

Again, thank you for letting me have this opportunity to serve you. God Bless You.



WOMEN IN AMATEUR RADIO

PART TWO

Linda Reeder, N7HVF

Editor's Note: This is the second of several parts of the serialization of a documentary that Linda Reeder wrote and recorded several years ago.

Carol Perry, WB2MGP teaches Amateur Radio to intermediate students in Staten Island, New York. Carol tells how she got involved in Amateur Radio.

Carol Perry, WB2MGP: "Several years ago I worked for an electronics manufacturing company. Most of the people who worked there were males. Several of them had Amateur Radio as a hobby. I would watch them having fun making contacts, having a little base station set up at the company.

"One day I said, "That looks like it's a lot of fun, perhaps I will get my license, too." And the response, and this was back in the early 1970s, was, well it is a lot of fun but you'll never get your license because you're a female. With that I guess the gauntlet was dropped and I proceeded to do the things that I have done in Amateur Radio, always keeping that statement in mind."

"First of all, I do teach a course at Intermediate School 72 in Staten Island, New York. I am a full time teacher in industrial arts technology. The name of the program that I teach is *Introduction to Amateur Radio*. I have thirteen classes every term with approximately 35 youngsters in each one. That's way over 400 kids each semester. I teach 6th, 7th, and 8th grade. The children get exposed to Amateur Radio and some of them go on and get licensed."

"I teach the curriculum for those grades through Amateur Radio, the purpose being to motivate them in different areas of the school curriculum by letting them have fun on the radio. At this point, it's a mandatory course in my school. All the children coming through the school will get the program. We have close to 200 kids a year who get licensed. Out of that, approximately 10% of them, as we can track them, do upgrade. We're pretty happy about that."

"When I began this 16 years ago I had an innovative principal who allowed me, after he saw me teaching a couple of science classes, to try this as a pilot program. We began it with one program. The children just responded so beautifully to it and the parents said, "Lets do that again." It just kind of snowballed. It was just so successful that it kind of fed on itself. As far as convincing the administration, once you show them that this is a viable, exciting and high motivational way to teach children, with all these different curriculum areas—social studies, language arts, math, science—all

an integral part of Amateur Radio. The kids have fun with this and they are actually eager to get involved with it. The course kind of sells itself."

"For example, instead of just saying, "Open up your books to page thirteen and let's read about the topography of Ecuador", it's going to be a lot more exciting if you can get on the radio and speak to a citizen of that country and ask the questions one on one. In my program, when the kids get on the radio and speak with people, it's very natural to run over to a globe or an atlas to look up and find out the location of where that voice is coming from, kind of on a need to know basis. And the same with all the other skills. The language arts skills come about from learning how to speak clearly and succinctly on the radio and by following up with exchanged letters and cards. So everything just happens because that's what we're doing. It's sort of a backdoor or painless approach to education."

"Today, there are so many programs out there and people with proven track records that I think it might be a little bit easier for a teacher to get it into a school. But clearly after all these years of doing it, I am thoroughly convinced that it belongs in every school because I've seen children who have never been successful

at anything else in their school careers who are learning new skills and developing self-esteem by being in this program. I think it counts for a lot when a child leaves feeling good about himself."

"As far as bringing it to a school, if anybody is interested in doing that, they need not reinvent the wheel. I would be more than happy, if anybody writes to me, to send them information that they can present to an administrator. Anybody can write to me, Carol Perry, POB 131646, Staten Island, NY 10313. I'll be very happy to provide information about what we're doing with the kids and a lot of documentation about the success of the program."

Sister Alverna O'Laughlin, WA0SGJ works for Handi-Hams, a non-profit organization helping disabled individuals get into the hobby.

Sr. Alverna O'Laughlin, WA0SGJ: "I'm a Franciscan sister from Rochester, Minnesota where our provincial house is. I have been a sister since 1950 (that's telling my age!) and I've been an Amateur Radio operator since 1967. Ned Carmen, the founder of the Handi-Hams system, which is a program to interest Amateur Radio operators among the disabled, got some of the sisters, in fact there were about seven of us, interested in one of the local radio club classes. Then he asked us to help him get this group started, so I am really a charter member of the Handi-hams.

1999 YLRL Convention

Greetings to all YLRL members! As some of you know, the YLRL Convention in 1999 will be held in the Southern California area and be hosted by the Ladies Amateur Radio Association of Orange County, ably assisted by the YL Radio Club of Los Angeles.

Our committee, after viewing several locations, has decided on the Queen Mary in Long Beach. The dates will be July 30th and 31st, 1999. The hotel has all up to date amenities, 365 staterooms, plus the rare experience of staying amid history aboard the largest, most luxurious ocean liner, the Queen Mary. We hope a lot of you will want to stay aboard as the rates are comparable to others we checked, \$79 to \$104 single or double occupancy, plus 12% occupancy tax. There will be a \$15.00 charge for rollaway bed for third person. Bear in mind the rooms are twin, queen or king beds and three people to a room are about max, unless you go to a suite, which is over \$300, so two rooms is a better deal. We have blocked 45 rooms which will give us enough comp to pay for our registration, hospitality, banquet and meeting rooms. Each attendee is responsible for booking for their rooms and paying to the Queen Mary. When making your reservation, please be sure to tell them you are with the YLRL convention to get those rates. We hope you will bring your spouses or friends, as side trips will be planned. Rates will be good two days before and two days after, July 28th & 29th and August 1st and 2nd. There is so much to see in the area so you may want to spend more time then the two nights.

Beside self-guided, or tour guided trips on the Queen, there are historic videos, gallery of art deco treasures, an array of colorful shops, rewarding restaurants, and the historical wireless room and museum, where you will be able to operate from W6RO. Just be sure to bring a copy of your license since you can not operate without it. Also, there is a Run-about bus that, at no charge, will pick you up at the QM and take you shopping, to restaurants and to the new state of the art Aquarium.




Lia Zwack, WA2NFY, Ham of the Year

Meet the Novices and Technicians Day

CW & SSB: 1500 UTC, Jan. 10, 1998 to 0500 UTC, Jan. 11, 1998

ELIGIBILITY: All licensed women operators throughout the world are invited to participate.

PROCEDURE: Call "CQ YL."

OPERATION: Only frequencies in the HF bands that are open to Novices and Technicians may be used. Net and repeater contacts do not count. No cross band operation is allowed. A station may be worked once for credit. Maximum power output is 200 watts PEP. The modes of operation are CW and SSB.

SUGGESTED FREQUENCIES: CW - 3.675-3.725; 7.120-7.150; 21.120-21; AND 28.150-28.185. SSB - 28.300-28.500.

EXCHANGE: Station worked, RST, name, QTH, license class.

SCORING: 3 points for each YL Novice or Technician worked, 2 points for each YL General or Advanced, and 1 point for each YL Extra. Total score = total number of points.

AWARDS: Top scoring Novice or Technician - YLRL postcards and top scoring General or higher - YLRL postcards. Second and third place winners will receive certificates.

LOGS: All logs submitted must show the date, time, band, and station worked for each QSO. Logs must indicate the name, call sign, address, operating breaks, and the license class of the operator and must be signed by the operator. Logs must show the claimed score and be postmarked no later than 30 days after contest ends. Mail logs to YLRL Vice-President.

YL-OM Contest

SSB: 1400 UTC, February 14, 1998, to 0200 UTC, February 16, 1998

CW: 1400 UTC, February 21, 1998, to 0200 UTC, February 23, 1998

ELIGIBILITY: All licensed men and women operators throughout the world are invited to participate.

PROCEDURE: OMs call "CQ-YL" and YLs call "CQ-OM."

OPERATION: See General Rules on page 8. Participants may work only 24 hours of the 36 hours in each contest. Operating breaks must be indicated in the log.

EXCHANGE: Station worked, QSO number, RS(T), ARRL section, VE province, or country. Entries in log must also show time, band, and date.

SCORING: (1) Phone and CW will be scored as separate contests. Submit separate logs for each contest. (2) Score each band separately. One point is earned for each different station worked on each band; YLs count only OMs and OMs count only YLs. Add together the QSO points earned for each band. (3) Multiply the number of QSOs by the total number of different ARRL sections, VE provinces, and countries worked. (4) Contestants running with a power output of 100 watts or less on CW and 200 watts PEP or less on SSB, AT ALL TIMES, may multiply the results of 3) above by 1.5 (the low power multiplier). The maximum power output that may be used at any time during the contest is 750 watts on CW and 1500 watts PEP on SSB.

LOGS: All logs must show your ARRL section, province, or country to qualify for awards. For each QSO, logs must show the station worked, QSO number given and received, RS(T) given and received, the ARRL section, VE province, or country of the station worked, time, band, and date. Logs must also state the power output used and the operating breaks taken. If you have 200 or more QSOs, submit a separate log for each band and submit a "dupe" sheet. Remember to file separate logs for each contest. Logs must show claimed score.

AWARDS: First place phone: YL-cup, OM-cup. First place CW: YL-cup, OM-cup. The second and third place YL and OM winners in each contest will receive certificates. The winner of the phone contest cup is also eligible to win the CW cup. Certificates will be awarded to the YL and OM phone and YL and OM CW winners of each U.S. and VE call district and country, provided there are at least ten valid contacts on the log.

Ned Carmen worked for the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota in collections and his territory was in Northern Minnesota. It saddened Ned to go to homes of people who had disabled individuals within their home and that individual was pretty well locked in their own home. At that time, when we think back 30 years ago, disabled people were not as visible as they are today. He wanted them to be able to talk with anyone and everyone on the air and experience the joy of Amateur Radio that he had known. So he started with a small group of disabled people, having them give him input on what was needed. Then he recruited some people as we call verticals that didn't have an apparent disability and had us give him some assistance on getting the group started.

This was an excellent way for individuals to travel around the world without leaving their homes.

It's a service to the disabled to assist them with getting their Amateur Radio license. The Federal Communications Commission requires that a license be given before an individual is able to operate on the Amateur bands.

Carol Iams, W8WRJ, SK







WARO's Ranunculus Lyallii



Ranunculus Lyallii is the Giant Mountain Buttercup. This glory of New Zealand alpine plants has tall branched flowering stems usually with many large white flowers, each with numerous overlapping petals, and is found in the southern alpine regions of the South Island and the highest peaks of Stewart Island. The leaves are almost circular, can be up to 40 cm across and, in the central hollow where the stem is attached, can be deep enough to hold a cup of water. The flower can

be between five and eight cms in diameter. The white petals surround the golden stamens and in the centre, the greenish pistils overlap likefish scales. It is a noble plant and the largest and finest ranunculus in the world.

The Giant Mountain Buttercup has been adopted as the WARO Emblem. The text and sketch was supplied by Brenda Shore, ZL4OQ some 17 years ago. -- *reprinted from NZ WARO Bulletin, December 1997*

With her strong will, Stew's encouragement and constant medication she was able to go to work and lead a fulfilling life again.

She took an interest in music and had tuition. Her tutor encouraged her to play a new instrument, the marimba, and found one for sale, which she bought. Joan also loved her dogs, cats and was a keen gardener. On November 02nd 1996 Joan wrote to say that she would be coming to England on 14th November for a visit, The leukaemia was under control with medication and she felt able to come, even though she became easily fatigued. We both had e-mail so the lines between our countries were red hot!

We had a wonderful and memorable visit. Joan and I recognized each other immediately when we met in the lobby of the London hotel. Many photos later, we visited the Royal Botanic Gardens at Kew, (more photos) then afterwards we went for a pleasant pub "Ploughmans lunch". It rained almost constantly that day but it did not deter us from walking arm in arm, non-stop chatting under an umbrella. We bought each other keepsakes before having to say good bye that day. Joan phoned me from Bath where they were staying and we decided to go there for the weekend. We continued to cement our friendship and the second farewell was very sad and emotional for me. We made plans to see each other again and keep in touch via e-mail. Joan sent me a wonderful photo of us which I keep on top of my radio. Her smile lights up her whole face and I confess I sometimes talk to that photo.

Joan fought her illness for 3 years, 11 days. I feel privileged and proud to have met and known her, a truly wonderful friend, devoted wife and dedicated worker. She will be sadly missed by all the people she touched in her all too short life.




