Beijing International DX Convention

Last April at the Dayton Hamvention, Chen Ping, BZ1HAM, was the guest speaker at the Friday Evening DX dinner. He gave a very detailed slide review of the BS7H Scarborough Reef operation. At the conclusion of his talk, he invited all in the audience to attend the forthcoming Beijing International DX Convention sponsored by the 'Chinese Radio Sports Association' (CRSA) that would take place October 13-16, 1995.

Martin, VE3MR, and I had always talked about visiting the Orient, but it was a long way to travel and we were reluctant to go alone.

When we returned home, I decided to fax a copy of the information sheet that was handed out to Tom Wong, VE7BC. I knew that Tom had good connections in China and could speak the language as well. Was he interested in joining us? Would his wife, Alice, VE7AW, be interested? She said yes, yes, and we became a traveling foursome.

Martin and I flew to Vancouver on October 8th, spending two days there to allow our body clocks to start adjusting to the final time difference of 12 hours. On October 10th, we all boarded our Canadian Airlines non-stop flight, Vancouver to Beijing. Eleven hours later, and the next day, we arrived. As expected, we were royally greeted at the airport.

The convention was originally booked at the China Resources Hotel, but due to road construction which impeded the entrances, it was switched at the last minute to a new five star hotel, the Catic Plaza, located in the northeast area of Beijing. Later, after checking in, we enjoyed a nice dinner in the hotel and got an adjusted night's sleep.

The next day we were picked up and taken to visit the famous BY1PK QTH. We spent a very nice time there with Tom recalling the good old start up days of many years ago. A visit to the roof showed us their current antenna farm that covers all frequencies, 3.5 to 144 MHz. Again, back to the hotel to await the out-of-country visitors. Not too many arrived Thursday evening, but Friday was a different story.

In all, over 100 participants arrived from many countries. Going strictly from memory, the following had representatives: VE, W/K, OH, BV, HL, JA, VS6, VK, UA, DK, F, OZ, S21, G, OE, etc. It was also nice to see so many Chinese amateurs in attendance. It was a real treat for them and they came from all over the country.

The symposium took place at the Beijing International Convention Center and was called to order at 10:00 am. Mr. Chen Ping, now BA1HAM, liaison officer and acting secretary general of the CRSA made the opening remarks and welcome. He was followed by the minister of the 'All China Sport Association', who gave a short talk about amateur radio in China. Martti Laine, OH2BH acted as the master of ceremonies and then asked the visitors in the audience if they would like to say a few words, a Chinese

tradition. The response from the floor was very good, with a dozen people coming to the microphone and making impromptu speeches.

K5FUV then gave a short talk on the history of the ARRL DXCC program and the qualifications needed to apply for the various awards. Next, Phil Weaver, VS6CT gave an interesting resume on the status of Hong Kong now and the changes that will take place when it reverts to China on July 1, 1997. He was followed by Tom Wong, VE7BC who gave a slide presentation that chronicled his 12 year effort to finally get China back on the amateur radio bands. HL1DK gave insight into amateur radio in Korea and the great influx since a new licensing system came into effect in 1990.

The next speaker called upon with much anticipation was the representative from the Democratic Peoples' Republic of Korea (North Korea). Greetings were passed on to the assembly on behalf of the state commission for physical culture and sports, under which the amateur radio association, DPR of Korea, functions. Unfortunately, nothing of substance was said, as the ultimate authority comes through their Ministry of Communications.

Martti then asked if the representatives from both South and North Korea would come to the podium and have their picture taken shaking hands. The South Korean delegation came forward, but the North Korean speaker gracefully declined. After a second request, his assistant did come forward. The flashes were really popping and I am sure this symbolic picture will appear in the major ham radio publications in the not too distant future.

After a delightful Chinese lunch, the meeting was reconvened into two rooms. Dick Ehrhorn, W4ETO gave a talk to a Chinese audience on linear amplifier design and construction. The English speaking audience was treated to a most interesting lecture on what makes China tick today. It lasted two hours and was followed by a lively question and answer period.

After the sessions were finished, hot and cold drinks were offered in the lobby. It was a good opportunity to intermix with all the Chinese amateurs in attendance. Most of them were very young and enthusiastic. QSL cards, lapel pins, and other trinkets were exchanged.

A cocktail party was scheduled for 6:30 pm, followed by a CRSA reception and DX dinner in the banquet hall of our hotel. All participants

were invited. It was a very interesting evening, with a slide presentation and update on the current status of Scarborough Reef. A very beautiful gift was given to all foreign attendees and there were door prizes for the local amateurs, with the grand prize being a Kenwood TS-850 transceiver and matching power supply, personally donated by Kan, JA1BK. It was a super evening that was enjoyed by everyone.

All the speeches made throughout the day were translated, English to Chinese and Chinese to English. The translations were handled by Shun (Sean) Yao, BG1LUV who is a student at the Tsinghua University. This is a technical university and is also the home of BY1QH. Sean was a very congenial and outgoing person, who was well versed in both languages. We spent a fair amount of time with him. It was quite a learning experience to see the ingenuity displayed by the Chinese in what they have been able to do with this hobby, considering their limited part and component resources, that we take for granted.

I was very happy that we had an opportunity to visit their station after the convention and spend some time with him and other members of the radio club. Only one of them was a YL.

At the hotel, a special event station was located on the 21st floor. All attendees were issued temporary licenses (the first time ever) to operate from the hotel and the Great Wall, and for the use of two meter handheld transceivers. The convention was supported by Yaesu, Cushcraft, Eto, and CQ Ham Radio of Japan. Through their efforts, BT1DX was the call

used from the hotel, while BT1X was used from the Great Wall.

The Sunday activities started with another large buffet breakfast, and then on to the bus for a short visit to BY1PK. From there, we proceeded to a Cloisonné factory and observed how each piece is meticulously hand crafted by individual artists. After lunch, we continued our drive to the Great Wall. By the time we arrived, BT1X had been installed and was on the air using a Yaesu transceiver and a R-7 vertical antenna. Unfortunately, conditions to North America from both locations were not very good, but there was certainly a direct pipeline into Japan.

It took 1½ hours to return, and those that participated in walking the

wall were tired and happy that dinner was being served in the hotel.

For those who did not sign on for the extra tour packages that were offered, the party was over and the exodus to the airport began. 
WHY ALBANY?



## Portrait of a Winner

**Bob Painter, WA6PLM**

*This article will acquaint  
you with the 1995  
recipient of the  
Jean Carter Memorial Award.*

Violet "Vi" Barrett, W6CBA, has been a ham since February of 1948. And it appears that there hasn't been an idle moment in all those years. Vi has a list of credentials and awards that is mindboggling.

The radio bug bit Vi when her uncle, W6HMW, showed her what it could do. With money saved from baby-sitting, she bought an HQ-129X. After listening, she just had to get a license and join the fun on the air. Fresh out of high school, Vi applied for a job as a clerk-typist, but the FBI liked the way she handled a microphone and they made her a dispatcher in the Los Angeles office.

She and Don Barrett married some 40 years ago. She insisted that her ham radio interest was part of the package he was marrying. Vi took time off from work to raise children until they were off to school. Then she went back to work to earn enough to upgrade her ham equipment. Her job was with the East Whittier School District. Vi retired in 1986 and now spends most of her time on public service ham events.

Among her souvenirs are letters of thanks or commendation from the ARRL, the City of Whittier, the City of Montebello, the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, the YMCA, the American Heart Association, the Children's Benefit League and many others.

Vi provided a link to home for servicemen in the Vietnam days via phone patch.

She was also involved in the Rehab Amateur Radio Club at Presbyterian Hospital in Whittier. This club provides handicapped persons with an opportunity to reach beyond their handicaps via ham radio.

As part of the program of the Rio Hondo Amateur Radio Club, Vi teaches CW for license classes.

She has been associated with most of the ham radio organizations in the area including LARA, YLRC, QCWA, YLRL, ARRL, QCWW, RACES, MARS and the Los Angeles County Disaster Communications Service.

She has given ham radio an incredible amount of favorable publicity and her work has been recognized in QST, World Radio and by several articles in the Whittier Daily News.

One of Vi's pet projects is giving talks on ham radio at local schools. To quote QST, "She introduces children to Amateur Radio by giving talks throughout the East Whittier School District. She has been doing this for 10 years. Her talks include showing Dave Bell's film *The Wonderful World of Amateur Radio*. Her talks are followed by an invitation for a field trip to her home, where she provides the children, and parents who chaperone them, with on-the-air contacts. They have contacted stations in Missouri, New Mexico, Canada, Chicago, West Virginia and Oklahoma.

In 1980, Vi started Operation Santa Claus in four convalescent hospitals in Whittier. She walked around the wards with a 2-meter rig in a red wagon and had patients talk to Santa Claus at the North Pole. (Santa was really her husband Don, KA6DJK, who was outside in a truck. Helpers with handhelds would stand outside the patient's room and feed "Santa" information about what the patient was wearing, things in the room and so forth.)

The Santa Claus operation has been expanded to the pediatric ward at Whittier Intercommunity Hospital. It takes a little prompting, but the toddlers love talking to "Santa" by radio once they get warmed up. A newspaper article about this annual even mentioned that the part of Mrs. Santa Claus was originally played by Jean Carter, KA6HJK, in whose memory this award was established.

When the devastating earthquake of 1987 hit Whittier, Don was at the EOC within 15 minutes after the quake began. In another 30 minutes, Vi was at the Whittier Hospital providing communication when the telephones became overloaded and were no longer available.

If there is a public service event anywhere near Whittier, chances are you'll find Vi in the thick of it.

## Radio Amateur Scholarships Available

THE FOUNDATION FOR AMATEUR RADIO, INC., a non-profit organization with headquarters in Washington, D.C., plans to administer fifty-seven (57) scholarships for the academic year 1996-1997 to assist licensed Radio Amateurs.
