

TIME: Phone - Saturday, Feb. 20, 1965, 1300 EST (1800 GMT) until Sunday, February 21, 1965 2400 EST (0500 GMT 2-22)

> CW Saturday, March 6, 1965 1300 EST (1800 GMT) until Sunday, March 7, 1965 2400 EST (0500 GMT 3-8)

ELIGIBILITY:

All licensed OM. YL and XYL operators throughout the world are invited to participate.

OPERATION: All bands may be used. Cross band operation is not permitted.

PROCEDURE: OMs call "CQ YL". YLs call "CQ OM".

EXCHANGE: QSO number, RS or RST report, ARRL Section or Contry. Entries in log should show band worked at the time of contact, time, date, transmitter and power. (ARRL section lists are available for an SASE from the V.P.)

SCORING: (a) Phone and CW contests will be scored as separate contests. Submit separate logs.

(b) One point is earned for each station worked, YL to OM or OM to YL. A station may be contacted no more than once in each contest for credit.

(c) Multiply the number of QSOs by the number of different ARRL Sections and Countries worked.

(d) Contestants running 150 watts input or less at all times may multiply the results of (c) by 1.25. (Low power multiplier.)

(e) SSB contestants running 300 watts P.E.P. or less at all times may multiply the results of (c) by 1.25. (Low power multiplier.)

LOGS: Copies of all phone and CW logs, showing claimed scores and signed by the operator, must be postmarked no later than March 31, 1965 and received no later than April 15, 1965 or they will be disqualified. Please file separate logs for each section of the contest. Send your copies of your log to Martha Edwards, W6QYL 2855 West Avenue M8

ADDITIONS TO YL/OM CONTEST RULES:

SCORING FOR VHF STATIONS: Number of contacts times low power multiplier, if applicable. * There is no multiplication by ARRL Sections and Countries.

AWARDS: First place fone and cw, both YL and OM, will receive a special award.

* COMMENTS: You wanted a VHF section, so here it is! Use of both low and high power for any portion of the contest will disallow use of the low power multiplier. The no ARRL Section and Country multiplier applies to the VHF section of the contest only.

A marvelous letter came from Ann, W1UPG, on their trip of last summer. Didn't have room in my last column, so will try to highlight it now. Wish there were room for every word as it was so interesting. Her son is at the Univ. of Idaho, studying for a Master's degree in Forestry and this gave them the "push" for a very interesting trip. "My OM, W1UPF, and I have always wanted to see the West, but never thought we'd really make the trip - thought it was only a 'dream'. We probably wouldn't have gone except for the fact that our son, Richard, W1UPE, went out to the University of Idaho, in Moscow, Idaho, on a Fellowship to study for his Master's degree in Forestry. He and his wife, Carolyn, whom he met and married when they were both students at the U. of Mass., have been in Idaho since 1963 and their first child was born out there last September. The desire to see our first and only grandson gave us that "push" we really needed to settle down and plan our trip and save up some money for it.

After saving for nearly a year, we finally got our suitcases packed, gassed up the car and packed all our camping equipment, figuring to camp out in the wide open spaces and thereby save the costs of motels, etc. However, the weather made us change our minds as it proved to be damp and cold the end of May, so we didn't camp at all. We made out fine staying at motels, though, and it sure was a lot less work for the OM! We installed our 6 mtr gear in the car, complete with Halo antenna and the Hill-topper (for Rocky Mountain DX!). We left Hampden at 9 AM on May 28th - a beautiful bright windy day, drove all day and into the early evening, and spent the first night of our trip in Ontario as we wanted to take that route around the Great Lakes. We by-passed Chicago, which isn't easy, and made good time the first few days - even tho we had an unknown leak in our gas tank and only discovered it by accident; it could have been worse! I got a big thrill out of crossing the mighty Mississippi, even though the river was not very wide where we crossed into McGregor, Iowa.

The OM and I really got a big laugh out of an incident that happened in a little village called Postville, Ill. We'd stopped for a picnic lunch at a small park where two old timers happened by and asked us if we had a "new-fangled air conditioner" in our car! That halo brought many interesting and amusing comments all thru the West. I guess many of the people had not heard of ham radio, much less a mobile rig and the halo. Several asked if we had TV in the car. In Ontario, a policeman, sitting next to us at a lunch counter, asked if we had a 2 way radio in the car and wanted to see it. He

inspected the halo carefully and shook his head and marvelled at the U.S. amateurs.

On May 31st, my birthday, we toured Mitchell, S.D. and saw the famous Corn Palace there. Also had a picnic lunch on the bank of the Missouri River and that really thrilled me. It was hard to believe that I was actually seeing the Missouri. After traveling thru Southern S.D., with its mile after mile of flat grain fields stretching from horizon to horizon, we enjoyed seeing the Badlands, a fantastic land erosion monument which has to be seen to be believed. We went on into the Black Hills and saw Mt. Rushmore and beautiful Custer State Park, complete with its buffalo, and on into Wyoming where we gaped at the oil wells, the beautiful sagebrush, the rolling hills, peaks, the cattle and the famed green grass of Wyoming. We had another picnic supper near the Little Big Horn River, where the engineer of a Diesel train honked hello at us to let us know that there were still white men and no injuns around that neck of the woods. A visit to the site of Custer's battlefield and seeing the hillside near the Little Big Horn River proved one of the most interesting and gratifying points of our trip. We have both always loved history and this was history in retrospect. We drove on and on, into Billings, Montana, the northernmost point of our trip in the midwest, and then took the road thru the Rockies over the highest peak, Beartooth Pass. This took 10 years off my life as I hate heights, but we went up, almost 12,000 feet, curve after curve, on a road that was under repair, with sharp loose rocks, and no guardrails. The top of this was snow covered with piles of snow higher than our car. But I was the only one who was scared, I guess...we saw several skiers there, dressed in Bermuda shorts and sweaters - truly Springtime IM The Rockies - if you like snow!!

From the Pass we entered Yellowstone Park which was very beautiful, saw Old Faithful perform on schedule, saw bears, elk, moose etc., and drove on along many beautiful wooded roads till we reached the beginning of the Grand Teton Mts. This drive proved to be very pleasant and the scenery was breath taking. Driving thru Jackson Hole was wonderful, with its beautiful mountains, sagebrush, cattle and grazing lands, etc. We stayed overnight at Montpelier, Idaho, and next morning went a short way into Utah where a sign greeted us - "Road Patrolled by Aircraft". I have never worked Utah, need it for WAS, so I wanted to at least set foot into this hard-to-work state to see if it really exists!! It does and it's big and very bare near Bear Lake and I don't wonder any longer that I can't work it.

I don't believe there can be many hams in that state! But I can die happy - at least I've BEEN there! 
