

VICE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

After 10 years of dedicated service to YLRL, Katherine Johnson, W4SGD, has decided to give up her post as YLCC Certificate Custodian. Katherine has done a magnificent job with what is undoubtedly the most demanding certificate job in the organization. We hate to see her go, but there is a limit to what one gal can do. Good luck, Katherine, and our thanks. Perhaps now you will find more time to be on the air.

About the same time Katherine began making noises about quitting YLCC, Onie, W1ZEN, wrote that she would be happy to take a certificate custodian job if one happened to be at loose ends. Little did she know what she was saying, hi! Since there are well over 600 YLCC certificates which have been awarded in all parts of the world, the change-over will be a difficult one. I hope each of you will spread the word to all interested parties so there will be a minimum of conflict.

Therefore, as of-September 1, 1965 the new YLCC Custodian will be Onie Woodward, W1ZEN. If you are working for this award, or for stickers for the award, please do not send your cards to Katherine after August 1, 1965. There will have to be a transfer of files which will take time. Right now I am up to 'here' in YL/OM logs and it may, therefore, seem premature to be even thinking ahead to the YLAP in the Fall. However, in recent years there has been much QRM from DX YLs who do not participate in this contest due to the lack of interest on the part of the U.S. YLs to work them. Arlie, W4HLF, has given the incentive for the DX gals to participate by virtue of her new DX awards, but added stimulus is needed to make the gals listen for DX stations who may be weak. Therefore the following rule change will be in effect for the 1965 YLAP.

SCORING: All YLs located within an ARRL Section shall score one (1) point for each contact with enother station located within an ARRL Section. Score two (2) points for each contact with a station NOT located within an ARRL Section. i.e. DX

DX YLs (By definition, all stations not located within an ARRL Section) shall score two (2) points for each contact with a station located in an ARRL Section. Score one (1) point for each contact with another DX station.

NOTE: It is imperative that each YL know her section and identify herself as being in an ARRL Section. Puerto Rico, for instance, is in the West Indies Section. Do not use the name of the country if it is in an ARRL Section. (SECTION LISTS ARE AVAILABLE FROM THE VICE PRESIDENT. ENCLOSE S.A.S.E. TO RECEIVE ONE.)

To further clarify the new rule change - it means working a DX station will be the same as working two gals in ARRL sections. All other rules will remain the same. You will multiply QSO points times sections and/or countries to come out with your final score. It is very easy to work the strong stations, but perhaps this will give us the urge to listen through the QRM for the weaker, possible DX

station who is calling.

I have talked to many DX YLs over the last few years who do not participate in the YLAP. They have worked the contest year after year and only succeeded in working 2 or 3 YLs in 30-35 hours of trying. Naturally they give up. If YIRL is to be known as an international YL organization, we must allow the DX gals a fighting chance. I don't know if this will be the answer. If not, the rules may be changed back. I feel it is essential that each YL who enters the contest has a fair chance to win as the top scorer. We have managed to have a top winner from Hawaii and Alaska in the past. These are in ARRL Sections. Now let's see if our top gal can be from "real" DX for a change. I think this will stimulate all of us to take more interest in the contest.

I am most pleased with the comments from the OMs in the correspondence re YL/OM contest so far. There are so many notes enclosed about the operating efficiency of the YLs that it will be impossible to quote them all. The enormous volume of CW logs pleases me. The comments are much along the line that the YLs are such good operators that the OMs can take lessons from them. This is very nice to hear! Keep up the reputation gals!

"Kayla, A Very Smart YL"

The above is a direct quote from the April 1965 issue of POPULAR ELECTRONICS. It's a funny thing. No matter how well you think you know someone, there's always something additional popping up. I've known for ages of Kayla's interest in propagation, but didn't know how deeply she goes into it.

Briefly the POPULAR ELECTRONICS article "Across the Ham Bands" states that they had reported in December 1964 that Kayla had prophesied in the Denver Radio Club's publication "Round Table" that the minimum point of the current sunspot cycle would occur in August 1964. Most of the experts were at that time, and later, predicting the minimum for April 1965. According to ARRL Official Bulletin #984, the Central Radio Propagation Laboratory of the National Bureau of Standards believes that the minimum probably did occur in the late summer of 1964!

This prompted me to write Kayla for details: " The OM's comment was," You made a lucky guess". In

many ways he is right.

I've been interested in propagation since 1956. While I was studying for my license a ham friend briefly explained propagation, the ionisphere, and how the various layers affect the different frequencies etc. Since that time I've been reading everything I could get my hands on about the subject. I've plotted, monthly, paths for frequencies which would get me where I wanted to work. I have managed to keep daily skeds with DX stations on what appeared to be "dead" bands.

As to my "lucky guess" - I prefer to call it a "calculated guess". The current sunspot cycle was, in many ways, different from past recorded cycles. And although the "experts" were predicting the minimum would occur in April 1965, they were being conservative, I think. There was actually a good deal of speculation going on behind the scenes and the opinions were divided as early as July 1964 as to when the minimum would actually occur, if it hadn't already.

I took a chance and stuck my silly neck out by saying in August, 1964, "The Doldrums are over! We

have hit bottom and conditions should begin to improve" or words to that effect.

In the ensuing months, on many occasions, I prayed that my words had not been read by many who would remember them because everything I read led me to believe that I had been premature in my predictions. However, until the observed sunspot data could be studied, to one could be sure.

Call it a "lucky guess" as the OM did - or say "Kayla, A Very Smart YL" as POPULAR ELECTRONICS did,

hi. Perhaps it was another case of "woman's intuition" which made me sure - who knows?

Hindsight is great! I could just as easily have been mrong. In any case, had I known the "Round Table" was so widely read, I would have kept my big mouth closed very tightly, I assure you!"

Thanks, Kayla, for the information. Personally, I think YIRL should be very proud of its Vice President, who, "lucky" guess or not, is definitely one "very smart YL".

Then, as we drove along the Wall, you could see the no man's land of barbed wire beyond it and here and there the platforms the West Berliners built to stand and look over the wall to wave at friends on the other side. We climbed some of these, and 'whoops', right in front of us was a block house with the East German police watching - with their machine guns. In the buildings along the wall, windows have been bricked up so the whole building is essentially a piece of the wall.

We headed South after leaving the corridor thru the eastern zone and stopped at several old cities en route to Munich. All this time the OM, Nino, was visiting computer centers, companies who make them or Universities and I was keeping notes and books - so that altho it may sound like the grand tour, many of the days were working ones, gathering information for the computer books. We finished one just before leaving, which was in production while we were gone; it finally came out in October.
