Spring has come, the Sprints are here How many QSOs,


will I make this year?

Ruth, KM4LAO, shares some about her National Parks on the Air Experiences last year:

I have only been a ham radio operator for a year and a half, but it's safe to say that National Parks on the Air (NPOTA) has been one of the most influential events in my life. Visiting National Parks has been one of my hobbies for several years now, so being able to visit them over the radio has deepened my appreciation for these rich national treasures. National Parks on the Air was special to me because of the skills I was able to learn both as a chaser and as an activator, and because of my friends I was able to make on the air and in person throughout the event.

I only had a Technician class license when I first heard about NPOTA, in the fall of 2015. I was studying for my general class license and did not have an HF rig, so I wondered if I would be able to participate in the event. But shortly thereafter, I acquired an HF rig and then passed my General exam the first week of January 2016. I spent the first couple weeks of January getting used to my radio and just getting on the air and on February 1st, I finally made the plunge and contacted my first NPOTA unit as a chaser.

Chasing parks was the first aspect of the event that I fell in love with. As a new HF operator, I loved to get on the air, work park units in fascinating places, and learn good HF operating procedures from the activators. It was also a very good learning experience about propagation and I soon learned what bands and modes I had a chance of working specific operators on at specific times of the day. Shortly after I began chasing parks, I discovered the NPOTA Facebook Page, and although I do not have Facebook, I could see the page since it was public. I began to feel like I knew many of these activators as I worked them when they activated and followed their adventures on and off the air through Facebook.

I did as much chasing of National Park units as I could throughout spring of 2016. I was a senior in high school, but managed to work 100 park units by the end of March on SSB and CW using 100 watts and a G5RV antenna. I worked a number of units that I have visited in person, including Yosemite, Yellowstone, Zion National Park, Mount Rushmore, Shenandoah National Park, the Blue Ridge Parkway, Cape Hatteras National Seashore, and Cape Canaveral National Seashore, but I have worked so many more park units that I have never seen and now know about because of National Parks on the Air. Chasing parks wasn't an event I only did under my own call, however. When I was on Saba for the 2016 Dave Kalter Memorial Youth DX Adventure, I took great pride in chasing parks when I had some free time and giving activators a QSO and an unexpected DXCC entity.

By the time I left for college in the fall, I had worked over 200 park units under my callsign. Throughout my fall semester, I kept an eye on NPOTA and enjoyed hearing about my mom working parks herself. When I came home for Christmas break, we teamed up to chase parks together. I was amazed the number of activators that were on the air the final weeks of the event and I was able to work over 50 new park units to finish the year with 267

park units worked.

However, the most adventuresome part of National Parks on the Air was actually getting to activate parks! At the beginning of the year, I didn't know how many units I would be able to activate since I don't have my own mobile equipment. I began to ask people if they were going to activate and if I come along. My very first NPOTA activation with Chuck, KK4TKJ, and Donna, KM4FMW, on Kennesaw Mountain, and I loved every minute of it. The three of us ended up doing a number of activations together throughout the year using their mobile equipment. I soon found out, though, that the generosity of ham radio operators extends beyond this local club.


My second activation occurred during the Dayton Hamvention when John KD8MQ set up stations at the Dayton Aviation Heritage National Historic Site in order for attendees to be able to activate the park. My mom Sharon, KM4TVU, and I met and activated with several different operators for subsequent activations, including Stuart, KB1HQS, at Colonial National Historic Site in Virginia; Bill, AB4BJ, and Will, AA4WJ, at Chickamauga and Chattanooga National Military

Park in Georgia; and Emily, KB3VVE, at three parks in Maryland. Emily, my mom, and I had quite the adventuresome day as we drove around Maryland to Piscataway Park and Greenbelt Park, and also hiked downtown DC in order to work each other on HTs at as many monuments as we could.

My mom obtained her General license in July and we were soon ready to activate a park on our own. Dave, W4DTR, offered to lend us his equipment so my parents and I could activate parks on our way to my college, Kettering University in Michigan. Those days together activating on our drive up were special times together before my life changed and college began.

When my first term of college was completed and Christmas break commenced, my mom picked me up from school and we embarked on a drive home to activate even more parks, including Mammoth Cave National Park for our first activation of an official National Park! On our two trips we completed activations at Big South Fork National River and Recreation Area, Dayton Aviation Heritage National Historic Site, Fallen Timbers Battlefield and Fort Miamis National Historic Site on the way up, and River Raisin National Battlefield, Abraham Lincoln Birthplace National Historic Site, and Mammoth Cave National Park on the way home. Once we returned home, we proceeded to meet with Dave, W4DTR, for four activations in the final week of NPOTA.

We activated Kennesaw Mountain National Battlefield Park once, a fitting activation since that was my first activation of the year, and the Chattahoochee River and Recreation Area three times. Our final activation at the Chattahoochee River and Recreation Area on the last day of the 2016 allowed me to complete 20 activations.

I absolutely loved every unique activation, from activations with friends, to club activations with GARS, and then activations with my mom on our own. No activation I completed was the same as the one before it. There certainly were adventuresome moments, including blowing out a fuse in the car after our radio battery died and I still needed a few more QSOs for a valid activation, dealing with antennas that wouldn't tune, and fixing a faulty window that broke partially from the Michigan cold. However, it was well worth the effort because of the fun we had and the things we learned. We almost always had people looking for us on the air, since friends would post our location on the NPOTA Facebook page and other spotting networks, and I loved to work the familiar callsigns of chasers who did their best to work us whenever we was activating.

A special side effect of activating parks was the thrill of chasing other park units and completing park to park QSOs. It never failed to cheer another activator when they heard a park was chasing them! Through our experiences chasing and activating our national treasures, the National Parks, the NPOTA community of ham radio operators became like a close knit family.

As you can see, National Parks on the Air was an event that allowed me to learn so many new ham radio skills and provided special adventures through this wonderful hobby. The number of parks I chased and activated would not have happened without the support of this community and I miss hearing park activations on the air every day. National Parks on the Air was a spectacular event and will hold a very special place in my heart forever.

Thank you so much Ruth, KM4LAO, for sharing your NPOTA experience with us! Such an encouragement for all.

Onboard fire watch was on alert as the unrelenting ladies had the hefty 117 foot antennas above the water line


glowing and smoking.

- 6. All inquiries should be addresses to the appropriate custodian.
- 7. Decisions of the custodians regarding interpretations of the rules as here stated or later amended shall be final.
- 8. Certificate custodians and their addresses are listed in each issue of YL Harmonics.



"CQ Wisconsin QSO Party – CQ Wisconsin QSO Party – KD9CSI mobile!" (Thank heaven for voice keyers!)

I was looking forward this 2017's Wisconsin QSO party, hoping to beat my score from last year and at least end up in the top half of the pack. A random post of mine on Facebook prompted an invitation to operate 40m mobile with some of my Fox Cities pals – well, it was an offer I couldn't refuse!

I had a radio to put into service – my trusty ICOM735 – my first radio, purchased from my eye doctor when he was breaking up his station to have more time to pursue his other hobby – building miniature steam engines. I was particular excited to use the rig, since he passed away a few days ago, and it would have been sort of a tribute journey of his radio equipment.

But alas, it was not meant to be. We had lots of RF when we were testing the rigs – I was interfering with the 20m station, he was interfering with me, and the lights in the motor home kept flashing whenever I keyed

up! After numerous swap-outs of antennas, adding a ground plane, adding band pass filters, etc. it was decided that my radio was going to have to stay home. L However, I was lucky to be able to use an IC-7100. I got it twisted up a little bit here and there, but since EVERYONE was using the same radios, the other ops were able to get me back on track. The onboard voice keyer was a real plus so all I had in front of me was my laptop and the control head.

I had no idea how BUMPY the motor home would be! We had all equipment either ratchet-strapped or velcroed down. There were times when I had to really struggle to see what call-sign I had typed, or try to count how many Qs I had made in a particular county. A few times we sat just before a county line to try to hit

the "magic number" of 12 so we could collect 500 bonus points. We had hoped to hit 17 counties, but ended up with 13.

I operated 40m from 1:00 p.m. until about 6:30 p.m. when I switched to 80m, and the 20m op switched to 40. The number of contacts really fell off after that. Band conditions just weren't great, and we had lots of engine noise, which didn't help. While still on 40m I had two fine gentlemen from KY and MO (a personal friend!) who were following me from county to county. It was kind of like having groupies! One other out-of-state op wouldn't work me a 2nd time, even though I was in another county then the previous Q. He wouldn't have gotten extra points, but I would have.

It was interesting for 5 people to be working in such close quarters, while actually having very little contact. We had a driver who *drove*, and a navigator who helped with the maps and keep us informed of the

county we were in. She had high hopes to network our laptops so she could keep track of our progress, but again, that was another technical difficulty that we just never overcame. I ran 40m (then 80), op #2 worked 20 (then 40) and op #3 worked 2m/440. I thought #3 would put us all to shame, just making Qs with hams who routinely have their radios set to scan the 2m frequencies, but he struggled as much as we did. We all used N3FJP for our logging software.

What did I do when I got home? I started jotting down notes of items that I either forgot, or wanted to be sure to add to my list for next time. A little desk lamp would have made life easier to see the keyboard later in the day. A heavier blanket would have helped keep the chills away, especially when the door was open while the guys tweaked the antennas (temps were in the 20s and it was breezy). I may invest in my own set of Heil Pro7 headphones - I was able to keep them on through the WHOLE 7 hour event – unlike my ProSet Elite that absolutely kills my ears after about an hour. I was using a push-to-talk handswitch – another op used a footswitch, which seemed like it might be a little handier. At home I use VOX with my boom headset, but that wouldn't have worked since we had so much road noise in the motor home. At home, it would be nice to be able to clear my throat, or grab a drink or a bite of something w/o having to switch the VOX on/off.

As the clock struck 8:00 p.m., we set down our headsets, and the conversations began with what we would do different next year! I think we switched the antennas around a half dozen times between the 2 days and they still came up with different variations that could help us in the future. (sidenote: within 24 hours I had an email in my mailbox with plans to use a hitch-mounted ground plane, work on a new "invention" to allow switch bands easily using one coil, use a shorty double bazooka for 40m and change the mounting configuration to allow for NVIS).

One thing that I would change is to stop for hot food. We had an ample supply of sub sandwiches and cookies plus our own stash of snacks and beverages, but a quick buzz through the drive-up for a burger and fries about 5:30 would have been quite satisfying. And I'd like to be at least a little familiar with the radio I'm operating. That wasn't really possible due to the last minute swap-out (I made sure I got a good night's sleep), but I would have liked to have been able to change the voice keyer messages and understand the displays a little better, so that when I "hit something by mistake" I could at least undo what I did. I was happy to hear that changing ops wasn't part of the plan, and I have been invited back for next year. If my YL voice is part of the reason that they would welcome me back, well, I am fine with that. Plus I'm enrolled in this April/May CWops class, so the potential for me to earn double the point value for my Qs doesn't hurt!

So, did I have fun? Yes! Will I do it again? You betcha! (And am I glad I pre-arranged a vacation day for the day after? Oh yeah!)

Sounds like you had a blast, Anne! Congratulations on the event! -Ed.

I went to the 285 TechConnect forum again this year. The group which holds the forum is interested in the technical aspects of amateur radio. This is a very informative day of about five or six presentations on topics of interest to the ham community, most but not all with some technical bend. This year, there were about 75 attendees, only four of whom were female.

James Schatzman, ACØXU, presented on RF interference. He spoke about RF sources, including lights and solar panels. Just so you know, ultraviolet lights are about the worst offender, and LED lights are clean, in the speaker's experience.

Shel Radin, KFØUR, presented on contesting. The speaker noted that, like emergency communications, there is a defined, succinct exchange, and that participating with a group promotes practice in working in a noisy, chaotic environment. He also noted that the signal strength report is always 599 or 59; it is not so much of a signal report, but more of a place marker. Additionally there was information on logging software.

Larry Weinstein, KØNA, gave one of the more technical presentations, about HF propagation and layers in the ionosphere. The presenter explained why the various layers are good at different times of day. He also described a program on-line which is rather fun to play with called the Voice of America Circuit Analysis Program, for "HF Propagation Prediction and Ionospheric Communications Analysis." In one part, you can move a pointer to your point of origin and another to your desired contact point, and it will tell you probability of reaching that site. You can further fine tune your results by entering the kind of antenna you are using and your receiving party is using and other information. It tells me, for example, that I have virtually no chance of getting Germany on any frequency right now, given my operating parameters; I would do much better at 5 in the morning. Oh, well. Other parts give other information. The website is **www.voacap.com**.

Jim Moravec, NØCOT, presented on the "International Association for Astronomical Studies," a group for youth and hands-on science/tech discovery, and on including technical/science/math programs in schools. Jim has a long history of working with youth, including with the planetarium program at the Museum of Nature and Science in Denver.

As you can see, the topics have wide interest. So how come I feel so alone there? Why are there not more YLs attending? What must we do to encourage more of us to be in places like this, where "little lady" is most welcome, if a little condescendingly. At some point, I was wondering if the YLRL hadn't run its course, as women are involved in so many aspects of the world. This makes me think not.

DX Column


Dear YL friend,
