




The NE0DB jet pictured above is my QSL card designed by Ginny, NV5F, and printed by Amanda, K1DDN.





Other ARRL awards I have earned are WAS on 9 HF bands, DXCC (100 countries/entities), and additionally, DXCC on 15, 20, 30, 40 meters. I am closing in on DXCC on 10 and 80. Those are more challenging than the other bands since their opening to DX is more sporadic and seasonal. I'll get there in 2022.



A lot more operators are running 100 watts or less that sound just as strong as someone with an Ameritron. 3. Weather will forever remain the number one topic on SSB. hihi All in all, I had the chance to say hello and talk with about 250 people and truly enjoyable conversations at that.

With the holidays over, it's time to work on 2022. Do any of you make amateur radio New Year's resolutions? 
District KL and KH


District 3 and District 5

Just to refresh your memories, the following excerpts explain the origin of these positions and helps to clarify why those before me and now myself make such an effort to follow proper procedures.

<u>YLRL Procedure Policy</u> – "The organizational divisions of the YLRL shall include one District from each of the ten contiguous United States amateur call sign areas, KH6, KL7, VE, and one District to include all other DX."

<u>YLRL By-Laws</u> state that "Each District Chairwoman, the Youth Chairwoman and Receiving Treasurer DX shall be responsible for gathering news for <u>YL Harmonics</u> and forwarding same to the Editor at appropriate intervals. She shall assist the Vice-President in organizing contests, traffic schedules, nets, and all League activities. She shall serve as a member of the Board of Directors." ... Further, the By-Laws state "She (the President) shall make all appointments whenever vacancies occur in offices."

Constitution - ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS

Section 1 Officers of the Corporation, shall consist of the following: President, Vice-President, Secretary, Receiving Treasurers, and Disbursing Treasurer.

Section 2 At the time of election of officers, there shall be elected one District Chairwoman from each of the YLRL Districts.

Section 3 Only full, family, or life members who have been members in good standing for at least two consecutive years immediately prior to taking office shall be eligible to hold office as defined in Sec. 1 of this Article, or one year in the case of District Chairwomen Our founders built the YLRL principles from its Constitution and By-Laws which we still follow today. From the principles those 12 ladies envisioned in 1939, together we will keep their vision alive. **33 Rita**

AF1R and NV1Y Operation at the 2021 ARRL Phone Sweepstakes Year 4 at The Shearer Farm B&B Ver Dec 26d 2021

I own a tiny piece of property in a suburban neighborhood, too small to install competitive antennas. For the last three years, for the ARRL Phone Sweepstakes, I've done a solo portable operation from the Shearer Farm B&B in Vermont, where I've had acres of cow fields available for erecting antennas. This was my fourth year and I tried something different. This year I did the contest with my long-time friend, John, NV1Y, from Williston, Vermont. This put us in the highly competitive, Multi-Op, Single Transmitter class. We knew the competition in this class was tough: we would be competing against home stations with towers and teams of 3 to 6 operators. It would only be the two of us and our entire station: radios, antennas, masts, coax and computers, had to fit in our two cars and be able to be erected in (and taken down) in just a couple of hours.

I have enjoyed operating from the Shearer Farm B&B. It's on a farm, with plenty of room to erect antennas. It's on top of a south facing hill. It's located in "rare" Vermont. I can do ham radio immersion for the weekend as I'm away from home and away from household distractions. And the hosts welcome me back every year and treat me as a family member!

I've known John, NV1Y, for over 30 years, but we have never contested together. For John, the chance to get away, use acres of fields to erect antennas and immediately see how well they work was an experience he wanted to try.

From my past experience, I knew we needed better antennas for the high bands. I used a Off-Center-Fed (OCF) antenna for the last two years. On 80 and 40 it is an equal antenna to the majority of the competitors, but on 20-15-10 we would be competing with stations with beams on a tower. Last year it was tough to wade through 20M and get recognized by any of the running stations. To fix that problem, this year we needed better antennas for 20 and 15. But, the antennas & supports needed to fit in our cars. We set up three antennas:

- The 130 foot wire OCF antenna, the same antenna I used for the last three years, good for 80M to 10M
- A 20M rotatable dipole, which John built out of some old aluminum tubing.
- A 15M half-square antenna which I built in 15 minutes from some scrap wire.

The B&B is on the top of a south facing hill. This is great for RF. But this also means strong winds blow over the property. I got lucky with the weather on Friday morning before the contest when I erected the 30 foot mast for the OCF antenna. The winds were calm and the temperature was 40 degrees. However, the weather changed in the afternoon. When John arrived with his wife, Karen (also a ham) I could see the sky turning dark. A cold wind started blowing. As soon as we took the rotatable dipole and mast out of their car, a snow squall arrived at the B&B. Within 10 minutes snow coated everything in the cow field where we were erecting the antenna and we struggled to get the 25 foot high antenna up in the wind gusts. As soon as the antenna was erected and tied off, the snow stopped and the winds calmed.

The next morning, Saturday, the weather cooperated and made it easy to put up the 15M half square antenna. It was suspended from three 14 foot high portable masts.

In past SS contests I have not had much luck in the first 30 minutes. All of the running stations have monster pile ups which are tough to crack with just 100 watts. We had the same struggle this year. We started on 15M, where we thought we could pick up some of the western states. We started hunting and pouncing on 15M but with no beam on 15M we were buried under the other contestants. Despite our numerous calls, we only made 2 contacts in the first 30 minutes. It was a discouraging start. This was the

first time the two of us had competed together and we were also struggling ourselves to figure out how to do the separate logging and operating roles. But, at the 30 minute mark into the contest, it was just a like a switch was flipped. All of a sudden we were getting recognized by the running stations. In the next 45 minutes we got every station we called on 15 meters and got the tough west coast states of Colorado, Utah, Wyoming, New Mexico, and the Canadian province Saskatchewan. Unfortunately, the two Hawaii stations we heard at the beginning of the contest disappeared before we could get them. We would need to get Hawaii later.

We had much better luck on 40M and for the next 30 minutes we went up and down the band averaging one contact every 2 minutes, earning 13 additional multipliers. Our rate slowed a bit after the first 30 minutes on 40, and after 35 contacts we took a break for dinner at 6:00 P.M.

After dinner we were raring to get back to the radio. We stayed on 40 for another 2 hours and switched to 80. We worked the Midwest and upper Atlantic states. We got our first (very rare) Atlantic Canada, VY2TT, in Prince Edward Island.

Contact 100 came at 11:00 P.M., and we continued to make contacts every 1 to 4 minutes.

At 2:45 A.M. I found a quiet location on 80 and tried calling CQ. To my surprise, after 2 calls, I got a run going. I worked 17 stations in 20 minutes. The peak rate of 1 contact per minute would end up being our best rate during the contest.

We made a quick jump back to 40, worked 3 stations there, saw little other activity, and jumped back to 80

After our 200th contact at 3:00 A.M. I went to bed so could I get some sleep and still get up at a decent time on Sunday. John stayed up to see if he could make more contacts. He got Hawaii on 40 at 4:18 A.M. and another 11 contacts before he gave up at 4:30 A.M.

Sunday morning, I got back on the radio at 10:30 A.M. and discovered 20 was hopping with activity. I rotated the 20M dipole to the southwest and made another 10 contacts over the next 30 minutes. I switched to 15 to see if the band was open, and got W5NQH, in West Texas. He was not actively participating in the contest and was looking for a rag chew, so I took a break for a few minutes to talk with him. During our conversation I realized he could provide a comparison between our 15M antennas. He told me the signal from the ½ square antenna was booming in but could barely hear me on the OCF antenna. I'm glad I made the ½ square antenna and put it up!

We worked our 300th OSO at 7:04 P.M. Sunday night.

We finished at 10:00 P.M. Sunday with 342 contacts and 51,300 points. We worked 75 of the 84 US and Canada sections.

We worked hard, had fun and most important, John and I survived the experience of contesting together. Our new 20M rotatable dipole and 15M half square antennas were an improvement over the OCF wire antenna on these two bands. We both are looking forward to next year when we will have even better antennas!

Rules for All YLRL Contests

- 1. Check to make certain you are sending logs to the CURRENT Vice-President.
- 2. Logs must be postmarked no later than 30 days after each contest ends.
- 3. Scoring:
- 4. Phone and CW contests will be scored separately. Separate logs must be submitted for each contest.
- 5. One point is earned for each different station worked on each band. The same station may be worked on different bands. In the YL-OM contest only, YLs count OMs and OMs count YLs.
- 6. Multiplier will be the ARRL sections and/or DX countries, whichever is appropriate. Canadian provinces are counted individually. Multipliers are used only once on all bands when figuring the score.
- 7. Contestants running 5W or less will be considered QRP and earn a power factor of 3. Contestants running 5W to 100W will be considered low power and earn a power factor of 1.5. Contestants running over 100W will be high power. If no transmitter power is listed on logs, no power factor will be given.

Total scored claimed is calculated by multiplying the points times the multiplier times the power factor.

Logs

- 1. All logs must show the operator's ARRL section, VE province, or country to qualify for awards. Where applicable, logs must state whether or not the operator is a member of YLRL. For each QSO, logs must also state the power output. If you have 200 or more QSOs, submit a separate log for each band and submit a "dupe" sheet.
- 2. Please type or print. If you print a log from a logging program or photocopy your log book, be sure they include all the required information.
- 3. Logs must be signed and show claimed score. No logs will be returned. Entries in log must also show time, band, date and transmitter power.

Exchange

Station worked, QSO number given and received, RS(T) given and received, and section/province/country.

Single operator and YL clubs/groups.
