YL DXpedition to Tortola and Grenada November 1991

The Virgin Islands form the easternmost extension of the Greater Antilles island chain, and are administratively divided into two groups—the British Virgin Islands and the Virgin Island of the U. S. The British islands are about 40 in number, and Tortola is the largest with an area of 21 square miles and population of 20,000.

Grenada is furthest south in the group of islands comprising the Lesser Antilles, and is one of the four Windward Islands. It is independent, with dominion status within the British Commonwealth. With its island dependencies, Grenada boasts an area of 133 square miles and a population of around 90,000.

I left Vancouver on November 9th and flew to Tampa, where I was met by Alice, N4DDK; Mary Lou, NM7N, and Nellie, XE1CI. It was great to see them and to get an up-date on all the plans, including the callsigns that we were being issued. Flo, KU7F, arrived the next day, and packing of all the equipment progressed rapidly.

We were to hand-carry three rigs, power supplies, co-ax, tools, etc. The rest of the equipment and the two antennas, the Cushcraft R5 and the Mosley TA 33 Junior, which travelled in long boxes inside ski bags, were our check-in baggage. Ski bags in the Caribbean caused a few raised eyebrows!

Our flight to San Juan was at 8:50 a.m., and we connected there at 1:50 p.m. for Tortola. On arrival at Beef Island, we cleared customs with no problems and went by open-sided bus to Road Town, the capital city, and picked up our 4WD mini-van.

We were soon to learn why Bob, VP2VR, had recommended such a vehicle! As the islands are the peaks of submerged mountains that rise from a submarine plateau, we were either going straight up, straight down, or up and down! We had been advised to stock up at the supermarket. Due to vague instructions and maps that didn't really tell us much, we had some problems finding it, but eventually we found it and bought supplies before pointing ourselves up the mountain and getting thoroughly lost!

Some hours later, with the light rapidly fading, we became desperate and stopped at a house to phone Bob, VP2VR, who had organized the rental of the house we were to stay in and who, in learning we were lost, came out to find us. He then led us to our destination. It didn't take us long to realize that we would never, never have found our own way nor would we have been too happy with the conditions of the roads if we had been able to see exactly where we were going and over what!

Though you drive on the left side of the road on Tortolla, most of the cars have the steering wheel on the left so the driver always has a lovely view of the sheer dropoff, sometimes within a couple of feet of the edge of the road! Alice did all our driving and did a wonderful job. Not only was she driving on the wrong side (for her), but she tackled a stick shift 4WD as if she had driven one all her life.

Any plans to get antennas up on the day of our arrival were dashed by our late arrival, as there is no twilight in the tropics, but both the vertical and the beam elements were put together that night on the sitting room floor. Everything was prepared for an early start the next morning. Our rented house was 600 feet up from the sea, with two bedrooms, two bathrooms, a large sitting room/kitchen, lovely verandah, washer and dryer (very important), a guest house a short walk away and, wonder of wonders, an absolutely magnificent view toward Jost van Dyke to the west, with a daily spectacular sunset. Since we had permission to use the guest house, we decided to set up the R5 and the Kenwood there. Early on Tuesday, the 12th, the antenna went up, balanced on the verandah railing with a cement building brick and an upside-down hibachi to get it up those last few inches to clear the rain gutter. The minute the vertical was up and the station put together, VP2V/XE1CI went on the air at 1434Z.

Getting the beam up was a little more difficult because of the slope of the land, but we eventually found a spot at the side of the road above the house, and with VP2VR to help walk it up, we got it in place and guyed. The coax was run down the hill to the main house, and VP2V/NM7N was on the air at 2108Z. The next morning Mary Lou was on with RTTY. Later that afternoon Bob, VP2VI, Bob VP2VR, and Dough, VP2VG, came over to visit and found both stations working well.

We all used the call VP2V, plus our callsign. Rather a mouthful! Propagation was poor, and we did not get the openings we had hoped for into either Europe or Japan. 24 and 18 MHz were very popular, as was RTTY. The days were hot, and with the house facing west, we got the full force of the afternoon sun, but the evenings were cool. We had a roster for operating duties, and everyone helped with either cooking or washing dishes, depending upon their shift. Alice saw to it that we got safely down to Road Town when supplies ran low. Both Mary Lou and I had hand-carried laptop computers and spent any free time entering log data for later QSLing.

On the 17th at noon, the beam came down, was dismantled, and put back into its ski bag. While everyone else went off sightseeing, I stayed with the second station and the vertical, working until 2058Z, when that also came down to be packed away.

We left Beef Island the next morning and arrived in Grenada at 1:25 p.m., where we were met by Tony J39CM, and Derek, J39BS. Tony had our licenses and callsigns, J37 plus our initials, and we learned that we might be issued J37YL for the CQ WW CW contest. Our cottage was at the Flamboyant Hotel, near the airport, and once again, the vertical went up first. That station was on the air that evening on 18 MHz, and the beam was assembled, so it could go up the first thing next morning. We set up two stations at either end of the sitting room, and Mary Lou again set up a roster.

During the CQ WW CW (yes, we did use J37YL), Mary Lou, Alice, and I worked two hours on and four hours off. It's a long time since I've taken part in such concentrated hamming. Propagation from 2:00 a.m. to 5:00 a.m. was very poor during the contest, but we were able to use that time to look for multipliers. We made over 1,000,000 points, not bad for our first attempt.

The day before departure, the beam came down first, and just before dark, the vertical. Next morning, J39BS picked us up for a quick look at the city of St. George's, with a drive up to Grand Elang Lake and the forest preserve. We saw nutmeg trees and learned that you get both nutmeg and mace from the same tree. Grenada is the Isle of Spice! We were overwhelmed with the support that we got from Tony, Derek, and John, J39CR—what wonderful people hams are! We left Grenada at 3:10 p.m. and arrived back in Florida at 8:45 p.m. We had a wonderful time, made between 10 and 11 thousand QSOs and met some wonderful people. Where will we go next?

A Visit to Indonesia

Last July my husband started his second retirement. Mr. Uchiyama asked me, "Where do you want to go". I answered at once, "I want to go to Bali," because I remembered that I saw very wonderful scenes of Bali on TV.

About one week before our departure at 10:00 p.m., my husband was CWing eagerly to YF0AQD. It seemed to be a YL. Then he said, "You contact!" After the QSO, I sent 33, and she sent back "C U AGN IN JAKARTA"??

We could not fly straight to Bali, so the airplane was routed Taipei-Singapore-Jakarta-Bali. Upon arrival in Jakarta, we went straight to our hotel. It was 11:00 p.m., but we tried to call Indra. We gave up trying to call and wrote a postcard to her.

We looked for a red post box in the hotel, but we could not find one, so we asked a hotel worker. It was right in front of me. In Japan, post boxes are red, but in Indonesia, they are wonderful carved brown wood boxes. We were surprised and stood there admiring it. Then on to Bali!

In Bali, at first, the atmosphere seemed similar to that of my house; the plants and flowers were the same as those in Okinawa. But it was cooler than Okinawa. There were no doors, so I could see through from the front to the backyard of the hotel. So I asked, "When typhoons come, what do you do?" They said, "Bali is God's island. Typhoons never come." We were near the equator, so typhoons just get started here.

The next morning, I was listening to a radio. We tuned into NHK, the Japanese station, which said typhoon #19 was passing through Tamashiro-son, Okinawa, Japan, our home. It was small, but very strong. It was "a bolt from the blue." When we had left the airport at Naha, Okinawa, we didn't know about any typhoon. I asked my husband what he had done with the antenna. He said, "I did not think a typhoon would come." Since the beginning of his second retirement, I had made up my mind never to say anything critical, so I said just, "I see." But next time, second retirement or not, I will speak up when I feel it's necessary.

During the next week, we spotted many antennas, but we couldn't meet their owners. There were many Japanese tourists in Bali, and the hotel workers spoke Japanese very well. We tried to say "terima kasih banyak" and decided to forget about our antenna in Okinawa, but it was a terrible mess when we got home.

After returning to Jakarta, we got a message from Indra at the hotel. We were excited about meeting this YL. Would she be a young and pretty YL? Or middle-aged YL?... Indra and her younger brother Chandra came to the hotel, and we exchanged QSL cards and talked to each other eagerly. Both of them looked very young. Indra was very cute, and she said that she studied English 8 hours a day, 4 days a week.

They took us to visit the National Museum and we looked at the bones of the Java Man. At lunchtime, Indra and her brother took us to a restaurant such as we had never seen in Japan. The restaurant occupied three floors, but the second and third floors were actually mezzanines along the sides, leaving a huge open space in the center. Next we went to the Independence Memorial Tower and learned how Sukarno led the way to Indonesia's independence. Then it was time for Indra to go to school.

On the way back, I knew that Indra thought there were no other YLs in Japan who QSO by CW. I have introduced her to JLRS and made her a DX member. Now I hope to visit Indonesia again, and I am happy to introduce to you this young and active YL Indra, who likes CW very much. Listen for her at 21.155 and 21.255 MHz.

Meet Lia Zwack, WA2NFY

Each day is a precious gift. For Lia, WA2NFY, these wise words embody her view of life. At age 70, Lia is busier than ever and seems to relish it. She's an avid YL, a bird watcher, and a lover of nature. And she's also a hiker, skier, swimmer, gardener, quilter, and a volunteer. These interests keep Lia young at heart.

Lia and her OM Lee, W2WPF, married in 1968. Before this, Lia was a nanny for wealthy families in Germany, Italy, Switzerland, and, in 1965, the U. S. During her working years, she helped raise nearly 30 children, whom she now fondly calls "her family," and she can tell fascinating stories of those times.

Lia's love for children persists, and often on the YL nets, she talks about a baby quilt or bonnets, booties, and mittens that's she's making for a neighbor or some YL around the world. Her creations have homes in several countries. She's also a volunteer each week at a center that provides clothing for the needy.

Four years ago, Lia started a bonsai collection, after visiting some of the JA YLs and attending a JLRS meeting. She now carefully tends almost two dozen plants, as well as the many rose bushes, perennials, and trees that she and Lee have planted.

But Lia's YL activities usually take first place. She was licensed in 1973 and is active in all of the YLRL contests on both SSB and CW. She is fluent in German, Italian, French, and English, and she can often be found on 10 meters on Mondays, talking to some of the European YLs. Lia doesn't have time to be bored and looks forward to every day. "Each different hobby is a way of being in contact with other people," she says. In early March, her doctor advised her to slow down just a bit—maybe she could slow down enough so that she's only doing about twice as much as the rest of us!

5. Be aware of seasonal propagation patterns, but check all bands.
6. Be sure that your log is accurate and contains all the required information. A checksheet is appreciated if many multipliers are claimed.
