not too early to prepare for the contest being held October 3 started at 1400 UTC and ending October 4 at 0200 UTC. 2020 will mark the 81st anniversary of YLRL. The club obtained ARRL affiliation in October 1939. Wouldn't it be great if 81 YLs submitted logs this year?

Many YLs take contesting very seriously. Don't let that intimidate you. Everyone has to start somewhere. I do participate in contesting; but I have more success in Special Events. Here are a few tips that helped me become more confident to get-on-the-air:

- Turn on your radio and listen to contests ... jot down notes ... when ready, make a QSO. Then, make another. It doesn't take long to feel comfortable making QSOs. Always remember to view the rules for contests/event. Some differ from others.
- Make a contact with "Meet-up-with-Anne" every Wednesday at 0100 UTC very friendly YL net. Anne, WB1ARU, was my first HF contact. I was scared, didn't know what to say, but she was my guiding light to eliminate my mic-fright fear. I tend to use Anne as an example; there were two other Elmiras that come to mind … Ria, N2RJ, and Andrea, K2EZ.

Special Events are user-friendly as well and most SEs have QSL cards that you can exchange with one another. It's always nice to exchange QSL cards with other YLs.

Another good venue is the YL-ISSB (Young Ladies International Single Sideband). This is not to be confused with our league of YLRL. The YL-ISSB was started by YLs and most officers are YLs. The Net Operators allow you to make a QSO to others. It's an excellent way to perfect your skills.

In the beginning of my radio adventures, I set a goal for myself of one contact per day. Just build on that one contact. It's a good start!





They are in general very appreciative of the opportunity to get this accomplished wherever they are located. Fun fact: a preferred location for testing—a bathroom, as there are several criteria that must be met by the

candidate for the Zoom testing to be set up successfully! I helped my OM Jim, WB4EJR, put up a 6 meter halo antenna recently (see photo).

Our club Sci-Tech Amateur Radio Society (STARS) put on a modified Field Day for club members-no visitors. We had a protected outdoor location and generators under a canopy-since rain was part of the weekend. Various antennas graced the skies and contacts were attempted/made on 80, 40, 20, 10, 6 and 2 meters. Operators comprised all age ranges; we wore masks and operated in a socially distant manner as much as possible. We ate our separate meals but enjoyed each other's company safely.



Anne, WB1ARU was active on Field Day with her OM Tony, WA1ENO. They used his call and operated as 1E, the same class they have used for several years. They were on the air for about 19 and a half hours, making just under 1000 Qs. Anne was pleased to work Dawn, WA4YL, three times on two different bands. She also made a contact with New Zealand. There were many stations on the air, although propagation was not as good as some years. They worked very little of the West Coast or in the Northwest.

He did not believe me until the next morning when he looked out the window and saw the destruction of the trees blown down and broken off. There



was no damage to our apartment, but part of the apartment complex had roof damage and missing shingles. Our only damage was that a long wire antenna we had strung out to one of the trees had come down with the uprooted tree. Electricity and cell phone service were interrupted for several days due to downed power lines and cell tower damage. We were just at the edge of the tornado; two blocks away whole subdivisions, several churches, and two schools were destroyed. Attached is a photo showing trees down at the apartment complex.

The third item is from two YLRL members who have formed at CW class just for YLs using ZOOM. They started this class through the Long Island, NY, CW Club. The LICW Club has about 25 Zoom classes each week with US and international students. Two local area YLs have just started a CW class for YLs ONLY. Jennifer, KF4INA, is the Communications Director, and Leanne, W4LEA, is the instructor. Eighteen YLs were online for the first class. The class meets each Saturday night at 9:00 Eastern time. It is designed for YLs at all levels of CW skill to enjoy learning Morse Code. If you are interested in joining, Jennifer requests you email her.

Rules for All YLRL Contests

1. Check to make certain you are sending logs to the CURRENT Vice-President.

2. Logs must be postmarked no later than 30 days after each contest ends.

3. Scoring:

4. Phone and CW contests will be scored separately. Separate logs must be submitted for each contest.

5. One point is earned for each different station worked on each band. The same station may be worked on different bands. In the YL-OM contest only, YLs count OMs and OMs count YLs.

6. Multiplier will be the ARRL sections and/or DX countries, whichever is appropriate. Canadian provinces are counted individually. Multipliers are used only once on all bands when figuring the score.

7. Contestants running 5W or less will be considered QRP and earn a power factor of 3. Contestants running 5W to 100W will be considered low power and earn a power factor of 1.5. Contestants running over 100W will be high power. If no transmitter power is listed on logs, no power factor will be given.

Total scored claimed is calculated by multiplying the points times the multiplier times the power factor.

Logs

1. All logs must show the operator's ARRL section, VE province, or country to qualify for awards. Where applicable, logs must state whether or not the operator is a member of YLRL. For each QSO, logs must also state the power output. If you have 200 or more QSOs, submit a separate log for each band and submit a "dupe" sheet.

2. Please type or print. If you print a log from a logging program or photocopy your log book, be sure they include all the required information.

3. Logs must be signed and show claimed score. No logs will be returned.

Entries in log must also show time, band, date and transmitter power.

Exchange

Station worked, QSO number given and received, RS(T) given and received, and section/ province/country.

Entry categories

Single operator and YL clubs/groups.
