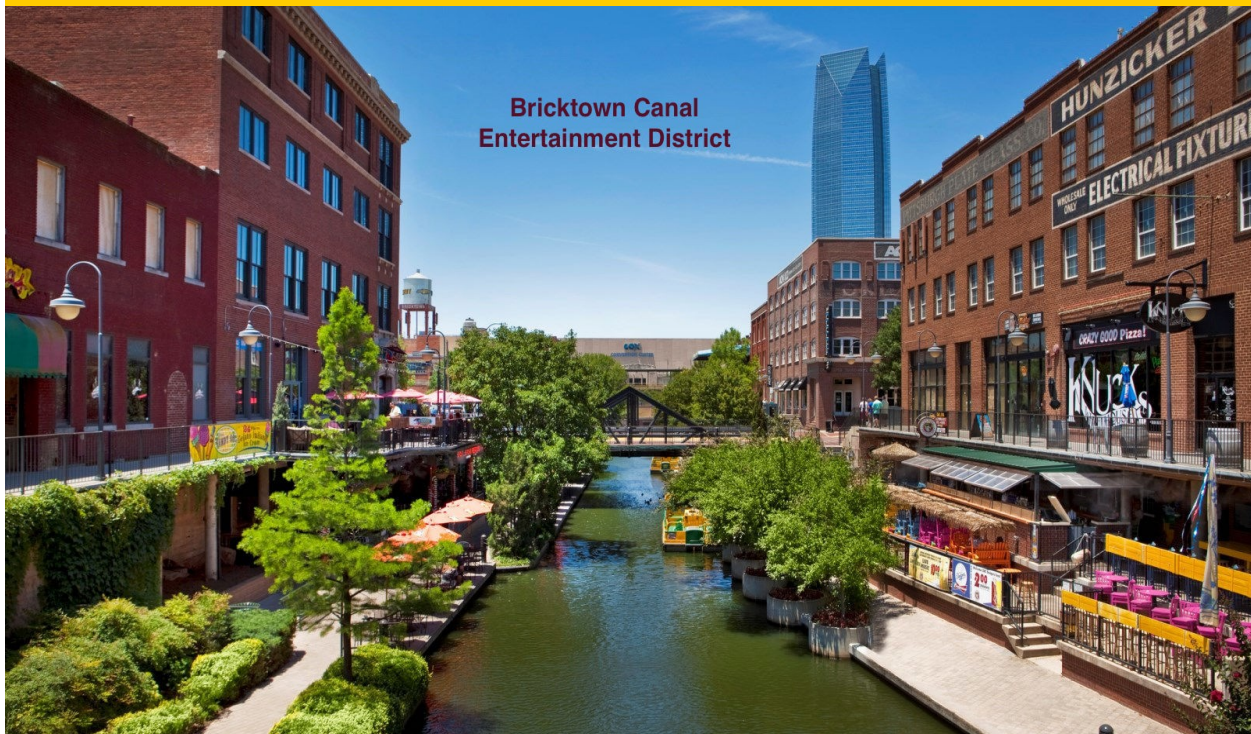

For new and reinstating (lapsed more than 2 years) members joining after June 30th, dues are pro-rated by half the annual dues for that fiscal year. An additional **\$4.00** required for Canada and Mexico airmail. Dues for a licensed YL family member (residing at the same address) are **\$3.00**. Subscriptions for non-members are \$15.00 per year and may not be pro-rated for portions of years. Subscribers must add the same extra postage, for mailing outside of the United States of \$10.00

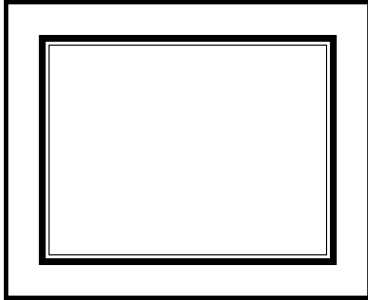

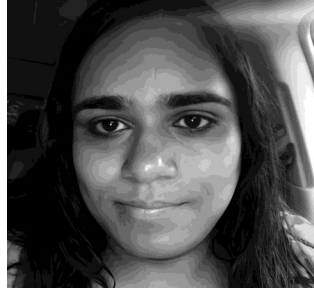
I do hope you all are starting to think about what you can do in your own clubs to get involved with what that club is doing. With summer coming up it's a good time to start planning.

Brenda Brown, AC1EJ (new upgrade to Extra)

1. Passed Extra exam at W1YU, the Amateur Radio Club at Yale, on March 3.
 2. Participated with other mentors in 4 training sessions for the Techs and Generals who were studying to take their exams the same day I took mine. My own mentor is my OM, K1RSU.
 3. Participated in previous VE sessions at W1YU, signing exams for new techs. I am certified VE for ARRL and W5YI.
 4. Complete list of UHF nets that I participate in, all on 443500, the SPARC repeater:
Sundays: CT State ARES net
Mondays: Ct Regional ARES net
Tuesdays: W1YU Yale net
Wednesdays: SPARC info and talk net - I am net control once a month.
 5. Thursdays: I also participate weekly in the YL net on Echo Link.
 6. Daily discussions with my OM about the system of antennas that we will be installing at home. We plan a long wire for HF strung out to a tree. We plan to move our UHF antenna to the roof. We will also have a probe on the roof. We are making numerous measurements and considering many options. It is a slow process and will take a few months before we have things set up, but we are doing it right.
 7. We are working with our local maker space, Make Haven, to give New Haven its own web sdr, and radio antennas for Make Haven. Again it is a slow process as they just moved to a new location and are just getting set up in the new building.
 8. We regularly attend meetings of SPARC, MARRA, VARG, and W1YU and occasionally make it to MARS in Portland CT.
 9. I finally finished my Core 4 FEMA certification for ARES, which is also a requirement for VARG, the Veterans Administration Radio Group. I am secretary/treasurer of VARG, which is associated with the EOC at the West Haven VA Medical Center. We are learning about their Resilient HF network and organizing their radio room.
 10. I am practicing Morse Code on various iPhone apps- just started focusing on that as my next goal after passing Extra.

I love this hobby. I needed some nuts and bolts for a task I was working on and upon arriving at the hardware store Girl Scouts were there selling Girl Scout cookies. IMMEDIATELY, MY HEAD GOES **BINGO MORE YLS**. I actually don't like Girl Scout cookies. When I came out they asked me if I wanted to buy cookies, immediately said no thanks, BUT I would love to come and talk to the group about Amateur Radio. The scout leader asked what kinds of things do Amateur radio Operators do? I mentioned Boston Marathon (all the communication), Emergency Management and we work with FEMA and MEMA (mass emergency management Agency and lots more. I said, "but I would like to show the Girl Scouts something about Morse Code. I gave her a quick demonstration of Morse Code. She loved it. She said that is great we are now teaching girls how to be analytical and survey everything. We are also teaching them how to detect cryptic codes. So your Morse Code would come in very handy. Here's my story. As a kid, I had always wanted to learn Morse Code, partly because I had uncles who fought in WWII, I even still have a practice signal coder given to me by one of them. In the 70s one of our sons, totally on his own, joined ARRL and was trying to study for his license, he was quite young and we were quite busy with 3 growing children. It unfortunately never happened and I still feel badly that he didn't get enough support from us to become licensed. He is the only one of our 3 that someday might actually get into amateur radio, when his children are grown.

Now fast forward to 1993 and my OM got his license and worked his way to Amateur Extra, a very proud and exciting day for us. We had a 2M mobile rig in the car and he would do a lot of listening but not a lot of talking. And I'd always be nagging at him to put out his call and get into one of the repeater conversations, they were quite active back then. One day after pestering him about this, he said, if you want to talk so much, why don't you get your own license.

What a challenge! This was in the days when there was significant presence of Morse Code involved. I thought, I'm too old to learn something new like that, practically a new language. But I plunged ahead and signed up for a course being taught at a local school by a local old time ham. There were 4 other potential future YLs in the class, so 5 of us in a class of probably 10 or 15. That's pretty good! 4 of us YLs stuck it out and completed the class and we've never lost that connection to each other. When we tested, they all made tech but I only passed the Novice Q&A plus the 5 wpm Morse Code portion and ended up with a Novice license. KB1BMO was my first call and we had a local ham that was right on with the phonetics, mine was Big Mouth Operator. Little did he know.

Looking back on it, it was probably the best thing that happened to me because my first HF contacts were CW and I'm pretty proud of that. I still remember my very first contact with an OM in Montreal, we had a great rag chew and he was very patient and encouraging. I still try to get on the air for Straight Key Night, even with other keys now available, that's still my favorite.

I went on from there to pass Tech, Advanced and then really pushed to get my Amateur Extra while 20 wpm code was still required. I knew there was a change coming to license requirements and I wanted to be tested while 20 wpm was part of the AE license. Next year will be my quarter-century anniversary and when I originally was licensed and learned about the Quarter Century club, it seemed so far away that I wondered if I'd still be around.

After ARRL, the first groups I joined were WRONE and YLRL and I've been a member of all 3 ever since. Sometimes, maybe even now, I'm the only Vermont member. I made lifelong friends through WRONE and a small group of us who were part of WWV, Wireless Women of Vermont, used make regular trips to ARRL HDQ to operate at W1AW, CW and SSB. Incredible fun!

I am fairly active in the hobby although not on the air as much as at our old QTH. Propagation here has always been a problem and even with radio and antenna improvements we've never achieved the same level. I am VT Section OOC, a VE, ARES member and at one time FEMA, Bulletin Station and WAS HF Awards Manager. I am the trustee & admin of call sign W1WWV (Wireless Women of Vermont), and admin of W1ARF (Amateur Radio Fun), our family club call.

It was a special event on the USS Batfish, one of many over the next four years to commemorate the 52 boats & crew lost during WW2. It took me the weekend to break through the pileup but I finally logged the contact.

Year-Long NASA On The Air Event Kicks off on December 11/22/2017

The Amateur Radio clubs at National Aeronautics and Space Administration (**NASA**) centers around the US have invited the Amateur Radio community to join the NASA On The Air (**NOTA**) special event. NOTA gets under way in December 2017 and continues through December 2018. In addition to being the agency's 60th anniversary, 2018 will mark 50 years since NASA orbited the first human around the moon, and 20 years since the first elements of the International Space Station (ISS) were launched into low-Earth orbit.

Starting on Monday, December 11, 2017 (UTC), Amateur Radio club stations at various NASA centers and facilities will be on the air with special event operations to celebrate these monumental achievements, as well as current milestones. Some clubs will offer commemorative QSL cards, and a special certificate will be available indicating the number of NASA club stations worked on various bands and modes.

"We plan to have a web-based system for you to check your points total and download a printable certificate at the end of the event in December 2018," the NASA announcement said. "Points will be awarded for each center worked on each band and mode (phone, CW, digital, and 'space' modes — satellites, meteor scatter, EME, ISS APRS)." That would, of course, include contacts with any of the Amateur Radio stations on the ISS.

Key anniversaries during NOTA include the 45th anniversary of Apollo 17 on December 11, 2017, which kicks off the event; NASA's founding on July 29, 1958; the 20th anniversary of the ISS first element launch on November 20, 1998; the 20th anniversary of the ISS Node 1 Launch on December 4, 1998, and the 50th anniversary of Apollo 8 — launched on December 21, 1968, and returned on December 27 — marking the end of the event.

Ham radio clubs at various NASA facilities will sponsor their own special events to commemorate and celebrate specific events. "We hope to be on the air for casual contacts and contests as well. All contacts with NASA club stations will count toward your total," the announcement said. "QSL cards can be requested from each club you work and details will be on the individual QRZ.com profile page for each club call sign."

More information is on the NASA On The Air website. Participating Amateur Radio clubs, and the NASA On The Air (NOTA) event are independent of — and not officially sponsored by — NASA. — *Thanks to **Rob Suggs**, KB5EZ, NASA Marshall Space Flight Center Amateur Radio Club (NN4SA), and **Kevin Zari**, KK4YEL, NASA Kennedy Space Center Amateur Radio Club (NIKSC).*
