Rules for All YLRL Contests

YL Harmonics is published bi-monthly by and for the members of the Young Ladies' Radio League, Inc. YLRL is a non-profit organization, granted under section (501)(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, comprised of women amateur radio operators, incorporated as such under the laws of the state of California.

Dues can only be paid for one (1) year or three (3) years at a time. Dues are \$15.00 for one year and \$45.00 for three years. The membership year is from January 1st to December 31st with memberships becoming delinquent on March 1st.

An additional **\$4.00** is required for Canada and Mexico **airmail**.

Dues for a licensed YL family member (residing at the same address) are \$3.00. Subscriptions for non-members are \$15.00 per year and may not be pro-rated for portions of years.

What? 'That Diamond' shaped emblem which is the basic symbol of many amateur radio organizations, including ARRL, caught the eye of Ethel Smith, K4LMB, founder and first president of the YLRL. It was intended to indicate the League's support of ARRL, and the scroll lent itself to the inscription of YLRL. Ethel also chose the League's colors of dark blue and silver. Let's jump back to 'That Diamond.' It is rumored that the diamond symbol represents a rhombic antenna, also known as a diamond antenna. Sounds good to me! Fact or Fiction?

When? Now! Now is the time to start thinking about becoming an officer or a district chairwoman for the 2024/2025 YLRL Board of Directors. In my column this time I want to talk about the award certificates offered to YLRL members, as well as any licensed amateur, male or female, in the world. Keep in mind we are an international organization. Currently, I serve as the Certificate and Contest Manager. It seems to me as an organization we don't value enough the certificates we offer. Lack of participation and application for awards tells me this.

Most of our awards are not that difficult to get. Worked All Continents (WAC) requires working and confirming all 6 continents. The South Pacific, which includes Australia and New Zealand, is considered Oceania. Worked All Zones (WAZ) requires only 10 of the 40 CQ Zones. DX-YL requires working and confirming 10 YLs outside your country. They do not even have to be in different countries. YL Digital requires working and confirming 25 YLs on different digital modes, which includes CW. Only one of those certificates has been awarded.

The most popular Certificate is our Annual Award, and this year it is Favorite Vacation Spot. The majority of these awarded gathered the information needed from Echolink YL Nets. Nets using Internet access is allowed only on this award. Already 13 certificates have been given out in 2022. We will continue that annual award, and every year a different theme.

Now to our three most difficult-to-earn Awards, the YL-WAS (Worked all States), YLCC (100 YLs anywhere worked and confirmed) and of course, YL-DXCC (100 different YLs in 100 different countries). YLCC was last earned in 2015. I earned the YL-WAS in 2021, and before me, it was in 2013 that the last one was earned. A lapse of 8 years. YL-Worked All States is a

very difficult award to earn. Why? Mainly because so few YLs in some states are active on the air. Also, few are on CW. No doubt more hams are on digital modes, such as FT8, but it is hard to recognize a YL on the digital modes, which includes CW. You must look for clues, such as a YL suffix in their call. Look them up if you think they may be a YL. I have looked up calls with JEN and KIM in the call and found a YL operator.

Without a doubt our hardest to earn award is **YL-DXCC**. I believe it to be up there *Continued on page 6*

with the toughest in the world to earn. 100 different YLs in 100 different countries/entities. Having said that, let me introduce you to our latest winner of that prestigious award, Kurt Wetter, HB9AFI, from Switzerland. His application and log were just submitted to me and his Certificate awarded. *Congratulations to Kurt Wetter*. He has been a ham for 58 years and has been on several DX-peditions. He has also worked all 340 countries on the ARRL Approved Country List, and some others in the deleted list. He is a top-notch operator without a doubt.

His submitted list of YLs is most intriguing, with YLs in remote places you've barely even heard of. For example, St. Barthelemy, Sierra Leone, Burundi, Juan Fernandez. It is remarkable that he found an active, on-the-air YL in some of these places. May he be an inspiration to us all.

Check your QSL cards and your LoTW credits to see if you qualify for one of our awards. Then download the logs and applications provided to you on our website <u>ylrl.net</u>.



Lizette, ZS6LZT (South Africa)



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Notes

Rules for All YLRL Contests

- 1. Check to make certain you are sending logs to the CURRENT Vice-President.
- 2. Logs must be postmarked no later than 30 days after each contest ends.
- 3. Scoring:
- 4. Phone and CW contests will be scored separately. Separate logs must be submitted for each contest.
- 5. One point is earned for each different station worked on each band. The same station may be worked on different bands. In the YL-OM contest only, YLs count OMs and OMs count YLs.
- 6. Multiplier will be the ARRL sections and/or DX countries, whichever is appropriate. Canadian provinces are counted individually. Multipliers are used only once on all bands when figuring the score.
- 7. Contestants running 5W or less will be considered QRP and earn a power factor of 3. Contestants running 5W to 100W will be considered low power and earn a power factor of 1.5. Contestants running over 100W will be high power. If no transmitter power is listed on logs, no power factor will be given.

Total scored claimed is calculated by multiplying the points times the multiplier times the power factor.

Logs

- 1. All logs must show the operator's ARRL section, VE province, or country to qualify for awards. Where applicable, logs must state whether or not the operator is a member of YLRL. For each QSO, logs must also state the power output. If you have 200 or more QSOs, submit a separate log for each band and submit a "dupe" sheet.
- 2. Please type or print. If you print a log from a logging program or photocopy your log book, be sure they include all the required information.
- 3. Logs must be signed and show claimed score. No logs will be returned. Entries in log must also show time, band, date and transmitter power.

Exchange

Station worked, QSO number given and received, RS(T) given and received, and section/province/country.

Entry categories

Single operator and YL clubs/groups.
