

CONTINUOUS MEMBERSHIP CERTIFICATE POLICY

There has been considerable question in the past couple of years regarding eligibility for this certificate and the subject of paying up back dues to retain continuous membership. To clarify this, I would like to quote a policy statement which appeared in the March/April 1959 issue of Harmonics - page 4. This policy was decided upon after much deliberation and consultation with past presidents and officers of YLRL.

"RE CONTINUOUS MEMBERSHIP CERTIFICATE: Future awards of the certificate will be based on the membership record of the Secretary and/or Treasurer of YLRL as of June 30, 1959. No payment for dues for previous years will be accepted after that date"

During the infancy of YLRL, some of our records were incomplete. When the Continuous Membership Certificate was announced, the Executive Board recognized that long standing members should not be penalized for lapses of membership due to incomplete records or conditions existing during the war which were beyond the individual's control. The Exec. Board, therefore, permitted payment of past dues in order that all members' records would be complete. Anyone interested has now had sufficient time to correct the records and future awards will be based on continuity from the records as of June 30, 1959"

This statement leaves no room for doubt. It has come to our attention that since this statement was issued, some members have been allowed to pay back dues in order to gain the continuous membership certificate. This should not be permitted in the future. Our standards have always been high, and our certificates are not "for sale". This policy is being reaffirmed as of December 1, 1965. Back dues are accepted for the current year only.

There is always the possibility that records may be lost. Any YL who has a legitimate claim for dues paid, i.e. a cancelled check, or has such extenuating circumstances as severe illness, or moving, affording the reason for her delayed dues, may appeal. If she simply forgot, this is unfortunate.

REMINDERS

1. QSL cannot be honored if the:
 - a. call letters of both stations are not on the card.
 - b. call letters are incorrect.
 - c. QSL has been altered in any way by the applicant.
 - d. YL QSL has been used before, regardless of location or change of call.
 - e. QSL does not carry the usual complete information considered necessary to confirm a contact.
2. Keep duplicate lists of each application. Checking with these is the only sure way of detecting duplications when applying for stickers.
3. Silver stickers will be awarded provided only that the holder of the certificates, in moving more than 25 miles, retains the same call letters that appear on the original certificate.
4. The list accompanying the application must include:
 - a. the full name of the operator, alphabetically arranged with last name first.
 - b. the call letters.
 - c. the date of each contact.
5. QSLs must be mailed via 1st class mail, and sufficient postage must be sent to finance their return this way.
6. Please know what is required for a YLCC Certificate before applying. Rules are available upon request from the custodian. For your convenience, they are being included in this issue.

YL Century Certificate Rules

Custodian: Onie Woodward, W1ZEN 14 Emmett Street, Marlboro, Massachusetts 01752

1. Two way communication must be established on authorized amateur bands with stations, mobile or fixed, operated by 100 different licensed women amateurs. Any and all amateur bands may be used.
2. All contacts must be made from the same locations. Within a given community, one location may be defined as from places no two of which are more than 25 miles apart.
3. Contacts may be made over any period of years, provided only that all contacts are made from the same location.
4. Contacts with YLs anywhere in the world are recognized, provided only that confirmations clearly indicate the stations were operated by duly licensed women amateur radio operators.
5. 100 QSL cards, or other written communications, from the stations worked, confirming the necessary two way contacts, accompanied by a list of claimed contacts, including the full name of the operator, alphabetically arranged (last name first), the call letters, and the date of each contact, must be submitted by the applicant directly to the YLCC Custodian. Sufficient postage must be sent

with the confirmations to finance their return by first class mail. The YLRL will not be responsible for any loss or damage to same.

6. Endorsements: Confirmation of contact, accompanied by alphabetical list, as described above, from stations operated by additional YLs may be submitted for credit each time 50 additional confirmations are available. Endorsements will be made to the original certification as application is approved. Gold stickers will be awarded to applicants who have worked their additional contacts from the same location (or within 25 mile radius). Silver stickers will be awarded provided only that the holder of the certificate, in moving, retains the same call letters that appear on the original certificate

7. Decisions of the YLCC custodian regarding interpretations of these rules as here stated, or later amended, shall be final. All inquiries regarding cards, applications, or the certificate should be addressed to her.

Later her call was selected and used as the state call for CD in RACES.

Having never fully recovered from a ruptured disc operation in 1957, Katherine spends these days with more passive pursuits such as knitting, playing the organ, watching TV and thoroughly enjoying being a proud Grandma. Perhaps the advent of SSB has contributed as much as anything to her absence of late from the bands. It admittedly takes a bit of "getting used to", but those of us who remember her friendly and familiar voice are looking forward to the day that she reappears.

Among her awards are YLCC 1000, winning the YLAP and YLOM contests, along with others less difficult to obtain than the above.

We of YLRL are very grateful to you, Katherine, and hope that the day is not too far off when we will once again hear the warm friendly voice of the "Southern Gold Digger".

Happy Holidays

INTERESTING PEOPLE

In a small town of Clatskanie, Oregon, some years ago, a young druggist and his wife proudly welcomes a beautiful little daughter, whom they called Elizabeth. We have come to know her as Beth, W7NJS. Beth became a fine helper to the four younger children who joined the family, and she grew up in the ordinary sort of way - well liked and always making superior grades in school.

At the age of 14, Beth had a severe illness - encephylitis lethargica. Its consequent optic atrophy and impaired vision changed her way of life considerably. In one way of thinking, this was a great tragedy to have happen to an yone, and especially at such an early age with her education yet incomplete. In Beth's case, how ever, it was not allowed to be a tragedy, but rather a challenge; something to overcome and surmount. This she did, completing a full education, and living a near normal life, being loved and admired by thousands throughout the world.

Beth had expected to teach, before her illness, so after recovering as much as possible (left with a vision of less than 20/200), she spent a year at the Washington School for the Blind in Vancouver, where, in this short time, she acquired her high school diploma. Four years at the U. of Oregon brought her a teaching certificate for high school; three terms at Oregon Normal School an elementary teaching certificate. She used Braille for a few courses, but practically all of her assignments were read to her. She got a B.A. from the U. of Oregon, in English Literature, and a M.A. in Psychology. Beth was one of the Senior Six elected to Phi Beta Kappa, and also became a member of Pi Sigma (Latin); Samara (Botany); and Pi Lambda Theta (Education). Because of her own illness and with very little useful vision left her, Beth went into the teaching of the blind and partially sighted. In Salem, Oregon, she taught for 3 years for the blind; then a 6 week summer session and a school year at N.Y.I.E.B. in New York City. She took graduate courses for the blind at Teacher's College evenings and Saturdays; taught for 8 years at the School for the Blind in Vancouver. There was more elementary teaching than high school teaching during these 12 years.

"Unusual" is perhaps the best word to describe the circumstances under which Beth lived and worked in 1949, when she received her first ham license. She had married Frank McKay, W7HJI, a man who had done timber cruising in Eastern Oregon, and in his travels, had learned of the need of an elementary teacher in John Day County. Beth's teaching had been with non-sighted children, and even with 12 years of experience behind her, she found conditions very different in both classroom and living. She and Frank decided to give this new experience a try, and they remained there for four very successful years.

The people of this area derived their living from timber and cattle; the roads were poor; and the schoolhouse was built to accomodate 30 children. There was a 2 room teacherage, 12' X 18', with a school barn available. Seven students got to school astride a horse. There was no running water on the school grounds; rather water had to be carried from a spring more than a thousand feet distant in hilly country. The school had to be brought up to standard requirements, and Beth got her orders in to a school supply company with state-adoption textbooks on hand, to meet the Salem inspection visit.

By the second year, some things were modern, with water piped into the grounds, but not into any buildings. There was no public power, and only partial telephone service. It was a "farmer's" line, with long distance connections possible only when two small grocery stores were both open - and at that, it was hard to hear if you were fortunate enough to get the connection established.

There was a once weekly trip to the grocery store, but fresh vegetables, eggs, milk and fresh meats were not available. Mail service, an important item, was available at this store, along with other farming necessities. Often the road required a 4-wheel Jeep and in real bad weather, the horse was the only way to make the ten mile trip.

Only through Frank's help was Beth able to carry on in this situation. She could neither read ordinary print or handwriting, and could not visually recognize the children except by their clothing



or build. Thus each day, Frank read the assignments for the following day for all 5 grades in which there were pupils. He went over and corrected all papers handed in, and dictated to Beth the lists of spelling words, which her brilliance allowed her to remember, for the following day.

These two devoted people not only carried their teaching along most successfully, but they made life much more interesting for both the children and the neighborhood than any other couple with full facilities might have done. They furnished the students with arts and crafts, bought a power plant of their own, and Frank wired the school building and teacherage. It was a typically isolated farm area, with chores filling the days completely, but leaving pleasant evenings to be filled by movies, programs presented by the students, and visiting. A ham station was set up in the school-house, with the parents and children treated to talking on the air. Skeds were set up with Bea, W7HHH, and Eldred, W7JIB, both of Bend, Oregon, and the isolated little area seemed just a little less isolated.

After 4 years here, Beth and Frank went to another one room, one teacher school in extreme south east Oregon. All conditions here were quite modern compared to their previous location. There was a postman, public power, less rainfall and good roads, fresh meats, and a full line of groceries. It was alfalfa country with fat cattle and some sheep. Beth learned to cook many Basque dishes needing mutton. The heating was possible with oil instead of burning pine wood that had to be chopped.

Beth first became interested in ham radio during 1939 and 1940. She had known Bob Sherman, a fellow student at Vancouver, who later became W7EEA. He got her started with code and theory, but very little material was available in Braille. She tried the FCC exam in June 1941, but getting the 65 consecutive characters down on paper was not possible. She expected to retake the exam in ninety days, but teaching and keeping house proved a full time job. Then the war intervened and everyone was off the air. However, she kept up her practice, got a conditional in 1949, then passed her Advanced license in 1951, and oh how happy she was. It was Carl Austin, W7GNJ, who worked many hours with Beth so that she could copy code in the FCC office. (Carl, the OM of Bea, W7HHH, is now a Silent Key) Beth was still teaching, but on a weekend trip, they went into Idaho and bought a transmitter from another ham.

Then sadness and the unexpected happened - Frank was suddenly taken away by a heart attack. There was no history of heart trouble, and he'd even had a checkup that very morning! A substitute teacher finished up the few remaining weeks of the term and Beth has not taught school since.

Beth put her mind to overcoming her loss, and returned to her family and the Portland area. Her Mother lived near, and Beth kept busy. Reading from her "talking books" kept her busy and it kept her learning more each day. After a number of years, she became acquainted with another ham. The friendship grew and eventually led to marriage. The ham was, of course, Bill Taylor, W7PPG, known and respected by so many of us. They lived in Manzanita, on the coast, and Beth became real active in YLRL, being 7th D/C during 1955-56, President in 1958 and has since served on the Budget and Finance and the President's Advisory Committees. Ham conventions and gatherings, with the chance to meet those she has learned to know on the air, is a special pleasure. She has attended many state OARA Conventions, the 1951 and 1962 ARRL Nationals, all of the California Funfests and the 1964 YLRL International in Columbus. Nets are an enjoyment, and she's been checking into the Honeybee Net for 14 years. She spent a lot of time on 75 meters for years, and has recently found 20 meter SSB to her pleasure, making use of a 70' tower and triband beam. Bill sold his plumbing business and built a lovely new home in Milwaukie, Oregon. He installed Beth's equipment, and has his own station, too. They have now been married 11 years. Bill identifies himself as W7 "Poor Plumber Guy" but I'm sure Beth thinks of him as we do - "Pretty Precious Guy". Without his great help and his reading reams of letters to her, Beth feels her YLRL activity would be impossible. They love their new home, are free to go on trips, Beth can attend Portland Roses meetings, ham a lot, do her housework, and take good care of Bill. YLRL and its progress remains one of her closets interests. She feels her days are pleasantly filled, and we consider her a great and devoted member of YLRL. How could anyone have experienced a more fruitful life. We love and admire Beth for her constant "helping hand" in our organization. I'm sure that all who know her recognize her as an outstanding person, a woman of great faith, and one who has accomplished goals which seem impossible. Hopefully the story of her life will prove an incentive to those who may be discouraged with vision difficulties, or prove an inspiration to those interested in ham radio.

We wish these two fine people the very best that life has to offer, and we thank them sincerely for allowing this article to be written.
