PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As most of you know from the last issue of YLH, plans are well under way for our 50th Anniversary celebration to be held in Hawaii next June. Ruth, K1IIF, has done a tremendous job running things down for us. From the initial indication of interest from both U.S. and DX YL's, we should have a great turnout. Hope to see a lot of you there.

Over the summer your Board of Directors voted to make two changes in the Procedure Policy. It was unanimous that Policy #10 be changed so for questions within the purview of the Board, the President shall provide each member of the Board with a ballot and information concerning the question to be voted, this material to be provided by First Class mail. Ballots shall be returned to the President who shall send the Secretary a copy of the results. Secondly, the Board passed with only one dissenting vote that any blind OX member of YLRL may choose to receive tapes of YL Harmonics instead of printed copies. A printed copy of the Directory issue will be sent in lieu of tape.

There was a big turnout of YL's at the Portland ARRL convention. We were fortunate to have our booth right by the entry door. We were kept busy the whole time the exhibits were open. The big news is that we signed up 28 new members and gave out an additional 40-50 membership applications. I had been asked to speak at a session on women in amateur radio. Although my talk was somewhat historical in nature, I did tell of some of our present day activities. Judging from the audience reaction, one of our activities that impressed people the most was our sponsorship of DX members and that they in turn sponsored the U.S. YL in their organization. As I pointed out this activity fits right in with the purposes of amateur rado as speified by the FCC in Section 97: "continuation and extension of the amateur's unique ability to enhance international goodwill". FCC or not, I think all of us who have been involved as sponsors agree that it is a personally enriching experience.

A lot has been happening regarding convention plans. Ruth, K1IIF, just returned from Kauai where she stayed at the Coco Palms Resort while making various arrangements for our convention needs. I met with her on my way East. She was very pleasantly surprised by what she found and I left feeling very excited about everything. We are indeed in good hands. The facilities at the Coco Palms look and sound great! Besides the usual hotel amenities, there is an ice cream parlor and a bakery (serves goodies and coffee). Nearby is another restaurant and there are fast food places at a shopping center a couple of miles away. The beach by the Coco Palms looks delightful. There is also a golf course a couple of miles away. Etc., etc.

We plan to have the luau (final bash) at Smith's Tropical Paradise next door to Coco Palms. Ruth said it is the best luau she has had anywhere. Besides the usual imu ceremony with the roast pig, the buffet includes many salads, main dishes, fruits, etc. All the Mai Tais you want are included in the price and the program takes on an international flavor featuring the songs and dances of the various Pacific peoples who came to populate Hawaii. ALUMINUM SOLDER

You CAN solder aluminum! Do it this way. At the solder location on the aluminum, place a drop of motor oil. Next, take a sharp-pointed tool (a pocket knife works well) and thoroughly "scratch up" the surface. Do not wipe off the oil. Now take your soldering tool, heat the spot and apply a good rosin core solder (just like soldering copper.) You will find the solder will adhere completely - both physically and electrically. Works great for making connections to an aluminum chassis. Try it! You'll be surprised.

BT4YL "Beautiful YL" Jeanie, WA6UVF/7J1ACN/BT4YL

"Would you like to go on a YL-DX-PEDITION to Shanghai, China?" This is the question I was asked last August, 1987, while visiting my adoptee, Miyo, JR3MVF., in Osaka, Japan! Now this is where the advantage of having a ham as on OM is beneficial! My OM, Fred, N6BAE, said that I could go on this trip IF he could go along too, hi!. Of course, I said, "Yes"!

Our plans for operation were from station, BY4AA, Madame Chen, in Shanghai. We decided to operate during CQ Magazine's WPX SSB Contest in March, operating multi-op, single xmitter for 48 continuous hours. We had planned on working multi-xmitter, but after testing, decided interference of rig proximity made this impossible.

Our DX party from Osaka International Airport included Miyo, JR3MVF; her OM, Jiro, JA3UB; OM, Hide, JA4HCK; OM, Aki, JM1BDB; my OM, Fred, N6BAE and myself, WA6UVF. In Shanghai our hotel accommodations were at Hai Hong Hotel, which is not a "tourist" hotel, but a Chinese Hotel—far more interesting for us and only 5 minutes from our operating station.

Our excitement about the contest was quickly broken with the shocking news of many Japanese High School students killed and injured during a train accident in Shanghai. We were immediately handling Health & Welfare traffic with info to and from Shanghai Hospital and Osaka, Japan. Jiro, JA3UB, made periodic announcements, keeping the Japanese amateurs informed.

The CRSA (Chinese Radio Sports Assoc.) issued us a special call sign—BT4YL, "Beautiful YL", a one time call sign to be used only during this contest period. We had hand-carried a "Made in U.S.A." vertical antenna with us from California, in and out of three airports. We left it atop the CRSA building. With only one xmitter being used, we developed shifts of operating! You can imagine what wonderful 'pileups' we were working! Only experienced ears could pick out YL stations like VE7YL, KA6SOC, and K6KCI plus many JA YL's of YLRL and JLRS. "The YL station only, please" hi! In working over 3,000 stations, at times averaging 100 per hour, a familiar voice was always welcome! After the first day we realized that we could work stations more efficiently if Miyo worked the Japanese stations, I worked the European, U.S. and other English speaking stations and Chen worked the Chinese stations plus any of the above, hi! We decided that Chen was our #1 operator as her operating procedure was amazing.

At this point I would like to suggest a few hints or observations on contacting a DX station during a contest or massive pile-up: on contest, usually DX stations operate one frequency, not split frequency; please listen for awhile as DX stations announce their QTH and QSL information periodically; call the station using your suffix

only, you can imagine what hundreds of amateurs sound like giving the DX call and also their own full call—the DX station sometimes can only pick out a few letters at a time. Don't give up, as I worked many low power YL station!

Would I go on another YL DX-PEDITION?...YES, definitely! This one was very well organized, even to the point of having QSL cards already printed before our departure! My only suggestions might be to have a computer program to use for the scoring of the logs...lots of sharp pencils and large erasers while operating!!

Throughout the contest we had a wonderful opportunity to really become acquainted with the many Chinese operators from all parts of China who had come to observe us in action! Our thanks go to the CRSA, Madame Chen and Stationmaster, Mr Xuru for making our joint venture of Chinese, Japanese and American YL's operating together a real success!

HAMS 'N' WINGS Bill Kincheloe, K60QC, AMA #1467

At a recent fly-in hosted by the R/C Birds of Paradise (Paradise, CA), all non-flying and transmitter impound duties were undertaken by members of the Golden Empire Amateur Radio Society of Chico (GEARS). The event was held at the Paradise Airport, so air traffic control was important. A traffic control radio net was set up on the field. Amateur operators were stationed at the airport entrace, the parking area, the transmitter impounds, and the Contest Director's station. Continuous observation of full-scale activity was possible through many eyes distributed around the field. In addition, one of the hams brought a UNICOM receiver so he had continuous information concerning full-scale activity. The Contest Director and the flyers on the flight line were never caught by surprise by the arrival or departure of a full-scale plane.

The R/C Birds and GEARS established what is believed to be a first in modeler/ham cooperation. The transmitter impound was manned by sight-impaired hams! One of the R/C Birds members is proficient in Braille and made tags for transmitters and frequency pins. One of the blind hams brought his Braille writer machine. He kept a log of AMA number, name, channel number, and registration sequence number for each participant. One sighted ham was available to help participants in filling out various forms, and other activities at the impound area. The flyers, after learning how things had been set up, were most cooperative. The day went quite well.

PRIORITIES

There was a time when amateur radio clubs were fun. Groups met socially to brag about contacts made; exchanged experiences on the air; discussed technical problems; organized 'work parties' to erect and replace antennas and towers or to assist families in disposing of radio equipment left by Silent Keys. We also installed complete stations for handicapped or incapacitated hams. At club meetings we socialized; participated in hunting hidden transmitters; had picnics; planned for and had a ball in Field Day activities; helped each other solve sticky rig problems; argued over points and cheated while pitching horse shoes; worked on construction of club electronic gadgets; helped teach youngsters and others code and theory; helped them build or collect and set up their first ham stations; solved some TVI complaints; shared donuts, coffee, sandwiches and cider.

Things aren't the same today. Haven't we wandered into some areas from which we may want to extricate ourselves?

Today we are involved in activities that by no stretch of the imagination can be called Amateur Radio. Drills to increase proficiency are admirable and necessary, but our "drills" today often consist of furnishing non-ham organizations with free communications for their fund raising events. These are not very halpful in preparing us for handling formal messages of the type used in emergency traffic.

Because of our benevolent contribution to fund-raising affairs, we have reached a point where we sometimes can't generate the interest needed to mount a good Field Day outing. Field Day is a grand opportunity to enthuse and train young operators and to socialize and also operate our own stations for pleasure.

Hamfests have now become major fund raising affairs - highly organized and time consuming. Every year we meet with rapidly increasing costs for site rental, public utilities and other necessary expenses, with consequently shrinking bottom line figures resulting. Are our Hamfests becoming more profitable to others than to us? The shrinking net returns go to charitable causes.

Planning and producing a successful Hamfest takes a major part of the time any of us can afford to assign to ham radio. The load falls on the few in any club who are willing to accept responsibility for its success. Hamfests can easily become a burden and a detriment to Amateur Radio clubs. They really do not benefit Amateur Radio to a degree commensurate with the energy they extract.

Swapfests are fun, but today's Hamfest must get bigger every year to remain profitable. Some clubs have found it necessary to raise ticket prices to a point where it becomes a valid question of whether it is more satisfying to attend or go somewhere else with the family for a Sunday outing. In an effort to attract more patrons, clubs now

cater heavily to computer interested people. Though computers are used in our hobby, there is no reason for us to allow Amateur Radio Hamfests to be innundated or overshadowed by computers. Some hanfests even include Arts and Crafts and miscellaneous hucketers of items totally foreign to AMATEUR RADIO.

Each year hamfests absorb a great percentage of one of our most precious resources, our spare time. This asset we all have to ration carefully to live normal, balanced lives.

What kind of Amateur Radio hobby is this? The stated purpose in most Amateur Radio club constitutions is "...to promote Amateur Radio." Shouldn't we take a critical look at the predicament in which we have put ourselves and our hobby and carefully reconsider our priorities? As a young father said, handing his wife his infant son, "I think it's time for a change!"

I would like to add my two cents worth to the above article by $\mbox{W3SOG.}$ He has touched on a subject that has been of concern to many of us.

Lest I be misunderstood, I would like to make it perfectly clear that I believe in computers; but isn't it mind-boggling to youngsters attending these Hamfests when they see what to them must be prohibitively expensive pieces of equipment? Many clubs are being faced with ever-diminishing memberships. Look around at your next club meeting. What do you suppose the average age of your membership is? If it is over 40 years of age, you are faced with the possibility of a dying club! We need new, young members, not necessarily for growth but just to maintain the status quo.

Where are the youngsters learning to build their first transmitter from scratch - or even a kit - at a price they can afford. Must we continually scare them off with displays of expensive transceivers, computers, etc?

Where are they learning the true meaning of 'Public Service'? We were given the privilege of operating our radios in the 'Public Interest Convenience or Necessity'. It appears to me that these days 'PICON' stands more for Private Interest Conceit or Nonsense.

There is nothing wrong with having fun with our hobby but it has become too commercialized, too darned expensive and too much 'me-ism.'

This lady is a fine example of what is meant by 'Public Service'. Not only has Harriet earned YLCC (300), DX-YL, WAS, WAC, A-1 Op Club, ARRL Public Service Awards, but also the Women Marines National Service Award; Project Hope for phone patches over 7 years; Valley Forge Freedoms Foundation Award for 5000 phone patches to Guantanamo Bay; and also the Four Chaplain's award for her work with the Eye Bank system.

Harriet sent me a short article written in 1973 regarding the Eye Emergency Network which I would like to reprint here.

" THE EYE EMERGENCY NETWORK

A Network dedicated to assisting all, regardless of RACE, COLOR, or CREED to the "GIFT OF SIGHT".

The Eye Emergency Network was formed December 20, 1962 by Al, WOGET and Ted, WONTI (now a SK) with seven cities involved: Chicago, IL; Columbia, MO; Denver, CO; Indianapolis, IN; Iowa City, IA; Oklahoma City, OK and Omaha, NE. St. Louis, MO and Minot, ND were added later.

The idea behind the Net activity was to provide rapid, inexpensive, and effective communication once a day to make known to the participating Eye Banks any emergency requirements for eye tissue and where such eye tissue is available to fill the need. Medical history and shipping arrangements would be discussed and arranged on the telephone once the tissue had been located by the Net.

Since the Net was formed, it has grown to cover all the fifty states, Canada, and parts of Old Mexico and to date (1973) has provided tissue for nearly 7000 corneal transplants World Wide. All this has been done by the efforts of Amateur Radio operators getting together to help others. We have one of the finest Networks on the Amateur bands, to which we are all extremely proud, and it is only through your efforts that we can make that claim." Harriet writes that since that was written, the number of eyes handled has risen to 10,967!

The Net meets daily on 3.970 at 0100 Z and 7.294 at 0045 Z. There are morning nets on the same frequencies at 7:00 AM, EST & EDT and again at 7:45 AM, EST & EDT. NCS on 75m are WA4TTY, Dean, in TN and WA8HMO, John in OH. NCS on 40m is WORRW, Ernie in Fargo ND.

The Eye Banks are supported by the Lions International who make arrangements for shipping. There are times when the State Police in various states help in delivery from air ports to hospitals where needed.

Doctors who need eyes in "Emergency only" (a situation in which the loss of an eye is imminent, usually within a 24 to 36 hour period) call their nearest Eye Bank with their request. In turn the Eye Bank calls the radio operator to report the need or availability (whichever it may be). Then the operator reports to the net; all operators on the net take the need or availability to their respective eye banks.
