Subscriptions for non-members are \$15.00 per year and may not be pro-rated for portions of years. Subscribers must add the same extra postage, for mailing outside of the United States of \$10.00.

Tried PSK31 when I got home and had a few problems—one was every time I entered a call sign I'd get a message saying "United States not allowed." Finally got that fixed and I've made 5 PSK31 contacts.

I'm up to January 2011 for sending QSOs to LoTW. I've sent in over a thousand. We had a new person join us for the Texas Young Ladies Round up Net this week. I hope to work some more PSK31 this weekend.

Winter seems to be setting in this year. The garden is fully asleep, so I am doing more radio, mostly in the form of Digital Amateur Television (DATV).

The local ARES group has used Amateur TV for years to supplement information being provided to our served agencies. The problem has always been getting a quality picture into the room they want it. Getting a picture back at all from mountain locations can be a challenge; for one Simulated Emergency Training (SET) scenario to get a picture out of the mountains, we bounced the signal off a mountain to feed the picture to the valley below. On June 26, 2012, a forest fire west Colorado Springs blew into town and burned about 350 homes. That same day, a fire cresting the mountains west of Boulder was just waiting for a good gust of wind do the same to Boulder. For two days, we transmitted video to the incident command to help give early warning that such a wind might be coming up. While, fortunately, for us the gusts never came, we still were faced with the challenge: getting a good enough picture 10 miles into a room in a building we had never worked in before. We did it! With an antenna 20 feet up, a 10 watt signal, and a receive amplifier.

Picture quality is rated on a P (picture) scale 0-5, with "P3" being considered useable, and "P2" readable (like an audio signal where you can carry on a conversation, but it is work). "P5" is a perfectly clear. Experience has shown us that anything below P4 is rarely watched by our served agencies.

Enter DATV. Like all digital signals, and like the digital picture on your commercial TV, the signal is either perfect, or gone. There is a slight in-between state, where the picture kinds of flickers in and out and the result is little squares across part or all of the picture. Fortunately, the best part is that the receiver can pick out quite a weak signal and process it to be a P5 perfect picture. The result is that we can get that useful picture using less power (therefore less battery, which is important if you have to carry it in). Instead of 10 watts for 5 to about 30 mile transmission, we use 1.5 to 3. With 10 watts, our group successfully transmitted from north of the Wyoming border to south Boulder, a distance of over 75 miles.

There are at least five formats for digital television signals. We have elected to use the Digital Video Broadcasting system used in Europe, Australia, and New Zealand, which is crisper and can use lighter, more portable



equipment than that using the Advanced Television System Committee (ATSC) which is standard in North America. The major disadvantage of this selection is that you do need a special receiver (if you had a European TV, you wouldn't).

So what is needed for equipment? A standard video camera, a transmitter, an amplifier (mine can bring the signal up to 3 watts), and of course coax and antenna. I operate in the 70 cm. range; others around us are also experimenting with microwave frequencies with good success. On the receive end, you also need and antenna and coax, a demodulator, and a connection to your video screen (HDMI or component). Or, to receive, there are "dongles" you can plug into your computer. The dongles come with a small antenna to pick up local radio stations, but can also plug into your antenna. Several people in our area have started with such a dongle, for \$10 to \$20, then progressed into transmission.

So, if you are bored with the same old same old, here is another something to play with. If you want more information, I suggest www.kh6htv.com. This is the website of Jim Andrews, who is a real expert on the topic and the person I ask if when I have questions.

There have been many controversies over the definitions of YL versus XYL. The term YL was first defined in a Traffic Report signed The American Radio Relay League by E. C. Adams on May 13, 1920 to Miss M. Adaire Garmhausen, 3BCK. He was replying to her submission of an article submitted to *QST* on "How to Build a Wireless Station".


In it he called her "My Dear YL—" and stated, "We have had to coin a new phrase for your benefit as you will readily see that OM will not fit and OL [Old Lady] would certainly be most in applicable." Even though Miss Garmhausen wasn't the first YL ham radio operator, this is when the term was first applied specifically to label all women as Young Ladies no matter what their age.

The article was published in the July 1920 issue of *QST* and a second article of hers followed in May 1921, but it wasn't until the October 1922 had the column "Who's Who in Amateur Wireless" that M. Adaire's picture was printed as she was honored along with another YL, Miss Winifred Dow, 7CP, from Tacoma, WA.

Many OMs have used XYL (meaning Ex-Young Lady) to describe a wife versus a single lady, but some women, though not all, take offence at this term feeling that getting married does not mean a female is no longer a Young Lady.

In May 1940, the YLRL set forth the policy for *YL-Harmonics* and YLRL that the term "YL" was to be used of all licensed amateur operators of the feminine sex. This meant they were all young ladies no matter what their marital status was. A licensed woman is a YL while an XYL is a non-licensed wife.

In the April, 1925, *QST*, under strays, it says, "8ACY says that 8UH has obtained a storm and strife with the insane idea of making an OW of her. We think it would be a much nicer idea to make her a YL. At any rate the Mrs. can do ten words per minute already."



ORIGIN OF 33

The History and Proper Use of 33 "33", the signature used between YLs is often mis-used and its origin tends to get lost. YLRL was organized in 1939 and it was at this time that, through YLRL women amateur Radio Operators seemed to find their niche. "YL" was adopted as a general term denoting any licensed Amateur feminine operator, regardless of age or marital status.

"33" was originated in 1939 by Clara, W2RUF (ex W8KYR) and adopted by YLRL for exclusive YL use. It means "Love sealed with friendship between one YL and another YL". With this background and meaning, it is very understandable that "33" is not only exclusive with YLs but is NEVER used in the plural. We sign "33", never 33's.

- 6. All inquiries should be addresses to the appropriate custodian.
- 7. Decisions of the custodians regarding interpretations of the rules as here stated or later amended shall be final.
- 8. Certificate custodians and their addresses are listed in each issue of YL Harmonics.
